

Head Coach Situation Unsettled, Smitherman To Leave

Smitherman Appointed To CCC Position

Will Leave Monday To Assume New Duties

Quarterbacked Teams Of 1935, '36 To SIAA Crowns

Woodrow Smitherman, former star quarterback and present assistant coach of the Blue Raiders, today announced his appointment as Educational Supervisor to the CCC Camps at Ft. Oglethorpe, Ga. The appointment came from Washington this morning. Smitherman will leave early next week for Ft. Oglethorpe to receive complete details and instructions relative to his new duties.

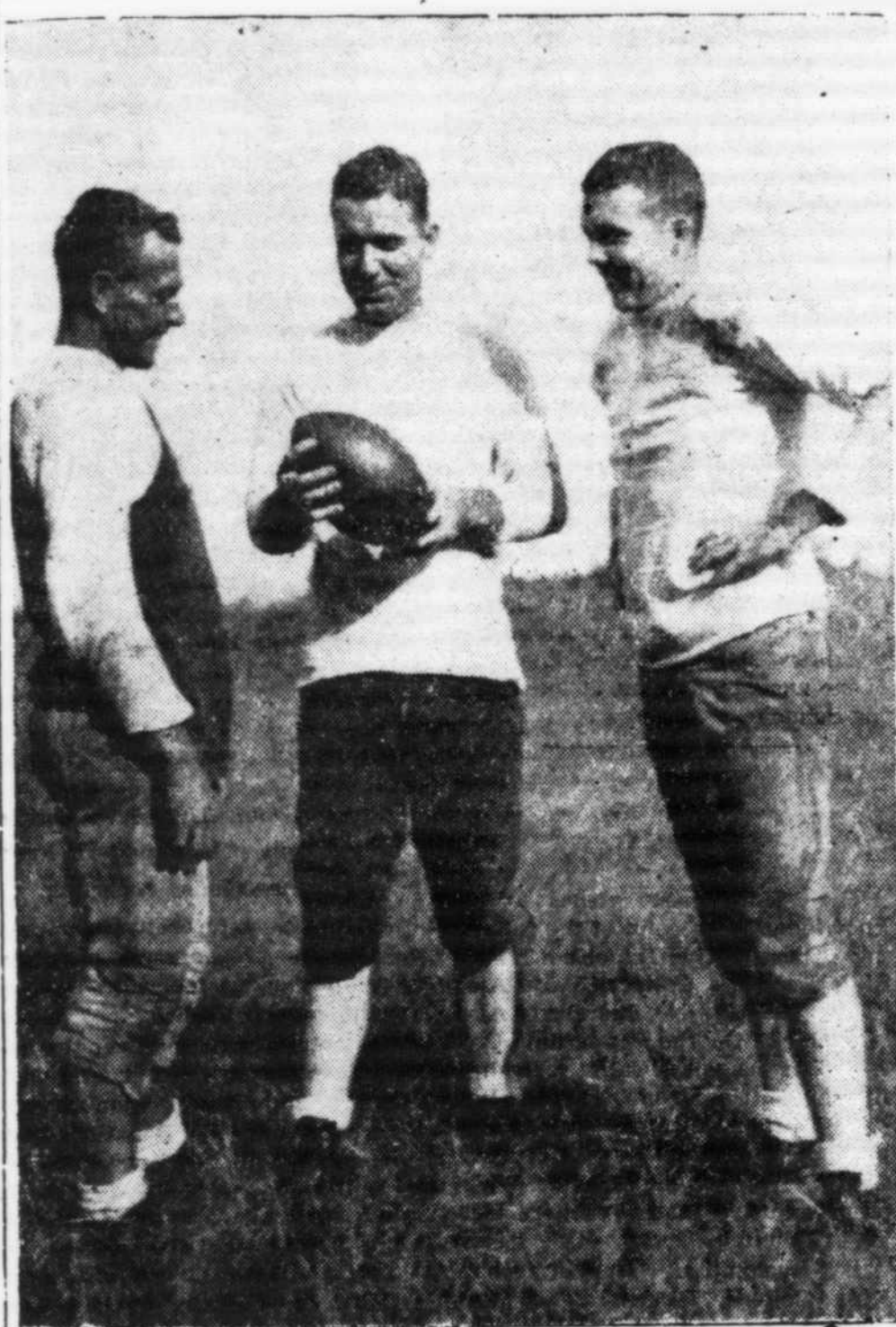
Coming to STC in 1934 at the request of his high school coach, Nig Waller, Smitherman immediately began one of the most colorful grid careers of any man ever to don the blue and white. Accurate passing, fleet-footed running and above par kicking set him in the quarterbacking position where he remained throughout his freshman and varsity years. In 1935-36 he led the Raiders to SIAA championships.

