Rutledge residents protest new hall director's actions

A meeting between Rutledge Hall

residents and the Director of Housing culminated in a march to President Walker's doorstep Tuesday night

Around midnight, approximately 92 outraged women congregated in the Rutledge Hall lobby to express their complaints about Rutledge Hall Director, Cheryl Cooley.

The dorm residents demanded a meeting with the Director of Housing to defend their RA's against what they feel is an unfair hall director.

"We only have three RA's, and two of them are moving out as we speak," said Tammy Lace, Rutledge resident.

"I think they are being asked to leave because they listened to our complaints about Cheryl and tried to do something about it," she said.

Nancy Aiken, a resident assistant, said she believes that a RA's job is to hear

complaints and then act as mediator between them and superiors within the housing department.

"When Cheryl found out people were complaining about her, I think she thought the RA's instigated the problem," said Aiken.


Some residents are accusing Cooley of breaking very serious rules.

"We couldn't find her for one hour and a half one day when she was supposed to be working," said Jennifer Carr, a dorm resident. "Even security was looking for her," Carr said.

"When I came back to my dorm room Monday from visiting my hometown for the weekend, my door was unlocked," said Lace.

"Cheryl told me she went in to shut my window. However, my window was still open and my alarm clock had been broken," Lace said.

"I've even seen Cheryl with her ear up against a girl's door-eavesdropping," said Amy Gross.

Starting this spring students will be able to use their IDs to receive discounts at local businesses as part of "MTSU: Blue", a joint program of the Rutherford County Chamber of Commerce and the Student Government Association.

"The university produces roughly \$250 million for the community," said Woody Ratterman, president of the SGA. "I feel the community owes the students something for that."

The "MTSU: Blue" program is one of many the University Relations Committee, a new committee in the Chamber of Commerce, is sponsoring to encourage the community to become more involved in campus events.

The committee hosted a "Rally in the Alley" back in August where members of the community were encouraged to buy season tickets to Raider home games and attend other events.


"Our idea is to forge a strong town-and-gown relationship," said Ralph Vaughn, executive director of the Chamber of Commerce. "We're doing this as a service to the community and to the students."

In January, students will receive a published list of businesses that offer a discount on their products and/or services. In addition, the "MTSU: Blue" decal in store windows or at cash registers indicates a participating merchandiser. Just showing their ID grants students, faculty and staff a 10-20 percent discount.

Using ID's eliminates the cost of printing extra cards for students to use. The Chamber is presently surveying businesses in hope they will be willing to give a discount.

Class size reduction may not be effective in helping students

A twelve million dollar study sponsored by the Tennessee State Legislature has shown that class size reduction may not be the most effective way to improve education.

The study, Project STAR (Student/Teacher Achievement Ratio), reduced class size in grades K-3 across the state, from rural areas to inner-city schools.

For the most part, student improvement levels were not great enough to justify the huge amount of money needed for class reduction. Some feel that the money could be better spent elsewhere.

Former State Representative Steve Cobb suggests that the results of Project STAR show that class size reduction is not the key to better education in Tennessee. Instead, Cobb suggests other measures, such as extending the school year by one month and researching effective classroom teaching that is more costeffective for taxpayers.

Cobb introduced the project to the Tennessee Legislature in 1985, and the study was completed in 1989 and published in 1990.

Andrew Jackson The Institute, which researches and analyzes issues affecting Tennessee, commissioned Cobb to report the findings of project STAR.

"I think he [Steve Cobb] was surprised at what he found. He was a big supporter of class size reduction, and he expected greater improvement," said Nelson Griswold, president of the institute.

The study showed only a three percent improvement c.1 the Stanford Standard Achievement test.

Reducing class size is a costly process. The twelve million dollars used to fund Project STAR was divided between actual class reduction and funds for research, with only two million going to the latter. The costs would obviously

increase if class size reduction were taken on a larger scale.

The results from project STAR seem to point in one direction: look for other ways to improve education. Even so, Governor McWherter's Better Education Plan enacted after the results from Project STAR were available, emphasizing class size reduction as a key means of better educating young Tennesseans.

