## Supervisors Hear Cope, James and Humphreys

Tennessee Supervising Teachers closed a four day meeting at Middle Tennessee State College Thursday with a joint meeting of the new steering, editing and executive committee.

The meet was attended by 195 supervisors from all sections of the State.

Theme of the conference this year has been the "Supervisors Responsibilities Concerning Curriculum and Ideologies." Tuesday morning the group heard an address by Joseph F. Condon, special agent, United States Department of Justice and a two session panel discussion led by Dr. Quill E. Cope, president of MTSC, Dr. C. C. Humphreys, president of Memphis State University and Clayton James, professor of sociology at MTSC.

Wednesday morning Dr. John Richardson of the TEA spoke and led a panel on the general theme, "Reaction? What does it mean to us in the social studies?" The physical fitness program was discussed by Charlie Kerr of the State Department of Education and other addresses were by Roy Jones and Sam Ingram.

Mr. Condon, reviewing the history of the Communist party movement in the United States, told the group that, "The educator has a vital role to play for the minds and loyalties of men in this period of intensified activity."

Dr. Cope outlined the machinery that had been set up in Tennessee with the appointment of committees and preparations for the teaching of Americanism as a counter effort.

C. C. Humphreys, former FBI agent and currently president of Memphis State University then suggested that there were three kinds of people susceptible to Communist doctrines. These he listed

### Federal Aid Discussed By Debate Team

Debate teams from nine Middle Tennessee high schools met for a full day of discussion at Middle Tennessee State College Saturday as a preliminary for the winter debate season. Lane Boutwell and members of the MTSC speech department assisted Gordon DeFries in presenting the program.

Dr. Quill E. Cope and Granville Bouldin, local attorney and former MTSC faculty member, presented opposite points of view on the debate theme of Federal Aid to Education.

In his introduction Dr. Cope welcomed the more than 80 visiting debaters to the campus and stated that, "I believe you get something from debating that you gain from no other source." He complimented Gordon DeFries, debate coach at Central high school in Murfreesboro, who is at MTSC junior, in speaking of the Saturday meeting. In speaking of the emphasis MTSC is now placing on speech Dr. Cope stated, "The next building on this campus will be a \$600,000 speech and foreign language building, work on which will begin in the very near future."

In presenting the affirmative point of view Dr. Cope stated that he believes in educational opportunity for all above anything else. On this premise he outlined the history of Federal Aid to education

### Space Workshop Returns To MTSC

Final approval of Middle Tennessee State College as the site for the 1962 Aerospace Workshop for Tennessee teachers for the fourth consecutive year has been received by Dr. Bealer Smotherman from the Tennessee Aeronautics Commission. Dates for the 1962 workshop have been set for June 11 through July 12.

There will be 100 regular scholarships and 30 "advanced scholarships" available for the workshop next summer. This is the first time any Tennessee campus has been chosen for four consecutive years to present this important training program for Tennessee teachers and is a personal compliment to the work of Dr. Smotherman and his associates.

The course next summer will carry the usual four hours graduate or under-graduate credit. The scholarship aid is limited to in-service Tennessee teachers.

Last year the workshop was described by objective visiting dignitaries as "the most enthusiastic," "the best" and "the most carefully planned" of all such efforts in the United States.

Several aerial field trips are a regular feature of the workshop which also brings to the MTSC campus some of the nation's greatest personalities in space work.

Teachers may make applications immediately for the 1962 summer scholarships to Dr. Bealer Smotherman, MTSC, Murfreesboro or to James E. Martin, director of the Tennessee Aeronautics Commission, Berry Field, Nashville.

**VENDING MACHINES, WARNING!**

It is a **Federal offense** to deface coins. Federal authorities investigate, AND, handle the prosecution of, the source of defaced coins.

This reminder to MTSC students should cause deliberate thought of possible consequences.

Vending machines are placed at several locations to provide services for the student body as well as additional income for the Student Activity Fund.

In recent weeks some of the machines have been malfunctioning because slugs, bent or defaced coins have been inserted. This jams the coin rejectors, preventing the machines from operating.

In appealing to students to be careful of the condition of the coins inserted in the machines the Bookstore manager, who is in charge of these machines, points out that the use of such improper coins constitutes a Federal offense, subjecting the person responsible to severe penalties.

