The national Service Life Insurance fund now totals \$6,959,-000,000. Estimates of surplus to be split up as dividends out of this fund run up to \$2,000,000,-

Early in September the VA said it probably would disclose the surplus early this month. Now it says, officially, that rechecking of errors will delay the statement until mid-November.


