

His letter to the editor entitled "We Did Our freshman class was the solo twirling Best" contained the following excerpt which concerned the exhibition given by Suzanne Handcontroversal White Case.

By showing that in 1945 and 1946 our administration was 'soft' toward friends of Russia in government positions, the Republicans have merely proved what most of us knew all alongthat hindsight is better than foresight.

At the end of World War II the majority of the American public, as well as congress, had great hopes for a lasting peace on earth . . . Moreover, there were many reasons for believing that the United States and Russia, who, as two major allies, had won a great victory over common enemies, could establish permanent friendly relations . . . Now, we all know that those shining hopes of the middle forties were but illusions.

But, even in retrospect, was the attitude of our administration in 1945 and 1946 so reprehensible? Perhaps in a way it is well that we were 'soft' at that time toward friends of Russia in our government. Since we were, we are now secure in the knowledge that we did ar best at the most propitious time to foster riendship between ourselves and Russia. No matter what happens in the future, it is to our ternal credit that, as behooves a great Christian nation, we did our level best-even to the extent, perhaps, of sacrificing our national selfinterest-to be Peacemakers.



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

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
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
