The Committee offers the following suggestions for horing the work in the Student Union Building on Middle essee State College campus:

There must not be any posters, signs, or other decora we materials attached to the walls or doors, inside outside of the Union Building.

ulletin announcements must be uniform in sizex 11 inches. If larger bulletins are placed on sards, the director of the Union Building shall take om off. Mrs. Felder will supervise all bulletin mards in the Union Building.

No groups or individuals shall move any item of armiture from its present location to another place in the Union Building, without permission from the hostess of the building, or from the President of the

Every group holding an assembly in a room in the new Union Building and moving any item of furniture into that room, must see that every item is taken back to the place from which it was taken in the

No dishes or other items of equipment shall be takon from the lunch room or cafeteria, except by persion from the cafeteria manager or the President

Evelyn Felder is in charge of all lounges, assembly rooms and play rooms, foilets, etc. and serves hostess for the building.

The Union Building shall be open every night until 9.00 P. M., except on Friday and Saturday nights which shall be until 10:45 P. M. The Sunday night closing time shall be 7:00 P. M.

A trophy case shall be constructed and placed in the hall near the entrance to the dance hall and all tro-

phies collected and placed under lock and key.

9. Fun night shall not be held in the Tennessee Room, but in the Old Gymnasium. Friday and Saturday night gatherings shall be held either in the Old Gymnasium, Recreation Room of the Union Building, or the dormitory lounges.

10. Equipment used in the Recreation Room of the Union Building shall be stored in a designated room under lock and checked out to individuals or groups by Mrs. Felder or someone designated by her. The person signing for equipment shall be held responsible for any item and pay for it if it is not returned.


THE PEN IS MIGHTIER


