





Successful graduates of this on the steering committee of the orientation course will receive reserve Marine Corps commissions and be ordered to active duty as student aviators. Upon completion of Flight Training, which lasts from 15 to 18 months, they will be obligated to serve a minimum of two years with the air arm of the Marine Corps.

Although this new program will result in an increase in directly commissioned Marine aviators, it does not indicate lowered standards or a departure from the traditional Marine Corps air-ground partinership. The new program will be a different approach to the same standards.

The orientation course prior to flight training is intended to familiarize prospective fliers in Marine infantry theories, and is expect-ed to reinforce the air-ground relationship.

Applications for the Marine Aviation Officer Candidate Course will be accepted commencing today. Twenty-ine Officer Procurement Officers located at major cities throughout the country will be authorized to accept applications. It is expected that the first session will convene at Quantico this fall, with a second one after the new year.

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
