## Ross Rives Is Chief Of Redstone Section

Lead story in the June 26 Redstone Rocket, published by the Huntsville, Alabama missile center, concerns the work of Ross D. Rives, chief of the missile model division Graphic Engineering and Models Studies section at Redstone.

The article, liberally illustrated with pictures of Ross and his assistants at work, was sent to the Sidelines by Mrs. E. S. Voorhies, Second Avenue, Fayetteville.

It recounts Rives joining the section in 1951 after graduating from MTSC and his subsequent drafting into the Army where he simply changed civilian clothes to O.D.s while carrying on his work and back again to mufti in 1954.

"Through the molding of both technical and non-technical models the layman, as well as engineers and scientists, can see and study existing and future missiles," Gerd W. DeBeck, Ross's superior stated.

Engineers use the models to design future missiles and to aid in designing carrier and launcher equipment. Scientists use them as test models in the wind tunnels.

The models, on exact scale, are used in the orientation program for new employees and military personnel at Redstone.

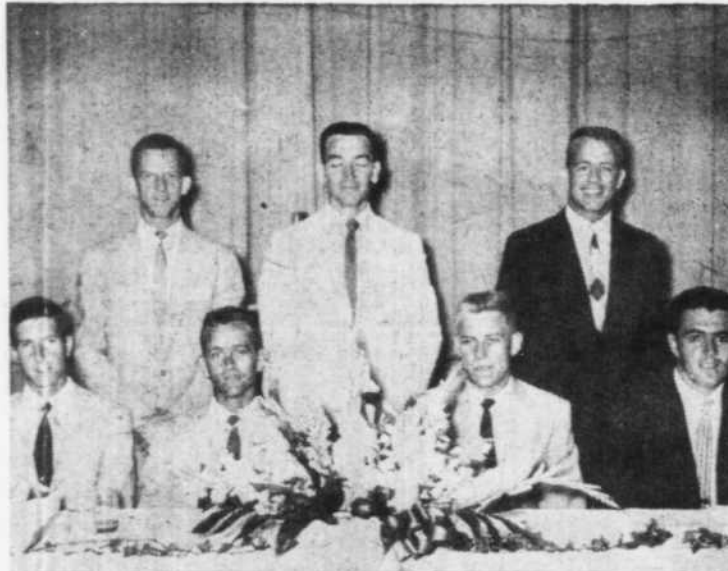

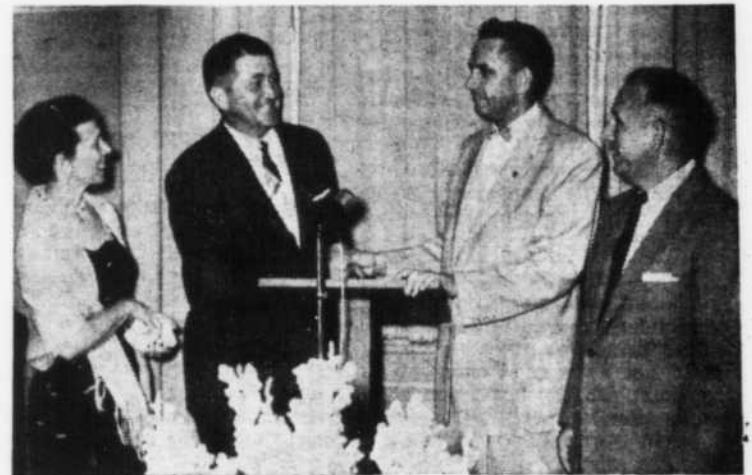
