

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Sidelines Wins First Honors

First class honor rating has been accorded the Middle Tennessee State University SIDELINES for the first semester publication of the student weekly newspaper. Jane Francis Edmonds of Murfreesboro and Jerre Hookey of South Pittsburg were co-editors of the publication during the winter semester. Mr. Hookey was succeeded in Novmber by Ann Norman of Chattanooga who is currently the managing editor of the SIDELINES. Bette Moody of Nashville was business manager.

The SIDELINES received the top possible score in editorials, sports writing, mast-head usage, printing, and creativeness. The newspaper was rated very good on news coverage, balance of stories, vitality, style, editorial page features, editorial page, make-up, use of action pictures, inside news pages, and headline style and writing.

The paper had a total score of 3,230 points of a possible 4,000 points by the Associated Collegiate Press Newspaper Critical Service of the University of Minnesota of Journalism.


Terrace Room Accounting Open Until 10 Majors







The Raider track team opened its Spring season April 10 at Greenville, South Carolina by placing second in the Piedmont Relays. Although the Raiders won only one first place, which was for the year at nine wins and two Brian Oldfield's toss of the shot put, the Raiders won enough second and third places to end up a very strong second.

Last Tuesday, April 20, the Raiders opened the dual meet Badacour of MTSU with a 275 out season with a 971/2-471/2 win over Austin Peay at Clarksville. This of a posisble 300. Oldfield won both the shot put and discus, while Mallard won the 100 yarddash, tied for first in the high jump, and was on the winning Rounding out the shooters for 440 relay team.

This season the Raider Cindermen are led by the unbeatable Brian Oldfield who is the current (OVC, TIAC) record holder in and Mary Lockhart with 234. shot put. Other Raider standouts are Junior Ward (broad jump), Maxie Boles (triple jump), George Claxton (hurdles) and the 1 mile and 440 relay team.

To date, the baseball team's record stands even at 6-6. But in the well-balanced OVC, the Raiders are still in very strong contention for the Western Division Championship.

This season the Raiders are proving to be one of the best hitting teams in the OVC. With the season half over, the Raider batsmen are sticking the ball for a very good .288 team average.

Raider standouts thus far have been Teddy Morris who is leading the team in batting with an average of .400. He is followed by Bill McKinley at .333. Rick Howell and Richard Davenport are tied for the team lead in R.B.I.'s with 11 each.

As usual the Raider Linksmen continue to dominate the link through out Tennessee and the OVC, as they have extended their winning stretch to 50 straight dual wins. Also during the Spring Holidays, the Raider Linksmen recaptured the TIAC golf championship over a field open to all schools in the state of Tennessee.

The latest Raider win came over Vanderbilt last Wednesday -this was No. 50. In this match Bob Wolfe lead the Raiders with a two under par 70.

Coach Buck Bouldin's tennis team is continuing the winning ways of the Raiders Spring sports by sporting a fine 7-2 record.

This is only a promise of things to come from our tennis team for it is composed entirely of Freshman and Sophomores.