"Class size reduction means more teachers, and others would benefit as well," Griswald said. "What Mr. Cobb's study focused on was the improvement in students and not how people with special interests would benefit. A study like this is obviously going to have it's supporters and it's naysayers."

Though the study was done on grades K-3 only, the results will effect students and institutions at all levels.

Developmental Studies is one of the largest departments at MTSU - proof that something must be done in education on a basic level.

The fraternity is currently working on a project that would encourage students to attend church with the brothers at least one Sunday out of the month.





Republicans check Democrats for mayoral and gubernatorial races

In races that were tight, tighter and not tight at all, Republicans swept up the three big prizes in off-year elections: mayor of New York, governor of New Jersey and governor of Virginia.

Rudolph Giuliani of New York, Christie Whitman of New Jersey and George Allen of Virginia did it by bucking trends on a day that was generally kind to Democrats and incumbents.

Among Tuesday's results, Californians soundly rejected a school voucher initiative that was generally backed by conservatives; incumbents won mayoral races in Seattle, Houston and Cleveland; and new Democratic mayors were elected in Boston and Pittsburgh, among other places.

Those votes all went as expected. But the New Jersey, New York and Virginia races trampled the conventional wisdom.

Thousands of Southern California acres destroyed in wildfires

MALIBU, Calif. (AP) — Savage winds sent waves of fire raging over canyon ranches and seaside mansions in this celebrity hideaway, forcing thousands to load up their Jaguars and Jeeps and crowd onto gridlocked highways.

It was Southern California's seventh day of wildfires. Twice in a week, firestorms have gutted whole neighborhoods.

Two men were near death late

Tuesday. As many as 100 homes were destroyed, and 20,000 acres of rugged canyon, pricey homes and sprawling horse ranches were black.

Flame-topped palm trees dotted the heavy smoke as the fire raced out of control from Santa Monica Mountain canyons 12 miles inland, to the edge of the Pacific Ocean.

Packwood prepares for court battle as Senate demands diaries

WASHINGTON (AP) — After a crushing defeat in the Senate, a defiant Sen. Bob Packwood is digging in for a court battle over shielding his diaries from lawmakers investigating alleged sexual misconduct and possible criminal wrongdoing.

A tortured two-day debate — during which one lawmaker urged the veteran Oregon Republican to "have the grace" to resign — culminated in a 94-6 Senate vote Tuesday night to force full disclosure of the diaries.

"I believe he has lost the grasp of what it means to be a U.S. senator," Sen. Robert C. Byrd, D-W.Va., told a Senate chamber ringing with echoes of the Clarence Thomas-Anita Hill hearings two years ago.

"None of us is without flaws," the former majority leader declared. "But when those flaws damage the institution of the Senate, it is time to have the grace to go."

Airline industry to use companies for prevention of terrorism WASHINGTON (AP) — The government is going along with airline industry requests to ease airport security requirements during terrorist alerts such as those prompted by the Persian Gulf War and the World Trade Center bombing.

The proposed changes include allowing airports to use private security guards for some patrol activities now done by police and permitting curbside baggage check-ins, which generally are suspended during full alerts.

The Federal Aviation Administration promises to be more selective in ordering terrorist countermeasures that "would impose relatively high operational and economic burdens on airports and air carriers," according to a copy of the stillsecret plan obtained by The Associated Press.

The FAA and the airline industry say the changes were proposed to save the industry money and cut red tape but won't affect passenger safety. "We are maintaining our ability to respond to any threat," said one official who requested anonymity.

Two English eleven-year-olds tried for murder

PRESTON, England (AP) — For two 10-year-olds with a record for truancy, it began as an ordinary day — skipping school, hanging around a shopping mall, a bit of shoplifting.

It ended with the slow, painful murder of a 2-year-old, prosecutors say.

On Tuesday, the second day of their trial for the abduction and murder of James Bulger in Liverpool on Feb. 12, prosecutor Richard Henriques told of two friends' idle boredom turning to violence.

The pudgy dark-haired boys, now 11, are the youngest children to be charged in Britain with murder. The press is allowed to identify them only as Child A and Child B, though their names are used in court.