**NCAA CLAMPS DOWN ON STUDENT BETTING!**

"We urge each institution to enact and institutional rule which shall provide that any student (athlete or non-athlete) shall be expelled from college for **failure to report a solicitation to be a party to a sports bribery**; further, institutional regulations should provide that a student be expelled if he becomes an agent of the gambling industry through the process of distributing handicap information or handling bets."

This point 12 of a special report sent to all NCAA members in the joint recommendation of the NCAA, the American Football Coaches Association, the National Association of Basketball Coaches and the National Association of Collegiate Commissioners.

It's implication is very clear, even on the MTSC campus, where students may have been "pushing" various types of football pools and other devices that encourage gambling on athletic contests.

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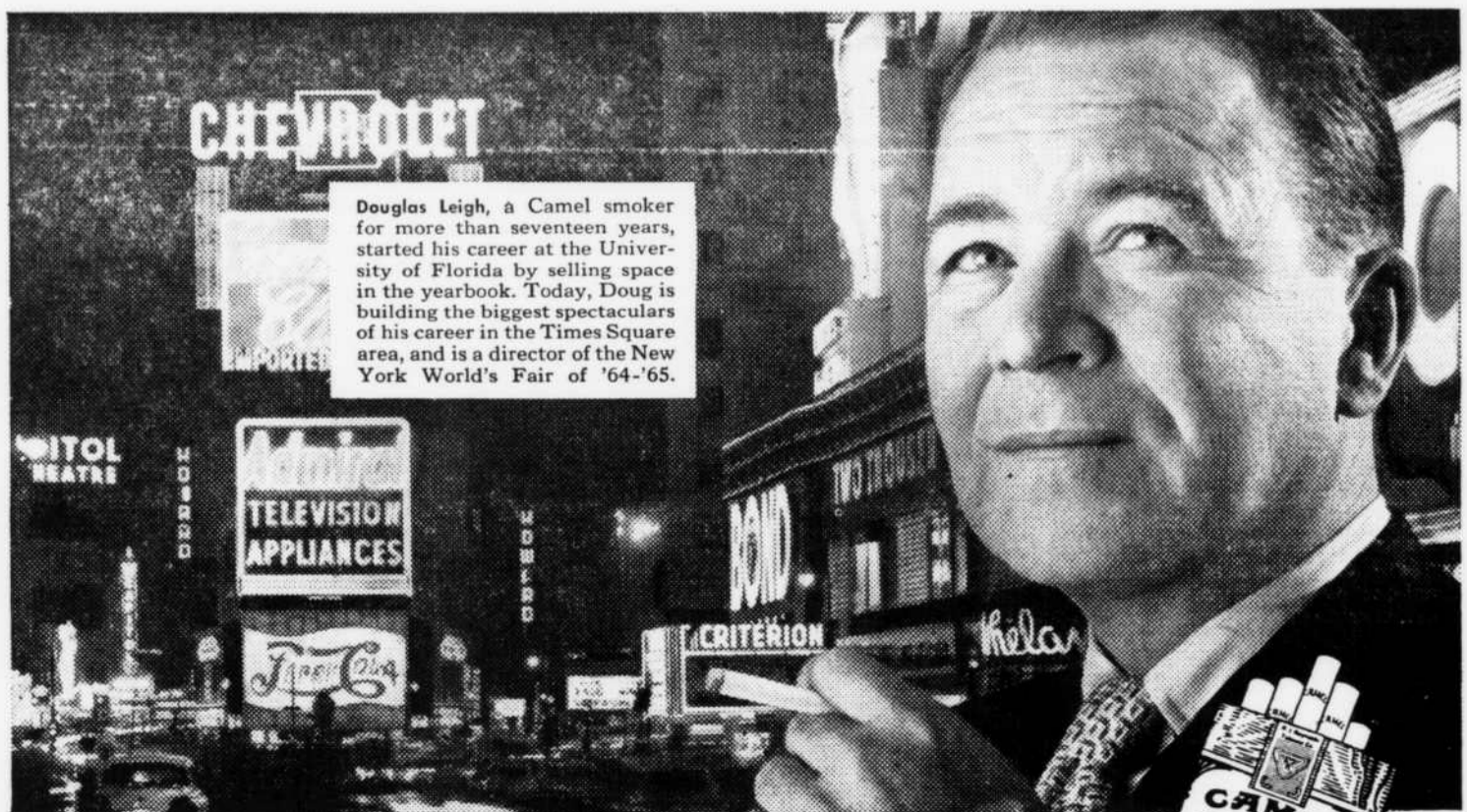

Middle Tennessee State's Blue aiders set a new school record when they invaded the Murray State homecoming Saturday. The Raiders needed only 27 yards to better their 1955 yards passing total of 1,162. They hit eight passes for 154 yards to set a MTSC record Saturday of 1289 yards.

