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An updated 'Alfie' makes for a hollow remake

In many ways, Alfie hasn't changed much in the past 38 years. He still lives in a hole-in-the-wall apartment so he can afford the best clothes. He still works for a limo service so he can drive the finest cars. He still talks directly to the camera, thinking he can seduce us as easily as the countless women in his wake, and as a result, we still see Alfie at his darkest and most lonely moments.

His journey, which includes a single mom, a cancer scare, an abortion and a sex-crazed older woman, still ends with the famous question, "What's it all about?"

Alfie may be more or less the same, but the world he lives in is not. Since the original Alfie in 1966 the sexual revolution has come and gone, and more than one generation has been raised with words like "sexism" and "male chauvinist pig." In this 2004 version of Alfie the female characters are stronger, simply because they can be.

The single mom (played here by Marisa Tomei) doesn't need a father for her son as she did in 1966; she can throw Alfie out for cheating on her, and as these things usually play out, Alfie does not realize how much he loves her

until it's too late.

The abortion that Alfie arranges after an affair with his friend's wife, illegal in 1966 London, is the emotional climax of the original film. In the remake, which has been relocated to 2004 Manhattan, the abortion is still the emotional climax, but it has an outcome and impact that is different in a welcomed way.

The only woman who seems to understand Alfie is the sexy older woman played by Susan Sarandon, a character improved upon in the remake because she is allowed to be an Alfie-like character in her own right instead of a comically desperate sexpot.

Alfie is a more sensitive bloke this time around. Jude Law does not have the cold Cockney edge that Michael Caine brought to the character in the original, but perhaps that's a sign of the times.

Caine's Alfie referred to women by the "it" pronoun and was not afraid of a little domestic violence when needed. It's hard to imagine Law getting away with that in 2004.

The remake gives Alfie a father figure by way of an old man named Joe, who turns up for two scenes to impart such hackneyed wisdom as "Live every day as if it were your last." A much more interesting father figure is found on the film's soundtrack in the presence of Mick Jagger, a real-life Alfie if there ever was one.


The problem with Alfie is that there should be no point in comparing the original to the remake. Many of you reading this would not even have been aware that this is a remake.

On the other hand, it is the novelty and knowledge of the original that keeps the remake afloat. Alfie has had many successors over the years, the best of which include John Cusack in High Fidelity and Hugh Grant in About a Boy, both films from British novelist Nick Hornby.

The plot points of the original have since become sitcom standards, and if this remake did not have the *Alfie* brand it would pass by unnoticed. *



Photo provided by imdb.com The dreamy Jude Law stars in the updated version of 'Alfie.' The film is currently playing in a theater near you.





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
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Page 80 wows Murfreesboro-ites through infectious lyrics and style

P 80: Stadiums.


JF: Simply stadiums?

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
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Latest Pixar release lives up to its title

The Incredibles is the sixth-straight winner from the geniuses at Pixar; the animation studio that brought us Toy Story, A Bug's Life, Monsters Inc. and Finding Nemo.

They're responsible for about half of the films included in the pantheon of recent CGI animated films, though they're not to be confused with Dreamworks PDI; the brains behind the *Shrek* films and *Antz*. Between the two animation studios, the most discernable difference would be Dreamworks' tendency to let a few mild expletives slip into their films whereas Pixar is squeaky clean and profanity-free.

However, the studios' differences go deeper than this surface comparison. Dreamworks' cast lists reads like a roster of A-list celebrities while Pixar seems more concerned with employing talented voice actors for the job. Pixar is also a few good steps ahead of Dreamworks in the animation department, with their films inspiring awe from the realistic nature of a head of hair down to the detail paid to a piece of broccoli on a dinner plate. As a matter of fact, when Pixar's The Incredibles is stacked up against Dreamwork's mondo hit, Shrek 2 (the reigning box office champion of 2004), Mr. Incredible and his clan beat out the friendly green ogre in just about every way imaginable.

As the film opens, we are introduced to Mr. Incredible; a barrel-chested, egocentric super hero who can multi-task rescuing an elderly woman's kitten and stop a band of thieves with just enough time to save a speeding train from derailing. However, Mr. Incredible's brawny brand of law enforcement is put to an abrupt end when lawsuits start targeting anyone saving the day in spandex tights. It seems that ungrateful civilians are blaming these super human do-gooders for property damage and coming to the rescue of people who didn't want to be saved.

Under the aid of the Superhero Relocation Program, Mr. Incredible is shipped off into a life of suburban anonymity where he and his wife (formerly known as the rubber-limbed Elastigirl) live under the alter-egos of Bob and Helen Parr. In

their drab new identities they struggle to raise a hyperactive little boy with powers of supersonic speed and an awkward

who obtains two powers appropriate for the life of an angst-ridden adolescent; she can create impenetrable force fields and turn invisible at will. Of course, the film doesn't spend its entirety following the hum-drum life of Mr. Incredible working as a pencil-pushing claims adjuster while Elastigirl handles the laundry. When a maniacal tyrant named Syndrome lures the family out of obscurity, *The Incredibles* launches into a series of breakneck action sequences, showing just how state-of-theart digital animation has become.

The Incredibles is a visually dazzling film, but it's also emotionally resonant and there's certainly a maturity that permeates the film that wasn't featured in Pixar's more kiddie-targeted Finding Nemo.

A message of post-Sept. 11, 2001 unity will fly right over youngsters' heads, as will the film's frustration with extraordinary people being forced to hide their gifts to better blend into society.

"They keep coming up with ways to celebrate mediocrity," Mr. Incredible exclaims upon hearing of his son's fourth-grade graduation ceremony. One can probably imagine what Mr. Incredible would have to say concerning Tennessee parents' recent attempt to ban the honor roll. Preceding The Incredibles is a trailer giving us a glimpse at Cars; the next Pixar film slated for release.

I admit, my initial reaction was to wonder how a film chronicling the secret lives of classic automobiles could possibly live up to their current superhero opus.

However, given the studio's track record, the odds are probably in Pixar's favor that *Cars* will be just as witty and ambitious as its predecessors.

As for *The Incredibles*, I can't think of a single reason why anyone wouldn't immensely enjoy this film. *


