Burglary suspect now in custody

Alleged Clements Hall burglar also suspected of JUB break-in

A former Aramark Dining Services employee is in police custody after an early morning burglary at Clements Hall Monday.


Police believe the same individual might be involved in another burglary that occurred the same night that caused more than \$1500 in damage to the James Union Building.

Reginald Troy Watson, 40, of 2210 Winston Place in Murfreesboro, has been charged with one count of aggravated burglary and possession of burglary tools.

Vandalism charges for damage done to the JUB may be added later, pending the findings of a forensics investigation by the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation in Nashville, according to Public Safety Lt. Darrell Collins.

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Around 5 a.m. Monday morning, someone broke in to a room near the area coordinator's apartment in Clements Hall. Police say someone damaged the door that leads from

room which backs up to the AC's apartment.

A guest visiting the AC heard a disturbance and, upon investigating, allegedly found Watson "He asked [Watson] what he was doing, and [Watson] took flight," Collins said.

Two officers observed an individual, later identified as Watson, matching the suspect's description at the intersection of East Main Street and Baird Lane about five minutes later. They stopped his vehicle and took him to Clements Hall where the witness positively identified him, Collins said.

A search of Watson's vehicle – after his arrest – led officers to find a long wrench with a sharp end on it, a sledgehammer and additional burglary tools. The wrench appears to correspond to the marks left on the door, according to Collins.

Earlier that night, sometime between 7:09 p.m. and 2 a.m. according to police, someone entered the JUB and damaged a Coke machine and several offices on the third floor.

Police believe the individual entered the building through an open door, though they are not sure which door or how it had been unlocked. The building was checked at 7:09 p.m. and all

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Library's new name to honor Walker

The new university library is going to be named after former university president James Walker.

"It is one small way that we can express our appreciation for what he has done for the MTSU community," said John Marshall, president of the Student Government Association.

After the Building Naming Advisory Committee agreed upon Walker, the proposal was sent to and approved by interim president Eugene Smith. Then it was sent to the Tennessee Board of Regents, who also approved the proposal.

The committee is composed of administrators, faculty members, alumni and student leaders.

"It had been anticipated that the library would be named after James Walker," said Duane Stucky, the vice-president of Finance and Administration Division and the chairman of the naming committee.

Summer renovations planned for KUC

Approximately \$1.2 million is being invested in renovations for the Keathley University Center, despite plans to build a new university center.

"The renovations look to begin this summer, but the plans are still tentative," Robert Glenn, vice president of Student Affairs, said. The renovations are scheduled to be finished this fall

"It all depends on the bidding process," he said. "I would like to see the store being worked on this summer and ready for next fall."

With plans to build a new university center within five years, many students question whether the money is being spent wisely.

"A new university center

would be nice, but there are other areas on campus where that funding could be better used," sophomore Graham Stoner said.

The funding for the renovations comes from a carry-over of unexpended money from previous years, pooled from various sources into one account.

"We feel the renovations are important and needed," Glenn explained. "So we scrimped and scraped and did without in order to save money for the project.

"The money being spent on the renovations is not going to be wasted, because the KUC will still be greatly utilized even if a new university center is built."

When renovations do begin, the lounge will be temporarily closed. However, Glenn said it

Walker was very instrumental in making improvements to the university.

In addition to the library, Walker was responsible for the construction of the Student Recreation Center and the Cason-Kennedy Nursing Building.

"He wanted to raise the standards. He did not want to settle for second best," Tozer said.

Students also feel strongly about the decision.

"I think that he did a lot for the university by bringing in outof-state people," junior Bob Gilmartin said. "He should be recognized.

"He helped make MTSU a university that students would

New IDs to expand services, credit capabilites for students

MTSU students could soon be carrying ID cards with more features than the current cards have. The Office of Information Technology is working on an upgraded ID system to use next fall.

The upgraded system could include features like "relationship banking and off-campus merchant usage," said Robin Jones, Information Technology Manager.

If those features are implemented, students could place money in an account and then access it, via their ID card, at sites on and off campus, much like a debit card. The IDs would be "tied to funds already in their account, working like a declining balance," Jones said.