MTSC came from behind in the last half for the fifth time this year to remain undefeated in the OVC by a 27-18 score over Murray State Saturday.

Repeating the epidemic of fumbles that gave Chattanooga two easy scores and set up the Florence field goal two weeks ago Jerry Pearson fumbled three times in the first five plays to give the Kentuckians an early score on a Fioravanti run. A punt got the Raiders in a hole again in the second quarter and a 15 yard pass and George's one yard run put the Thoroughbreds out in front 12-0.

With a minute and fifteen seconds left in the first half the Raiders moved 80 yards in 48 seconds to send Grammer over from the one with Matusek kicking the point. The drive started with a 13 yard Bailey to Dykes pass that broke the old MTSC pass record. Larry Wahley got 30 more on a Bailey pass and run, coupled with a 15 yard penalty. Two quick strikes to Bill Settles for 10 and nine yards and the Raiders had it first and goal on the one from whence Grammer scored.

Duplicating the quick opening thrust up the middle that counted for the third Chattanooga score and almost worked for Florence, Bill Jaslowski went 62 yards with 12:03 remaining in the third quarter.

Trailing 18-7 the Raiders finally settled down to steady play with Jimbo Pearson moving from the 30 to the 16. Grammer went to the two and then Wahley was across on the option. Matusek again converted.

A 15 yard penalty early in the fourth quarter gave the Raiders the ball on the 'Bred 47. Grammer made six, then Terry Bailey (who hasn't thrown a good long pass all year) hit Dykes from the 45 to the 3 with a touchdown pitch.

The final Raider score came with 7:27 remaining in the fourth quarter. Armstrong recovered a fumble on the 37. Hobbs moved for a first down on a draw and then Jim Nabors moved for an 11 yard gain, Rice went for another first down. Jim Nabors turned on the power that has made him the top average ground gainer on the MTSC squad for an 11 yard touchdown drive. Matusek converted again.

Murray struck back through the air and moved to the MTSC 15 where Butch Williams trapped the Murray passer on fourth down. MTSC started moving again when a fumble on the 30 put the Blue back in a hole. This time Murray drove to the seven. Dogged defensive play by Williams, Lehorn and Short and beautiful pass coverage by the secondary stopped this drive.

Statistic wise The Raiders had 23 first downs to 13; gained 369 net yards, 210 rushing and 159 passing to Murray's 247 of which 151 was made rushing, largely on Jaslowski's long gallop. Penalties were even at 50 yards each. MTSC outkicked the 'Breds with a 39.5 average to 34 yards.

as (1) The sincere person looking for a way to better the lot of mankind. (2) The person lusting for power and seeing in Communism an opportunity and (3) people who feel that fate has dealt them a blow and who now seek a better way of life.

Clayton James, third member of the panel, which appeared on both the afternoon and evening program Tuesday, emphasized the need for educators to understand the underlying philosophy of Communism. He pointed out that prior to World War II the South had little problem from "isms" but with the influx of many industries in the post war period and entirely new social structure had developed in this region. "This influx has brought new ideas that are foreign to our thinking and we need to study these that we may effectively counter-act ideologies antagonistic to the American concept," he said.

## Raiders Ride Bailey, Pearson Arms to Eighth Place in U. S.

The 1961 team is leading the Ohio Valley Conference in passing with 80 of 140 completed for 1,289 yards. The aerial bombardment has been directed mostly by quarterbacks Jerry Pearson and Terry Bailey.

Pearson has completed 37 of 63 for 512 yards and 3 touchdowns, for a percentage of 58.7%. Bailey has made good on 34 of 52 throws for 686 yards, 8 TD's, plus a conversion toss, for an amazing 60.9%.

MTSC's passing has averaged 162.8 yards in seven contests this season. As a team, the Raiders are throwing at a 59.9% clip.

Main target for the air minded field generals has been George Dykes, a sophomore end from Oak Ridge. The 6'3", 197 pounder is leading the conference in receptions with 22 for 577 yards, five touchdowns, and a conversion.

But Dykes is not the only Blue Raider target. His running mate at end, Bill Settle, has caught 14 for 176 yards and a touchdown. Halfbacks Jimbo Pearson and Larry Whaley have pulled in 10 for 162 yards, and 9 for 148 yards, respectively, with Whaley having a TD catch.