Defeat of Jerusalem's mayor brings fears of greater tension


JERUSALEM (AP) — The defeat of Mayor Teddy Kollek, celebrated peacemaker and builder of modern Jerusalem, raised fears of a new era of conflict between Arabs and Jews and between religious and secular.

Ending Kollek's 28-year stewardship of the ancient city was Ehud Olmert, a 48year-old conservative lawyer who opposes concessions to the Arabs in peace negotiations and made an election alliance with the ultra-religious United Torah Judiasm.

With one-third of the vote counted today, Olmert had 54 percent to Kollek's 41 percent. Smaller parties divided the rest of the vote.

The mayor has no role in talks over the future status of Jerusalem but can set the tone for relations between Arabs and Israelis in a city with a hair-trigger temper when it comes to religion and politics.





MTSU ranks among top schools for black students

NASHVILLE, Tenn. (AP) — A national survey of colleges and universities cites Middle Tennessee State University and Tennessee Tech among the best schools in the nation for black students.

Not listed were Tennessee State University and Fisk University, predominantly black schools in Nashville.

The survey is "The 100 Best Colleges for African-American Students," a college guide published by Plume, a division of Penguin Books.

The book salutes Tennessee Tech's scholarship, sports and Army and Air Force ROTC programs. The Cookeville school has 280 blacks in its enrollment of 8,160.

Angelo Volpe, Tennessee Tech's president, was delighted by the book's findings.

"Our faculty and staff have worked extremely hard to create an environment that would be attractive to African-American students," he said. "Inclusion this year in (the college guide) indicates that our efforts university-wide have not gone unnoticed."

majority and minority students and for administrative efforts to get students of all races involved in campus organizations.

Roughly 10 percent or 1,443 of MTSU's 15,691 students are black.

Said school president James Walker:

"Obviously we're honored to be among those institutions in the new college guide book. MTSU has long been pleased to have an excellent group of African-American students among its student body as well as some very excellent faculty."

Erlene Wilson, the book's author, mailed a survey to institutions that already had achieved top ranking for academics and educational value in other publications.

The book profiles 100 colleges and universities who completed the survey.

Fisk President Henry Ponder said the school did not make the list apparently because it did not participate in the survey.

"It's kind of like the Kentucky Derby," he said. "In order to have a chance to win, you have to have a horse in the race. We didn't have a horse in the race.

"I don't believe we've filled out any survey."

But he defended Fisk as among the very best schools in the country.

"Fisk is one of the best colleges for any student to attend," Ponder said. "We give a good liberal arts education. It's second to none."

Tennessee State president James Hefner did not return repeated phone calls for comment on the book.



Local schools request new stadium

Riverdale and Oakland high school officials have stated that they would like to stop using Horace Jones field and Johnny (Red) Floyd stadium for their games and have their own home field as well as their own concessions when they host opponents.

In a proposal made during a meeting of the Rutherford County Commission, plans to build a new high school with a stadium was discussed.

The stadium would be used by all of the Murfreesboro area high schools.

Presently, Horace Jones field is used for all home games played by the Riverdale Warriors and Oakland Patriots, as well as Central Middle school's games.

While the schools do not harbor any ill feelings toward MTSU, they want a place they can use for all sports instead of just football. They would also like to be in the position to receive all of the money from ticket sales and concessions. At Jones field, the university has control over the operation of the concession stands. However, the schools get 25 percent of the gross profit from the concessions.

"That's money that is just given to them," Blue Raider Athletic Association director Larry Counts said. "They don't have to do anything."

Both schools pay MTSU a fee to use the stadium. Riverdale has to pay over \$4,000 a year, and Oakland's principal estimates that the school pays at least \$5,000 to \$7,000 a year. These figures do not include fees for parking attendants, security, public address and announcers.

Another major cost in the use of Jones field for Riverdale and Oakland's games is transportation. The schools have to use busses to drive the team, band and cheerleaders to the stadium. If the schools had their own stadium their students could come to the games on their own.

The Cookeville Cavaliers are in a somewhat similar situation. For the past several years, they have used Overall field on the campus of Tennessee Tech University for their home football games.