Such an account would be like an expanded version of the current Raider Fund accounts.

For use at off-campus locations, the cards would need to be backed by multiple banks, Jones explained. However, it would be up to the different offcampus vendors whether or not to accept a student's ID.

The upgrade involves integrating some of the ID card components that are currently being run off an interface. Jones noted that it is not a new system, just an improvement on the current system.

Jones also stated that a new

ID design is being considered. "One real benefit," she said,

"is that we will not have to recard; but we are considering redesigning them."

Such a system is already in place in some colleges around the nation. MTSU's card vendor, Diebold, is currently working on upgrading systems at MTSU and other universities in Tennessee.

Cameran Reed, a senior, expressed some concerns with the planned upgrade.

"It seems like it would give students an opportunity to exploit parents who put money in their account that is supposed to be used for school," she said. "Personally, I think things tied to school should stay on

campus." Students will have the choice as to whether or not to utilize

the new features. Those students who do not want to set up an account will not be required to, and they can continue to use their IDs under the current system. ◆

Sharon favored in Israel election JERUSALEM (AP) - Ariel Sharon, pledging to halt months of violence and take a

tough line with the Palestinians, appeared set to score a sweeping victory in Tuesday's election against Israeli Prime Minister Ehud Barak, who staked his job to a peace treaty he has been unable to deliver. Israelis headed to the polls Tuesday morning amid more news of the turmoil that has engulfed the country since last September. Masked men, believed to be Israeli Arabs, temporarily blocked the main road and stoned passing cars in Israeli Arab town of Taibeh in central Israel before being chased off by police, army radio reported. Many Israeli Arabs have said they will boycott the poll, and police were out in large numbers to prevent voter intimidation. Also, an Israeli soldier was killed Monday in a gunbattle with Palestinians near the Rafah border crossing.

Former employee kills four, then self

MELROSE PARK, Ill. (AP) - Within minutes, four employees were killed by gunfire and another four wounded at a suburban Chicago engine plant. Then the gunman, identified by police as William D. Baker, turned the weapon on himself Monday. The 66year-old former employee was to begin a federal prison term Tuesday for helping steal engines and parts from the company, police said. The International Truck and Engine Corp. plant, which makes engines for parent company Navistar, closed down after the shooting spree. It was to reopen Tuesday with grief counselors on hand. •

Bush's tax cut package set to expand

WASHINGTON (AP) - Congressional Republicans and lobbyists say they like President Bush's proposed tax cut, but they won't back down from plans to add their own priorities, even though Bush is promising to defend his proposal "mightily." Beginning a week of selling his tax plan. Bush was visiting a Washington-area small business Tuesday to spotlight his argument that his proposal would spark greater economic growth. Bush planned to send Congress an outline of his package Thursday, and it was expected to mirror the \$1.6 trillion, 10-year tax reduction program he offered during his campaign for the White House. On Monday, Bush defended it against Democrats who would shrink the measure and Republicans who would like to expand or otherwise alter it. •

Group warns against e-mail wiretap

WASHINGTON (AP) - Before you forward that private message from your boss to several co-workers, consider the possibility that he may hear about it. Thanks to a newly publicized security hole in major e-mail programs, your outgoing messages may be tapped. Makers of the two of the most popular consumer e-mail applications scrambled to deal with the problem Monday, telling their customers how to protect themselves.

Using a small piece of invisible programming code in an e-mail message, an e-mail's original sender can get copies every time the message is forwarded, including the comments added to the message by its recipients, warned the Privacy Foundation, which publicized the problem Monday. This e-mail wiretap could be used to get off-color remarks from company or governmental officials, or used by a spamming company to gather e-mail addresses. •

Former Philippines president sues

MANILA, Philippines (AP) - Ousted Philippine President Joseph Estrada filed a lawsuit with the Supreme Court on Tuesday questioning the legitimacy of h. uccessor. Estrada lawyers said the petition is the first direct challenge to the presidency of Gloria Macapagal-Arroyo, who was sworn in Jan. 20 as swelling street protests forced Estrada to leave the presidential palace. Macapagal-Arroyo, who was vice president, picked a successor to that position Tuesday from Estrada's home region of Mindanao.

