DRIVE SAFELY

On an average day there are between 150 and 175 cars parked along the drives and i the parking areas of the campus.

Last year MTSC students were involved in one fatal automobile accident, at least five in which students were injured.

It is necessary for many of the students who attend an area college such at MTSC to commute. The majority of these drive their own vehicles. Hence the majority of the automobiles on our campus are here as a matter of convenience and necessity.

The SIDELINES has consistently advocated safety on this camups. That means observing the one way drives, courteous parking in the areas so designated by yellow lines, the keeping of your vehicle in good condition with proper lights, brakes and in good mechanical condition.

Recent studies made by the Lumberman's Mutual Casualty Company has indicated that it is sound economy to drive sensibly

In a recent test in Kansas, two cars covered the same 295 stretch of the same day. The car "A" reached a top speed of 65 miles an hour whenever the driver thought it practical, averaging a speed of 46 miles per hour. On the journey he passed 126 cars, covering the distance in six hours and 25 minutes. Car "B" covered the same route in six hours and 50 minutes, never exceeding 50 miles per hour. He passed 62 cars.

Driver "A" saved 25 minutes time, but used 11 per cent more gasoline (allowing 20 miles to the gallon at 30 cents a gallon this means that it cost him 50 cents fore for gasoline for the trip). He used 50 per cent more oil (which means about .35 more in cost). To save 25 minutes he spent 85 cents more, took twice as many chances on an ac-

Does every little news story in them get a by-line? Sure we want to give by-lines but they're not to be handed out like bones to an obedient dog. A story to be given a by-line is judged by the timeliness of the material, you. the style of narration, and the promptness with which the story is handed in.