To round out the Raider receivers, end Frank Halliburton has caught 7 for 88 yards and 2 TD's; halfback Charles Rice has 5 for 43 yards; end Ralph Williams, 3 for 38 yards and 1 TD; halfback Jim Nabors, 2 for 31 yards; end Jerry Allen, 2 for 23 yards and 1 touchdown; end Gary Shaver, 2

for 8 yards; and halfback Jim Mundy, 1 for 8 yards.

Middle Tennessee State is currently leading the Ohio Valley Conference in both offense and defense. Latest NCAA small college statistics place Middle Tennessee State eighth in the nation in pass offense and 22nd in total offense.

Nine returning lettermen were on hand at Middle Tennessee State head basketball coach Ed Diddle, Jr., opened practice sessions. The Raiders, who posted a 9-14 record last season, lost only two men from the 1960-61 squad.

Gone via the graduation route are the Burden boys, Ray and Bob. The latter set a new school record for a three year collegiate career when he closed his senior year with 391 markers. Bob's total output for his three seasons with the Raider varsity was 1,242 points.

Returning lettermen include forwards Joe Baker (6'1"), Hazard, Ky.; Paul Dailey (6'4"), Benton, Ky.; and Ed Newton (6'0"), Somerset, Ky.

Guards are Paul Holland (6'2") Paducah, Ky.; Dwain Jones (6'3"), Powderly, Ky.; Phil Jones (6'2"), Shelbyville, Tenn.; and Jack McCauley (5'11"), Henderson, Ky.

For the first time, Diddle will have no "big man" problems at center with returnees Bennett Jent (6'7"), Hazard, Ky., and Bill Nickell (6'7"), Combs, Ky.

As a sophomore last season, Jent scored 304 points, averaging 13.8 per game. He hit on 46.3% of 246 field goal attempts, and grabbed 208 rebounds.

Other than Jent, Paul Holland is the only returning letterman who averaged in the double figures in 1960-61. He poured in 231 points for a 10.5 average.

Best bets from last season's freshman squad to jump into the varsity picture are 6'4" Ken Peek, and 6'1" Ron Wilmouth. Peek, who hails from Benton, Ky., is an amazing jumper. He led the yearling squad last season in scoring with 316 points in 16 games. His 19.8 average last season marks him as a top contender for a starting berth.

Wilmouth, guard from Bardwell, Ky., scored 225 points on the freshman squad last year, averaging 14.1 per game.

Middle Tennessee State will open the season on December 1, when they host Stetson University of DeLand, Florida.

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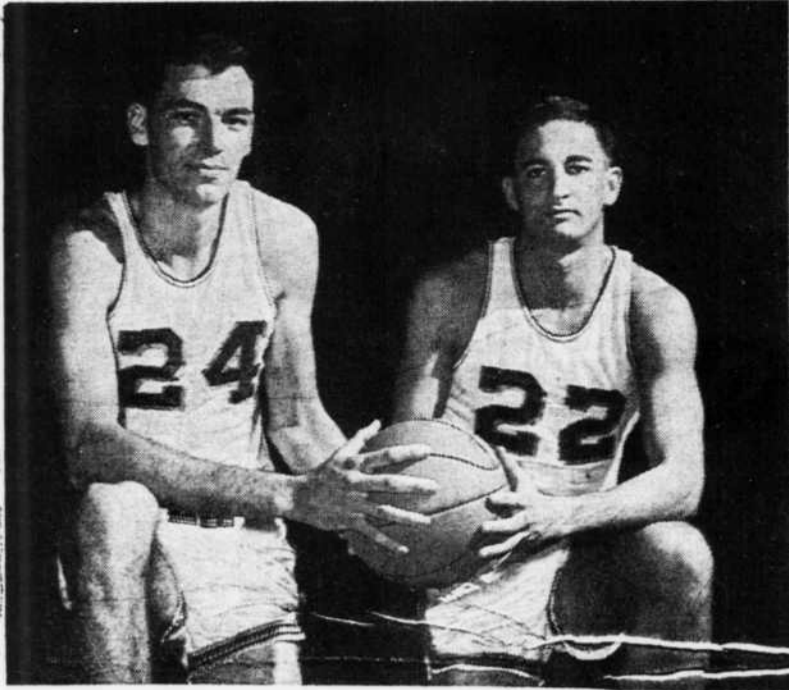
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## LAUNDRY and CLEANING VILLAGE

Captain Johnson will also discuss four other officer schools. The Officer Candidate Course (OCC) and Aviation Officers Candidate Course (AOCC) for college seniors and recent graduates. The MAR-CAD program is designed for two year college men who desire flight training before graduation from college. The Women Officer Training Course will also be discussed.