Fighting flares in Serbia's south

VRANJE, Yugoslavia (AP) - Ethnic Albanian militants fired mortar shells and small arms in an hourlong attack against government positions in southern Serbia just outside Kosovo, a top official and witnesses said Tuesday. The overnight attack, the heaviest in months, began "from trenches and other rebel positions with mortar and heavy artillery fire," said Rasim Ljajic, minister for ethnic minorities in Serbia's government.

Books promise some of the inside story

WASHINGTON (AP) - The election that wouldn't quit is now begetting at least a halfdozen books recounting the recount and the chaotic Florida flip-flops on Election Night. Reporters and commentators who descended on Palm Beach and Tallahassee or covered the postelection morass from afar are writing books about the 36 days of limbo that followed the Nov. 7 election draw. "It's an irresistible story," said Newsweek writer Davi Kaplan whose yet-untitled book will be published by William Morrow. "I want to attempt, with a little bit of distance and a little bit of perspective, to tell what really happened." •

Cruise and Kidman announce separation

LOS ANGELES (AP) - After 11 years of marriage, Tom Cruise and Nicole Kidman say they are separating because their work is keeping them apart. "Citing the difficulties inherent in divergent careers, which constantly keep them apart, they concluded that an amicable separation seems best for both of them at this time," Pat Kingsley, a spokeswoman for the actors, said Monday. The couple have two adopted children. It wasn't known whether custody would be shared. Kingsley denied further comment. •

exterior doors were secure at that time, Collins said.


Sidelines staff members, who have offices just down the hall from the damaged rooms, were working in the building until just after midnight. They did not hear anything suspicious, although one staffer reported hearing footsteps down the hallway as she was leaving around midnight, but assumed it was a janitor.

A Coke machine in a thirdfloor hallway was tampered with and \$50 was obtained from the bill changer, Collins said. A total of \$500 worth of damage was done to the machine.

Two faculty offices, Rooms 300 and 305, were both entered although nothing was stolen. Five hundred dollars worth of damage was done to each of the doors.

The damage to the doors at the JUB appears to have been caused using the same method as the damage done to the door at Clements Hall, Collins said.

In addition, a door to the JUB cafeteria was damaged in what appears to be an attempt to pry it open, but was only "scarred" and is still functional, according to Collins.



Police are currently awaiting the results of an analysis by TBI of fingerprints found at the scene and a comparison of the marks left on the doors to the tools found in Watson's vehicle.

Watson was employed by Aramark in the JUB Dining Hall until about three weeks ago, when he quit, according to one of his former supervisors at the cafeteria. He had only worked for the company for about a month.


"He was tardy, calling in all the time," said the supervisor, who wished to remain anony-

mous. "He was a little spacey as to the way he looked. ... I could see it in his eyes that he was up to something other than work."

The supervisor did add, however, that Watson was "very cordial" to other employees and customers, but said he was not surprised that Watson was suspected in the burglary.

Watson is a convicted felon who is currently on parole in Maryland until 2006, Collins said.

"He has a very lengthy record in Maryland," Collins stated, adding that Watson was

also arrested in Nashville last November for shoplifting.

Police have contacted Watson's parole officer in Maryland who is in the process of charging him with a parole violation, Collins said.

A check of Rutherford

County court records show that Watson has no previous local arrests.

Police have issued Watson a criminal trespass warning so that if he is caught on the MTSU campus again, he will be arrested, regardless of his reasons for being there.

Watson is currently being held at the Rutherford County Jail on a \$50,000 bond. He is due to appear in General Sessions Court March 7.

will be of minimal inconvenience to students.

The lounge area on the second floor of the KUC will be converted into a market and information center for students and visitors. The market is moving down from its previous location on the third floor.

Other renovations include a centralized mailroom and a student organizational workshop on the third floor.

"The most common complaint from students is that they 'don't know," Glenn said. "We are always looking for ways to improve communication with all student organizations."

Part of the third floor will be converted into much needed office space, because some staff are literally working out of closets, Glenn said.

