Dean Beasley Correct Quote Concerning B Certification

B Average In Education Required For Masters' States N. C. Beasley

Dean N. C. Beasley, who was quoted in a feature story appearing recently in The Nashville Tennessean, as stating that education majors at MTSC had to maintain a average in their education courses has stated that there was a misunderstanding by the reporter in the interview. The story was quoted in the April 23 SIDELINES and provoked a storm of inquiries directed to the SIDELINES office.

Dean Beasley was attending the National Association of Admission Officers and College Registrars in Cincinnatti at the time the story was published.

It is true that graduate students working towards a Master's degree in education must maintain the B average. Requirements for undergraduate certification have not been changed.

Dean Beasley has called attention to a recent television program in which Dr. James B. Conant, expresident of Harvard and now director of the study of problems facing the schools of America today, was interviewed by Ed Murrow on the "Person to Person Program"

With spring sports at its half-way mark, the Blue Raiders have shown their strength and stamina by holding their own against common foes.

Golf and track teams show the brighest accomplishments since each team has only lost once. Coach Elbert Patty's golf team holds started what is known as golf at a record of eight and one, which the Blue and White Thinlies have

Blue Raider golfers, at the present time, are in Athens, Georgia, Midgett, who was the first golf to participate in the Southern Intercollegiate Tournament which is coach at the Raider institution, composed of all major colleges and university in this part of the country.

Coach Joe Black Hayes' trackers kicked up their heels in a recent meet with Western Kentucky as several school and OVC records were smashed. Ray Purvis lowered the time in the 220 yard dash by chalking-off an amazing 22.3 to set a new school record. Marvin Jinnette has been acting like a Sputnik in the past two meets by leaping through space to establish new records for the school and in the OVC. Marvin jumped 22' 8" against Western to break the existing OVC broad jump mark by 41/2 inches. He has also tied the high jump record of 6'3".

Captain Ed Carson showed his stuff as he broke his own high and low hurdles records by running like "wildfire". He clipped five seconds from his present low hurdle mark with a 24.5 and posted a good time in the highs with a performance of 15.2.

Bob Reed showed his stamina against Austin Peay State College this past week by setting a new record in the two-mile run, as he bettered his old mark by ten seconds, with a 10:31.1.

The baseball team is having bad luck this season and are 0-5 at the present time, but should catch fire one of these days and win their first game of the season. The main reason for such a bad showing is the lack of pitching. They seem to hit the ball well enough to win, but maybe their hits just don't come at the right time.

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
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
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Authority Speaks On Teen Fiction At Librarian Meet

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
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