Graduating in June he returned to STC this fall as assistant football coach.

Smitherman was not able to disclose complete details of his work, but it is understood that he will teach one class and supervise the work of several other CCC instructors. The classes in the CCC camps are not compulsory, but the boys are urged to continue with their education while in camp that they may be fitted for some occupation when they leave. The job runs throughout the year, with one month's vacation.

In reply to questions, Smitherman stated that he would much prefer to remain in Murfreesboro if the salary was sufficient. He further stated that he was highly displeased with the appointment of a coach from another school when capable STC graduates could have been secured. However, he stated that he held no doubt as to the competency of the new coach.

Midgett Gets Inside Track With Position On S. T. C. Faculty

Floyd's Contract Lasts Until Close of School Year, Rumor Is That He Will Resign Christmas Changing Basketball Set-UP

STC's head coaching situation, which has been the cause of numerous rumors, blast into the limelight Friday with Q. M. Smith's statement that Elwin (Wink) Midgett, Castle Heights' coach, would become a member of the faculty when school opened after Christmas.

Though unofficial, it is fairly certain that Midgett will become head coach in place of Johnnie (Red) Floyd next season, if not before. Smith stated that he was hiring Midgett simply as professor in busi-

ness administration. He explained that with the increase in enrollment it was necessary to add a faculty member in order to hold up the standard required by the Southern Association of schools.

However, he hinted that should the rumor that Coach Floyd will resign Christmas come to pass, Midgett would immediately take over the coaching job for the basketball sea-

son. For the past two years Coach Floyd has talked of retiring from the coaching profession. His present contract expires with the close of baseball in the spring. Though it may be renewed and Midgett put in as assistant, it is improbable.

A Nashville reporter told the writer that Midgett stated he was coming here as coach. Whether he becomes the head man immediately depends on Floyd, as the veteran cedar whittlin' and tobacco chewin' coach holds the key to the whole shake-up.

The change will come when he resigns or his contract expires, not before. Smith, before the reception at his home Friday night, said, "I will make no changes in the present faculty this year."

Floyd came to STC and whipped a fine bunch of freshman players and a few varsity stalwarts into a championship mixture. They wore the crown in 1935, '36. The Raiders' success skyrocketed him into a sports page position which he held twenty years ago when he was starring as a back at Vanderbilt. Before going to Vanderbilt he played football for STC, then known as the Normal.

He has made no statement as to his immediate plans. He merely stated that "It is all news to me."

Midgett is a veteran of many athletic battles against STC. He graduated from Tennessee Tech in 1906. Going first to Watertown and then to Castle Heights, he has been in the profession for five years. During his first three years at the military school, his teams turned in excellent seasons. This season, however, because of the lack of material they are, like the Raiders, floundering in defeat.

Just as whiskey o' wine, this rivalry has become mellow with age and now when these two teams meet, the game is considered one of the most important in this section of the country.

Not important, always, from the standpoint as to which team shall be the Conference champions, but which team will have the best record in the history of this rivalry.

TPI and STC have met twelve times since 1928 and Tech has come out on top five times. The Raiders have won three games and three have ended in deadlocks. 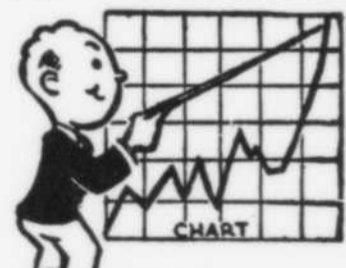

Constitution And By-Laws Of The Associated Student Body Of The State Teachers College

Murfreesboro, Tennessee

Article I

Sec. 1. The name of this organization shall be the Associated Student Body of Middle Tennessee State Teachers College.

Sec. 2. The principal purposes of this organization shall be:

1. To unify all students and organizations under one general control.
2. To aid in the internal administration of the school.
3. To foster sentiments of democratic government.
4. To develop in the students self-discipline and social responsibility.
5. To promote in all ways the best interests of the school.
6. To aid in the social, extra curricular, and disciplinary realms.

Sec. 3. All students, both resident and day, shall be members of this Association.

Article II

Sec. 1. There shall be three separate and distinct divisions in the government of the student body, known respectively as follows: an Executive Department, a Legislative Department, and a Judicial Department.

Sec. 2. The Executive Department shall consist of a President, a Vice President, a Secretary, and a Treasurer. These members shall be elected by the student body at large, from members of the Senior Class.