The Aviation Information Team from the Naval Air Reserve Training Unit, Memphis, Tennessee, will be on the campus of Middle Tennessee State College during the period of November 14 and 15 to interview college men who are interested in the Navy's Aviation Officer Training programs. Commander B. W. Rosenblum, USNR, will be the officer in charge of the visiting team.

Three programs are now available to qualified college men between the ages of 18-26. Students who have completed two years of college and are unmarried may apply for the Naval Aviation Cadet Program leading to an ensign commission.

For the college graduate or those who will be soon completing their college education, either married or single, the Navy offers an opportunity to apply for pilot training through the Aviation Officer Candidate Program, or for speciality training in one of many fields, such as, bombardier, navigator, etc., as an Aviation Officer Candidate-1355 (non-pilot).

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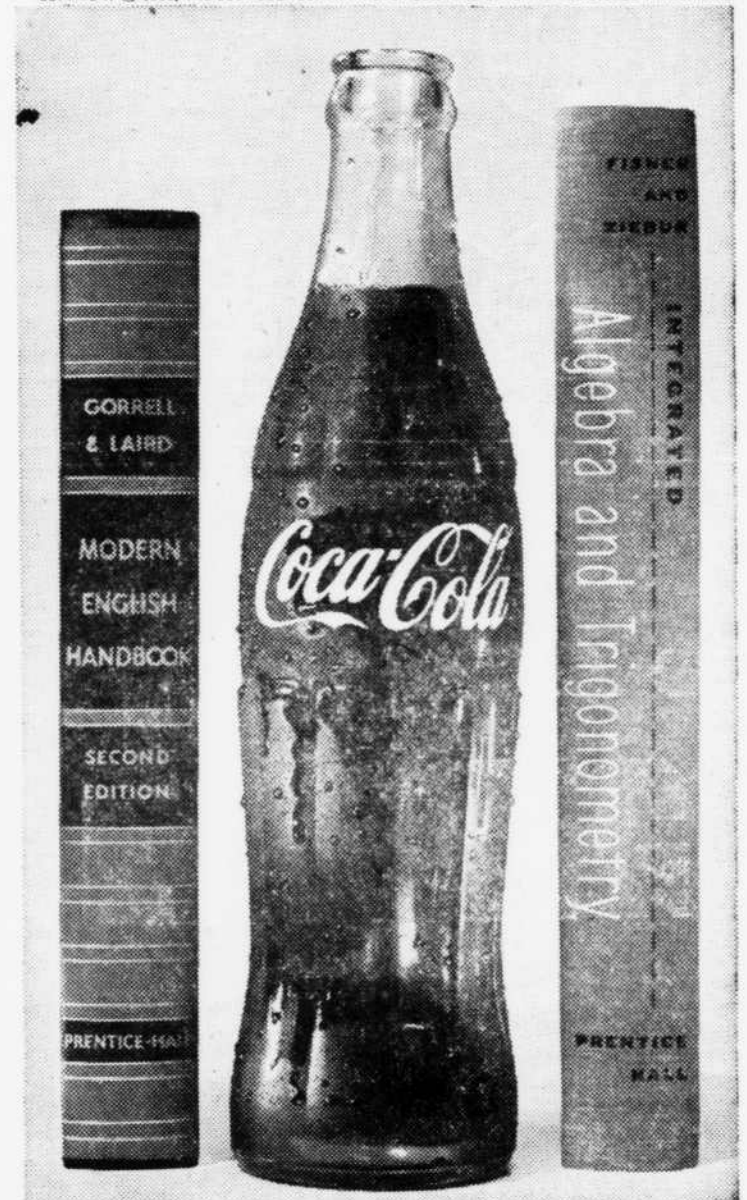

beginning with the Act of 1787, extending through the Morrill, Smith Hughes, Public Acts 815 and 874 and other more recent efforts by the Federal government to aid educational opportunity.

"I challenge anyone," Dr. Cope declared "to say that these have not worked effectively and with such slight Federal control as to be anything but good." He also pointed out that statistical studies showed that the masses of American people believed education was a matter of national concern based of national defense, migration and the relative ability of the poor states to maintain educational opportunity.