There are still many uncertainties in the plans for the new university center.

Glenn said the specific details of what will be included, the amount of money that is going to be spent and the location are a few of those uncertainties.

"I feel, very passionately, that we need a new student union in the worst possible way," he said.

Glenn's vision for the new university center includes a \$45 million building on the site that is currently an intramural field east of Corlew Hall and the Business and Aerospace Building.

He hopes the new student union will be one stop shopping for students.

"Currently, if students want to do business, they have to travel all over campus - from Cope to

the Murphy Center to the KUC," Glenn said

He hopes the new center will serve students more conveniently. ends. "We can't go forward in the

absence of a president," Glenn said, explaining the greatest uncertainty of the new center. "He or she has to say, 'Yes, we need it,' and then work and get it done."

The greatest benefit Glenn sees in a new university center is an improved community life.

"A significant number of students use MTSU like an ATM machine," Glenn said. "They buzz in and do what they have to and then leave as quickly as possible

"If we want to be one of the premier universities in the state, we have to have a community life, and the student union is the spark that makes that happen." •

From the Editor University should be more careful in hiring criminals

Early Monday morning, MTSU Public Safety officers arrested Reginald Watson for allegedly burglarizing a Coke machine in Clements Hall.

The police also suspect that Watson was connected with another burglary in the James Union Building earlier that same night.

After the arrest, police discovered that Watson was a convicted felon in Maryland and was on parole. He also was arrested in Nashville for shoplifting last November.

Basically, the guy is a career criminal, which is not uncommon or surprising.

What is surprising is that he was hired by the university and Aramark Dining Services to work in the JUB cafeteria.

Does the university not screen employees for criminal backgrounds? Working on a college campus is similar to working at a daycare. Most students are sent here by their parents. During Customs – the orientation program for new students – parents are repeatedly assured that this institution is one of the safest in the area.

One would think that in order to keep that image and reputation, employee screening would be more of a priority.

The JUB burglary hits especially close to home for me. The burglary is thought to have occurred in the early morning hours on Monday, just after the *Sidelines* staff and myself left the building.

Well, most of us.

My online editor was still in the building when 1 left. When she was leaving she heard footsteps in the hallway, but she just assumed it was a custodial worker.

The custodial crew actually didn't enter the building until later that night, so presumably, the footsteps that were heard were those of the suspect.

The suspect is thought to have used a crowbar to jimmy the vending machine and the doors to two faculty offices right down the hall from our newsroom.

My point is that my online editor could have been harmed had the suspect walked a few more feet down the hall and attacked. Then I would have had to run a bloody photo of a co-worker and friend on the front page.

I just wish the university would be more responsible in its hiring methods. This simple burglary could have been much more devastating.


People, not guns, are the problem

I went to a gun show this weekend. As I perused all the AR-15s, the Ruger 10/22s and admired a six-foot long .50-caliber bolt action "squirrel gun," I began to meditate on one of America's most important and defining freedoms: the freedom to keep and bear arms.

I've heard the arguments about what our forefathers "really meant" about crime and the danger guns present to children. I'm not going to go into figures and statistics, but after doing some research on this subject, and I will comment upon these issues.

Some scholars claim the phrase "being necessary" in the Second Amendment is a conditional phrase meaning "as long as it is necessary." There are linguists who make claims for both sides of this argument, but use a bit of your own reasoning for this one. Think about what kind of people the founding fathers were and the philosophies they followed. Do you really think they ever intended for U.S. citizens to be disarmed? Not a chance.

The assumption that gun control will decrease crime is one of the most widely held misconceptions about firearms. The record shows there is less crime in places where law-abiding citizens are allowed to carry guns. Put yourself in the shoes of an average criminal. Are you willing to put your



life on the line to get your hands on some illegally gained goodies? I think not.

An unarmed victim would be much preferred. Also, there are some who think making guns illegal will keep them out of the wrong hands. This idea would work about as well as Prohibition and the war on drugs. Why would a criminal care if something is illegal?