Sec. 3. The Legislative Department shall consist of a unicameral body called the Congress. The members of this body shall be elected annually by classes, and must meet at least twice a month and upon call of the president of the Associated Student Body.

Sec. 4. The Judicial Department shall consist of a Supreme Court, a Dormitory Council for Women, and a Dormitory Council for Men.

1. The Supreme Court shall consist of four seniors, three juniors, and two sophomores. Their term of office shall be for one year, being appointed by the President of the ASB and confirmed by the Congress.
2. The Dormitory Council for Women shall consist of seven members—two seniors, two juniors, two sophomores, and one freshman. These shall be elected by the women of the dormitories. Laws and by-laws of this council shall be vested in a separate constitution for Dormitory Women.
3. The Dormitory Council for Men shall be organized upon the same plan as the Dormitory Council for Women.

Article III

Sec. 1. All officers elected by the ASB, by the classes, or appointed by the President must have an average of C.

Sec. 2. The President of the ASB shall be from the senior class and may either be a man or woman. He shall be recognized as the ranking officer of the ASB. He shall preside at all student assemblies. He shall be responsible through his associates in office to see that all laws of the school are enforced.

Sec. 3. The Vice President shall be from the senior class and may either be man or woman. He will preside in the absence of the President and act as non voting chairman of Congress.

Sec. 4. If the President of the ASB is a man then the Vice President shall automatically be a woman, and the reverse of sex in the President's office will bring about a reverse of sex in the Vice President's office.

Sec. 5. The Secretary shall keep a record of all club meetings on the campus through the cooperation of the club secretaries, and of all meetings of the ASB. He (she) shall perform all correspondence of the ASB, issue all summons to students to appear before the Su-

preme Court upon complaint of the Dormitory Council, and keep record of the same.

Sec. 6. The Treasurer shall receive all money raised by the ASB and pay such money upon order of the President when such expenditures are authorized by Congress. A complete record of such transactions must be kept by the Treasurer.

Sec. 7. The members of the Congress shall number thirteen, elected by classes. Four from senior, four from junior, three from sophomore and two from freshman. The Congress shall comprise the final law-making body of the Associated Student Body. This body shall elect a recording secretary from their number, who will be entitled to vote and speak from the floor. This body may originate laws or rules of their own, as well as consider recommendations made to them by the President of the College, faculty, and President of ASB. A majority vote will be required to pass or repeal any law and rule.

Sec. 8. The Supreme Court shall devote itself to investigation of major violations of the school rules, hearing evidence, and meting out justice to students brought before it. The Court shall keep records of all transactions.

Sec. 9. The Dormitory Councils shall be devoted to considering matters of local dormitory interest. It shall deal with matters of minor violations of dormitory rules which shall be set out in the dormitory constitutions.

Article IV

Sec. 1. Election of all executive officers shall be held during the last month of the Winter Quarter. All candidates must have a C average, and stand high in citizenship.

Sec. 2. Candidates receiving a majority of votes shall be declared elected.

Sec. 3. Counting of ballots and all other matters pertaining to the elections shall be under the supervision of the President of the ASB.

Sec. 4. Election of succeeding Congressmen will be held during the last month of the Winter Quarter. These elections shall be held in class meetings. Nominations for these offices shall be from the floor. Election shall be by secret ballot. Freshman congressmen shall be elected during the second week of the Fall Quarter. Also vacancies shall be filled at that time. The elections shall be subject to the same rules as the Winter elections.

Article V

Sec. 1. This constitution, or any part of it, may be repealed or amended by a three-fourths vote of the ASB and a two-thirds vote of the Congress.

Article VI

Sec. 1. Veto power of all laws shall be vested in the President of the College but shall be used within a period of five days after the passing of the law.

Sec. 2. All committees and organizations shall continue in their present status unless otherwise stated in this constitution.

BY-LAWS

Article I

Sec. 1. The President of the ASB may remove from office all students appointed by him to positions of responsibility. In the case of Supreme Court members an approval of two thirds of the members of the Congress is necessary.

Sec. 2. The Congress may impeach, try, and remove from office for neglect, or any other acceptable reasons, anyone holding an elective position in the ASB, including one of its own members.

Sec. 3. The Congress shall pass all laws and fix the penalties for these laws. The Congress shall be responsible for giving due publicity to these rules, and laws.

Sec. 4. The Associated Student Body shall publish from time to time a handbook containing all the rules of the school, the penalties, and other information about the school helpful to the students.
