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Longtime Library Dean Is Retiring



After 38 years of serving the campus community, Library Dean Don Craig is retiring June 30,

2010. Dean Craig is participating in the University's Voluntary Buyout Program, started in an effort to reduce the budget in light of decreased support from the state in these tough economic times.

When he came to the University in 1972, it was with the intention of staying a few years and then moving on to a larger institution. "The experience of working on this campus and living in this community changed my plans. This is a great place to contribute and a good community in which to live."

Dean Craig has seen many changes in his nearly four decades at MTSU. The library had just over 200,000 books when he arrived, and MTSU had 8,500 students. MTSU now has over 25,000 students, and James E. Walker Library now has well over 800,000 printed books and 300,000 electronic books. But the library is so

much more than books. Students come to the library to seek information, study for tests, meet classmates, get coffee, check out a laptop, and get help with research. The library is a central learning place for students.

The Walker Library building is one of the many highlights of the dean's career. Opened in 1999, it brought a new energy to the University and has served as a reflection of MTSU's dedication to academic excellence and student success. "The completion of this building after so many years of waiting, discussing, designing, and constructing, gave the University community a much needed boost toward what the institution should and could be in the future," said Dean Craig. The building's beauty, spaciousness, and functionality have been welcoming over 800,000 campus users each year for the past decade. At the dedication ceremony for the building, Dean Craig said, "I've dreamed of this day for almost twenty years."

Dean Craig came to MTSU as assistant librarian in 1972 after having served as assistant to the director of the Joint

University Libraries in Nashville. He became University librarian in 1976 followed by his appointment as dean. He earned his bachelor's degree from David Lipscomb University in business management. He then went on to George Peabody College (now part of Vanderbilt University), where he earned his master's in library science. He continued his education by attending Vanderbilt's Graduate School of Management. He has a long history of professional involvement, from cofounding the Mid-State Library Association to serving as president of the Tennessee Library Association to dedicating much time to the Phi Kappa Phi honor society.

Dean Craig and his wife, Connie, have been married for 42 years. They have two sons, Jeff and Jimmy, and are proud grandparents to Hailee, Hayden, and Carter. Craig has been an active member of North Boulevard Church of Christ for 37 years. Don and Connie look forward to having more time to spend with their grandchildren, experiencing the country in their camper, enjoying the antique car they rebuilt (a 1969 Chevy Camaro), and attending University programs and athletic events.

Bye-Bye Voyager, InfoSearch is Coming!