Tom Parker, a Cookeville principal, said that Putnam county is also planning to build a new high school and stadium for its football games, track meets and other events. But because their financial agreement with Tennessee Tech is slightly different, such as the operation of the concession stands by the high school band boosters, their move will be for different reasons.

"Basically, we just want our own," Parker said. "We feel like to build some pride and some ownership in the program we need our own facility."

Riverdale and Oakland have also had some problems with the university not allowing them to use the stadium for events other than football games, such as track meets. Parker said that his school has never had any problems of that nature with Tech, but a new stadium will allow the Cavaliers to use their field as much as they want.

Sidelines has spent enough space on the parking issue

Once again the parking dilemma on MTSU's campus finds a place in *Sidelines*. This makes the third time in one semester. Haven't we dwindled away enough time and space on this issue?

In the Sept. 23 issue of the paper, Mr. Wakeland vented his frustration (for the second time) with the lack of available parking spots, primarily in reference to commuters. I am a commuter from Nashville and have experienced the inconvenience of having to walk an extra block or so, but what puzzles me is that I continue to see space given to such a "dead-horse" topic.

In one of the first Sidelines issues from this fall, the parking problem was addressed. It was a timely piece that was pertinent to the hustle and bustle of the start of a new semester. After all, by the time you complete registration and fee payments, stand in line for a photo i.d., and then decide on whether or not you want to pay \$10 for a black tag or \$25 for a green tag, the last thing you want to deal with is not being able to find a parking spot that you paid for. Seeing an article on this dilemma probably found a lot of readers exclaiming "AMEN!" But it's now almost Nov. 1 and it would be nice to think that we, as adult college students, would be able to focus our time more constructively on issues of a bit more depth. Like what, you ask? Like campus crimes such as rape and theft, the cost of rising tuition at the same time our classrooms are filled to capacity, student depression, a more effective job placement program for graduating seniors...and the list grows.

I am not saying that there isn't a parking problem at MTSU but until you attend other campuses in the United States you will never realize just how fortunate we are. I have spoken with transfer students from Texas, Florida and Minnesota. Each tells me their experiences with MTSU's parking systems is far more pleasurable than what they experienced at their previous school. I transferred from the University of Iowa to MTSU two years ago. When I arrived on this campus I felt like I'd stepped into another world. The U. of I. is located in Iowa City, Iowa and if you've ever been there you soon find out that in order to get around you do one of three things: take the bus, ride a bike or walk. Parking there is a precious commodity. Most days it took me twenty minutes to find a parking spot and then an additional twenty to thirty minutes (depending on the class location) to get across the expansive campus to class. Parking permits at this college were one flat rate of \$25. You didn't have an alternate choice. And, once inside your designated lot, you had to plug a meter or end up with an \$8 fine. I guess MTSU isn't as bad as we thought. At least we have a choice between a \$10 tag or a \$25 one

Mr. Wakeland, you have some alternatives to the problem which I must address. The first being, "make it illegal for freshmen living on campus to have automobiles." I take it from this statement you have successfully completed at least the first year of your undergraduate studies, for if you hadn't you most assuredly would not be pointing a finger at your own loss of freedom. Did you work off campus during your first year of college? If so, you probably know the importance of having your own transportation. Unlike Iowa City, Murfreesboro does not have a city transit

system that allows people without wheels a means of transport. If you don't believe me, ask a freshman.

Your second solution involved making more parking places. Have you ever heard the phrase, "You can't get blood out of a turnip?" Maybe the lot next to Family Housing could work but there are some that will argue for more available housing for the increasing numbers of students with families. As far as my eyes can decipher there just aren't many vacant lots waiting to be covered with asphalt for our parking pleasure. I suppose we could erect a parking ramp (being both an eye strain and pocketbook strain) but is this supposed to be a college or a mall?

Your final solution was to stop selling more permits than there are parking spaces. I thought about this but found some flaws. 

Luther comes to Murphy Center

I'll be producing some of the artists myself and supervising production on others."