Schools represented at the Saturday meeting in Murfreesboro were Battle Ground Academy, Marshall County high school, Franklin high school, Grove high of Paris, Cookeville Central high school, Madison high school, Central high of Murfreesboro, Shelbyville high school and Clarksville high school.

Seventy three Tennessee counties are represented in the record breaking 3, 225 on-campus students at Middle Tennessee State College for the fall semester. This year also marks the largest number of out-of-state students (176) and the largest number of foreign students (17 from five countries) in the history of the school.

For the first time in history Rutherford county yielded first place in the number of students enrolled. Davidson county, which this year sent 727 students to MTSC, is ahead of Rutherford's 570 by 157. Hamilton county, which sent 173 students this year, ranks third, moving ahead of Coffee county, which this year has 139 residents enrolled. Bedford county ranks fifth with 114 enrolled. Maury county, with 112, is just behind Bedford in sixth place.

Three other Mid-State counties vie for seventh, eighth and ninth in rank with Wilson county's 96 edging out Lincoln, which has 94 and Williamson, which has 93. Completing the group of ten top counties by enrollment is Warren county with 80.

The second ten include Marshall with 76, Franklin with 72, Sumner 58, Marion 56, Robertson 47, Cannon 44, Anderson 38, Grundy 38, Lawrence 35, and Giles with 31.

Other counties having 25 or more students enrolled at MTSC include DeKalb, Smith, and Loudon. There are more than ten students from Bradley, Hardin, Hickman, Macon, Knox, Moore, Rhea, White, Sequatchie and Trousdale.

Counties with five or more students enrolled are Bledsoe, Blount, Clay, Cumberland, Humphreys, Jackson, McMinn, Madison, Polk, Roane, Sevier, Shelby, and Wayne.

Other counties represented are Campbell, Carroll, Carter, Cheatham, Chester, Claiborne, Dickson, Fentress, Gibson, Grainger, Hamblen, Hawkins, Haywood, Henderson, Henry, Houston, Lauderdale, McNairy, Monroe, Obion, Overton, Perry, Pickett, Unicoi, and Van Buren.

## Dr. Batey Appointed On Supervising Commission

Dr. Edgar Batey of the Middle Tennessee State College education department staff, has been appointed to the Commission of the Professional Education of Supervising Teachers by Dr. Donald M. Sharpe, national president of the Association for Student Teaching.

His work will be concerned with the surveying of programs of education for supervising teachers in the classroom and making recommendations for training programs for teachers who supervise student teachers. There are 12 members of the Commission, each of whom will serve for three years.

In educational circles the work of the supervising teacher is held to be quite important, however, only a limited number of educational institutions provide training programs for them. This is the first study commission of national scope which has been concerned with such training for supervising teachers.

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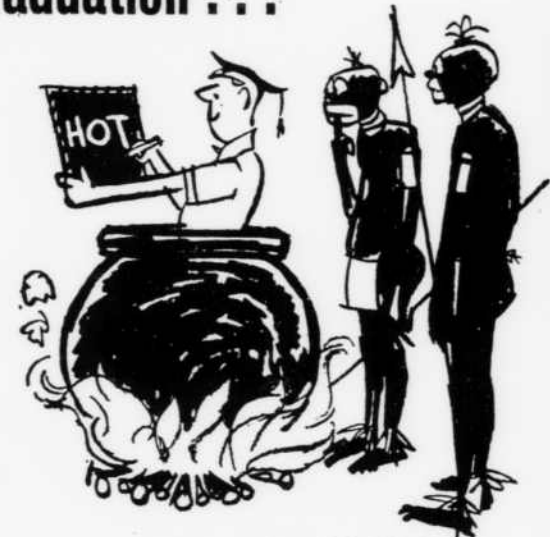
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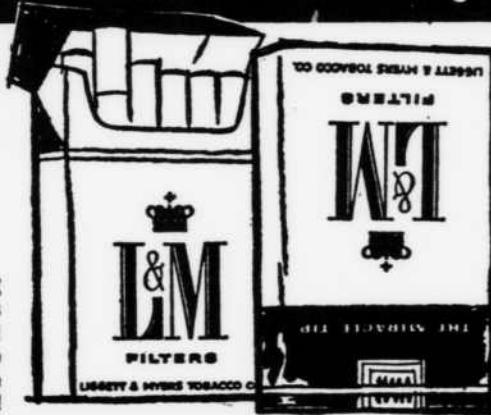


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
