The underlying cause for the war which now exists between the United States and Japan is rivalry for territory and trade in the Pacific. The immediate cause is as every one knows, the attack upon American territory on December 7 by the air and naval forces of Japan.

The United States is a Pacific power with her holdings of Alaska. Hawaii, Guam, Wake, the Philippines and other small islands. The island possessions have furnished a bridge from Hawaii to the southern coast of China. In addition to these territories the United States is interested in the trade of the Far East. The croquet player, one of those fellows whom Americans would call meates Cainsmarsh where he has logy, the cave man, and even religion is accused of being responsible for the conditions that cause a man to beat his poor feeble wife death. Suspicion is everywhere present in Cainsmarsh and even Dr. Finchatton who came to this region as a normal person becomes doped with the ears just as the jungle guest falls victim to malaria.

The psychiatrist, Dr. Norbett, informs the croquet player that the entire story about Cainsmarsh has existed only in Finchatton's mind. With this explanation the reader begins to wonder it is Finchatton or himself who needs the services of a psychiatrist. Adroitly the author pictures this one man's mental case as the key to a panic which has seized the thoughts of the civilized world and against which there is no physical struggle, but a panic from which each individual must make his own escape.