The accidental death of a child is a tragedy. A number of children die from firearm accidents every year. This is probably the most emotionally compelling argument against guns, but the problem lies with a lack of guidance for children with regards to firearms, not the firearms themselves. My father owns probably ten guns, and as a child I would have NEVER touched one of them without the expressed permission of my dad. They were all kept in a locked gun cabinet, except for a revolver in the nightstand drawer on each side of my parents' bed. However, I was taught not to go nosing around in other people's things. Therefore, I never even knew about them until I was old enough to handle a gun unsupervised.

I guess, what bothers me the most about this whole issue is the movement to blame an inanimate object for people's misdeeds. If all the guns magically disappeared tomorrow, criminals would use clubs, people would have fatal accidents playing around with knives and some people would want to ban swords. People are behind the problem, not guns.

But don't just take my word for it, or dismiss me as a nut. Spend an hour or two on the Internet looking at both pro- and anti-gun sites, as well as statistics from the Center for Disease Control and then come to your own decision.

I'm a strong advocate of people thinking for themselves. So I beg you not to blindly follow any side, for any issue, ever. Reason is perhaps humanity's greatest asset. If everyone used it, we would be closer to having a perfect world where weapons of any kind would be considered nothing more than quaint anachronisms. Until then, do as I do and hope for the best – but prepare for the worst.


Parking at MTSU: Where's the service?

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I understand that a large concrete

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

ing subplots, but I have to admit I was entertained. All the bad elements came together as a whole to make it a fun movie to sit around and watch with a few friends and laugh at.

Groove opens in a dimly lit warehouse in the middle of San Francisco, where a few friends have decided to throw a small rave, by word of e-mail. From there you are introduced to a number of people who are either involved in the planning of the party or going to it. This is when my favorite character in the film, David, is introduced.

Played by Hamish Linklater, David is a struggling writer who is not sure he wants to go with his brother Colin to the party. The funniest scenes in the movie happen after David drops ecstasy

for the first time and doesn't quite know what he's getting into. His acting is so bad that I found myself laughing after most of his lines.

The action finally shifts to the actual party, which is filled with drinking, brightly clothed, affecqualities of the "raver" are shown again and again, as if they wanted to make sure you noticed that they know what it's like at a real rave. This is when all the subplots at the party begin to unfold, such as a hilarious DJ rivalry, trouble from the police, drug use and wedding proposals. Most of it's really boring and not worth going into much detail about.

The best thing about this film is the soundtrack. Everything from house, trance, and drum and bass music is spun by the DJs at the party, most of which is pretty good. World famous DJ Digweed makes a guest appearance near the end of the film, when he comes in to save the party late in the morning hours. There's a real funny scene after he plays his set, where the beginner turntablist DJ Spaz, who was shown earlier in the film struggling with his craft, sees Digweed and gushes out pathetically, "Can 1 touch you?

The only theme that I could really draw from Groove, is that it's good to use drugs, as long as it's responsibly. At the party, one user says to the other, "If you're going to be a successful drug user, you have to be informed." Another raver, who is smoking marijuana, encounters someone wasted on ecstasy and quickly

states, "Stay baked, not fried, it's the healthy choice." There's more dialogue about drugs which really starts to get stale 30 minutes into the film.

This is just one of those movies that I can't really recommend to you, but I also can't say it's a complete waste of time. For example, I laughed a lot during the film, not at the intended jokes, but at the acting. Groove falls into that category of films that is so bad it's fun to watch. People who have been to a rave in real life might especially get a kick out of all the cliches that are marched around in the film.

This is the one movie that I know of that focuses completely on rave culture. I can only hope that if there are going to be more, substance will prevail over style next time.

Campbell grew up as the daughter of a Baptist minister singing hymns, yet this is the folk artists first "gospel" record.

Growing up in the eye of the civil rights movement of the 1960s no doubt formed her character and morphed her music into a mix of folk, soul, R&B and Southern rock.

The 30-year-old artist got her recording start in Muscle Shoals' Fame Studio in Alabama. When spurred for the idea to do her fifth album, she headed back to her roots.

without ceasing." Apparently, if you continuously pray "Lord Jesus Christ, have mercy on me," you will eventually be consumed with the Holy Spirit.



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
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
