George Howse, a former MTSC student and a recently-naturalized English citizen, was acclaimed by the Lackland Air Base, San Antonio, Texas, as the airman of his class "best expressing the American Spirit."

Howse's mother, Mrs. Helen I. Eagan, 611 Crestland Ave., reseived the letter of announcement which states:

"It gives me great pleasure to inform you that your son, George, has been selected as the outstanding airman in his graduating class and is to receive the American Spirit honor medal, which will be presented at a formal ceremony.

"Your son has distinguished himself as an airman and as a citizen in uniform. We are proud to have him as a member of our organization."

Because George received his citizenship papers just a short time before he went into Air Force May 4 of this year, this honor is particularly significant. He came here from South Hampton, England, two years ago, a graduate of the Lindisfarme College in north England.