No Luther Vandross collection would be complete without the artist adding his soulful touch to a classic tune or two. This time out, it's the BeeGees' 1977 #1 "How Deep Is Your Love" sequencing into an instrumental interlude of the Spinners' Love Don't Love Nobody" and finally the new album's title song "Never Let Me Go." A Top Ten R&B hit for the late Johnny Ace in 1954, "Never Let Mc Go" was recut in 1966 by the Van Dykes and again the next year by Aretha Franklin.

"I used to hear 'Never Let Me Go' at the amateur night talent shows at the Apollo Theater," Vandross recalls fondly. "There was a group who would sing each time they were on, and if you won four times - which they did - you got to do a whole week at the Apollo as an opening act

Nat added a super-viscious string arrangement, and by the end of the night we were all very happy with the result."

His first breakthrough in show business came in 1972 when his composition "Everybody Rejoice (A Brand New Day)" was included in the hit Broadway musical "The Wiz." Two years later, David Bowie asked Vandross to arrange and sing backgrounds on Bowie's Young Americans LP(which also included the Vandross song "Fascination") and for the subsequent tour. Through Bowie, Vandross met Bette Midler, he sang on her Songs For The New Depression and toured with "Miss M" as a backing vocalist.

Within a short time, Vandross was one of the industry's most in demand session

completed each song as we went along, and I purposely wrote new material that would be a real challenge vocally. Songs like 'Little Miracles,' 'Love Me Again' and 'Too Far Down' have a lot of dynamics" here he smiles - "and a lot of high notes! I wanted to give all I had to each song because that's how I felt. And I'm very proud of how this album turned out."

Luther Vandross has every reason to be proud of his accomplished career. Born on New York's Lower East Side, Vandross began playing piano at age three; during his

vocalists and vocal arrangers. He sang backgrounds for everyone from the Average White Band to Barbara Streisand; he sang lead on a pair of disco classics ("The Glow of Love" by Change and "Hot Butterfly" by Bionic Boogie) as well as on a host of national advertising jingles for major corporate clients. In 1975, Vandross formed his own progressive R&B group called Luther, which recorded two albums for the Atlantic subsidiary label Cortillion Records.

In 1981, Luther Vandross signed with

album "Never Too Much" - beginning a decade-plus run of chart-topping albums (double platinum and platinum) and hit singles. Over the past 12 years, Vandross has also produced and written hits for Whitney Houston, Aretha Franklin, Dionne Warwick, Cheryl Lynn and Teddy Pendergrass, among others.

1990 was a banner year: The two-disc anthology The Best of Luther Vandross, The Best Of Love became the artist's seventh platinum album and spun off the #1 R&B/Top Ten pop single "Here and Now." This landmark ballad earned Vandross his first Grammy Award, for Best R&B Male Vocal Performance. The following year, Vandross' Power Of Love climbed the chart heights, spawning the R&B chart topper and Top 5 pop smash "Power Of Love/Love Power." The song brought Vandross two more Grammy Awards, for best R&B Song and Best R&B Male Vocal Performance.

In September 1991, Luther Vandross began a national tour with Lisa Fischer, Sounds Of Blackness and Sinbad as supporting acts. The tour came to a triumphant end in January 1992 after playing to a combined audience of more than 650,000 for a total box office gross of more than \$15 million, including four soldout nights at New York's Madison Square Garden. Ultimately, all three musical artists on the "Power Of Love" tour were among the year's Grammy winners.

Over the course of the next eighteen months, Vandross co-hosted the "Soul Train" Music Awards and saw his duet with Janet Jackson, "The Best Things In Life Are Free," climb into the pop Top Ten and to #1 on the R&B charts as well as earning a 1992 Grammy nomination for Best R&B Performance By A Duo Or Group With Vocal. Vandross will make his acting debut in the summer of '93 with the release of Robert Townsend's "Meteor Man", and will take his new music directly to the people with a spring tour of Europe, to be followed by a major U.S. tour beginning in the fall.

"When I write and record, it's an opportunity for me to express through music what I imagine to be the feelings of many people," says Vandross. "Of course, the songs on Never Let Me Go are about what I've experienced or would like to experience - from 'Too Far Down,' which is a word to the wise for people experiencing emotional adversity, to 'Little Miracles (Happen Every Day),' a song about hope for the future. But as much as I wrote these songs for myself, I also wrote them for my listeners to enjoy."

