More than fifty stations will carry the CBS "Eddie Arnold Show." with a cast of 35 musicians and comedians directly from the state college to more than 50 CBS stations over the nation.

Reserve seats for the auditorium show are available for the show from 9 until 9:30 and may also be used to gain admittance to the stadium for the latter part of the show, which will also be carried on the national hook-up.

All proceeds of the show will go to the Raider-Tiger Club.

The Eddie Arnold troupe opened a transcontinental tour two weeks ago at Madison Square Garden. Last week they played in Washington, D C., and this week will use the local facilities as an outlet for their program before proceeding on to the West Coast.






