





With Christmas holidays drawing near, the Buchanan Players of Middle Tennessee State College are putting the finishing touches on their present to the school and the entertainment list for many stu-


The theater is similar to the Circle Theatre in Nashville which has acquired such county-wide fame. It is also a far cry from the arena theater which MTSC had last year.







A pilot in the Air Force, he plans to continue flying after graduation as a commercial air lines pilot.






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
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