Never Let Me Go is a new chapter in the enduring legacy of one of the great artists of popular music: Luther Vandross.

Eric and Dan met in Los Angeles ut a decade age when they were both ng songwriters, working in an rtainment restaurant as singing waiters. ntually, a friendship grew out of a tive pact. They formed a band called Times," named for a line in "We ong," with Eric out front and Dan aining offstage, as they continued to aborate on writing songs together.

"We didn't start writing songs to to people, we wrote for us," Eric says. t other singers wanted them, so we red 'let's get songs on records.' We sort hought it would help us as artists tly, though it didn't do that. We were essful, but not satisfied."

Navarro's debut album in 1990, garnering various rave reviews and establishing their sound -- two voices, tightly linked with the underpinning of acoustic guitar and bass, cello and drums.

The band found fans and supporters in all musical quarters, including Dan's cousin, guitarist David Navarro, then with Jane's Addiction.

"We had a mutual admiration society going on," Dan says. "We used to play their demos in our van and they used to play our demos in their tour bus, which is kind of funny because most people wouldn't expect that. Virtually all the songs have little stories behind them, like "Dreams I Left



Imagine experiencing a multisensory event that is created inside a computer; a virtual experience, as distinguished from reality. Until lately, people could experience this exciting, new phenomenon at only a handful of permanent venues around the country. But now, the world's only traveling virtual reality experience is coming to us. Area students can experience it at a special installation Keathley University Center Lounge, 2nd floor KUC, on Monday, Nov. 8, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m.

A choice of two virtual reality experiences await the participant. In "Dactyl Nightmare," two players duel each other from special platforms in space, while green pterodactyls threaten from above, creating excitement that is reported to be far more intense than what any other kind of computer game can provide. Veteran players describe it as total immersion in an elaborate, computer-generated space where "real" reality is absolutely blocked out and the players are virtually inside the computer in another reality.

What creates this other reality, in addition to the computers that

exclusive headgear that each participant wears. Called "Visettes," they bathe the players in quadrophonic sound effects and cover their eyes with a pair of miniature TV screens which display a colorful, threedimensional scene. The scene is altered according to the player's every movement, thereby creating for the player the illusion of being totally immersed in the visual aspects of the game environment. A press of a thumb-button on a "Spacestick" held by each player "moves" the player forward and upward in this "cyberspace," while a squeeze of a trigger launches a rocket grenade at an adversary - or at a pterodactyl, if it hasn't already snatched its victim. In addition to "Dactyl Nightmare," participants can choose "H.E.R.O., " an experience in which they navigate through four different "environments."

While players are immersed in virtual reality, people in line or nearby can observe monitors showing, in two-dimension, the action as the players are experiencing it in three-dimension.

The developers of virtual reality and other experts in the field of computer-generated imaging foresee a wide range of

generate the images, are the applications for its concept in areas far beyond entertainment. For example, surgeons will be able to "voyage" inside the computer-replicated bodies of their patients, or perform otherwise risky, "what-if" procedures on them. Astronauts or space scientists will be able to explore the surfaces of other planets, however hostile the environments. Architects and engineers will be able to subject buildings and other structures to fire, violent winds, earthquakes or other potential disaster conditions to test the outer limits of their structures or materials. People will be able to take "virtual vacations," such as portrayed in the film "Total Recall," and "virtual relationships" are a distinct possibility as well.

> The virtual reality experience, or "Virtuality," as it is called by its U.S. license, Edison Brothers Mall Entertainment, was developed in England by W. Industries. American Program Bureau, Inc., Newton, Massachusetts, is its national collegiate tour license. The price will be \$2 for the first game, and each winner will play continuously up to three games at

no extra charge.

Warren Kidd to start for 76ers in opener

LANCASTER, Pa. — There's a new Kidd in town for the Philadelphia 76ers, and coach Fred Carter is delighted.

Warren Kidd, who holds the Blue Raider record for rebounding in just three years of playing time, will start at power forward Friday when the Sixers take the floor in their season opener. The 6-foot-9 Kidd is the unexpected fifth man on a refurbished team dominated by 7-foot-6 newcomer Shawn Bradley.

Kidd "does something we need," Carter said. "He's a dirty-work player," Carter said.

Kidd got the starting assignment by moving ahead of Tim Perry, a sixth-year pro, on the depth chart.

"I was real shocked," Kidd said. "I thought they'd start Tim Perry because he's a veteran, and I would have understood the situation."

Kidd was billed as a rebounder and floorrunner when he was signed. But as the exhibition season developed, he began bolstering the offense by accepting passes from Bradley at low post and getting off shots from decent range.

"I've been especially surprised I was given the freedom to shoot the jumper," Kidd said. "I'm confident in my shot, but I didn't know how much I'd be shooting."

Kidd shot 63 percent from the field last year at MTSU and was the leading rebounder in the NCAA's Division I.

He averaged 7.5 points and 8.6 rebounds in the preseason.

Boots Donnelly isn't a happy camper and for good reason. His Blue Raiders plummeted out of the Division I-AA poll this week after a 38-17 shellacking was given to the squad at Tulsa.

In that game, Tulsa rolled up 569 yards of total offense including 378 total yards through the air.

Making an impact on the conference race may be the only way MTSU makes a fifth consecutive playoff appearance. With three wins, and a little help, MTSU could still conceivably, but not likely, the for the OVC title and earn the conferences automatic bid to the playoffs.

Going into Saturday's game with division I-A Tulsa, the Raiders had hoped to play well enough to remain in the polls and they had their chances.

Three times Saturday, the Raiders drove the ball inside the Hurricane 20 only to come away with three points. Continuously this season, the offense has sparkled but when it got to crunch time, it stalled.

"It's hard to tell what is going on," said Donnelly. "The majority of the problem is inconsistency. We have failed inside the 20 this season. I d know that.



After high school Bayless had to make the decision of at which school to continue his football career. "I was highly recruited by a lot of the top schools in I-A football," he said, "but right at the end most of them either wanted me to walk on or they would not give me a full scholarship."

His final choices came down to Furman, Appalachian State, Vanderbilt and MTSU with all offering full scholarships.

"I was on the phone with Coach Donnelly about four in the morning two days before the signing date," commented Bayless, "and he convinced me to come to MTSU. MTSU stayed with me the whole way through.".

Prior to getting his chance to shine this year, Bayless had been a back-up to Joe Campbell and Walter Dunston. Even as a backup in the 1992 season, Bayless gained 533 yards rushing.

Also that year Bayless had what he considers his best game at MTSU. With Dunston hurt, he stepped up to have a 135 yard rushing performance with a touchdown to lead MTSU to a 35-7 victory over Eastern Kentucky.

"I do not know what it was," he said, "but both sides of the ball played great and we came out with a victory."

Bayless' best game of the 1993 season so far came against Southeast Missouri on Homecoming. He had 190 yards rushing on 36 carries and scored two touchdowns. He also caught a pass for a two-point conversion in the 31-10 Blue Raider victory. Bayless describes his runni style as "slicing and dicing," to he says, "if somebody's in fro of me and I can't go around the I'm going to go through them. don't like running out of bound I just wanted to run the ball. Gi it to me and I will run it for you.

So far this season Bayless pleased with the way he h played. "I am catching the b well, I am blocking well and I a following my assignments. Oth than wanting to break some mo tackles...there is not too man weak spots for me right now."

With an unusual name li Kippy, many may wonder how came about the name. His giv first name is Stephen and Kip is a nickname he acquired wh he was younger.

"When I was small, m family nickname was 'Baby.' M aunt, who stayed in Michiga came home one time, noticed th and said 'You-all need to qu calling him Baby. We need give him another nickname After that they just started callin me Kippy. That is where it can from," admitted Bayless.

Like most football player Bayless dreams of playing in the NFL after college. However, a an accounting major he prepared for other things.

"Of course I want to go to the NFL," Bayless commented, "ar if I get that opportunity it wou be great, but I have a couple of things set up to where I will be doing some accounting work Nashville (just in case)."

And with his senior year sti ahead of him, Bayless is presentl on track to add his name to th list of great running backs a MTSU as well.

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
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
