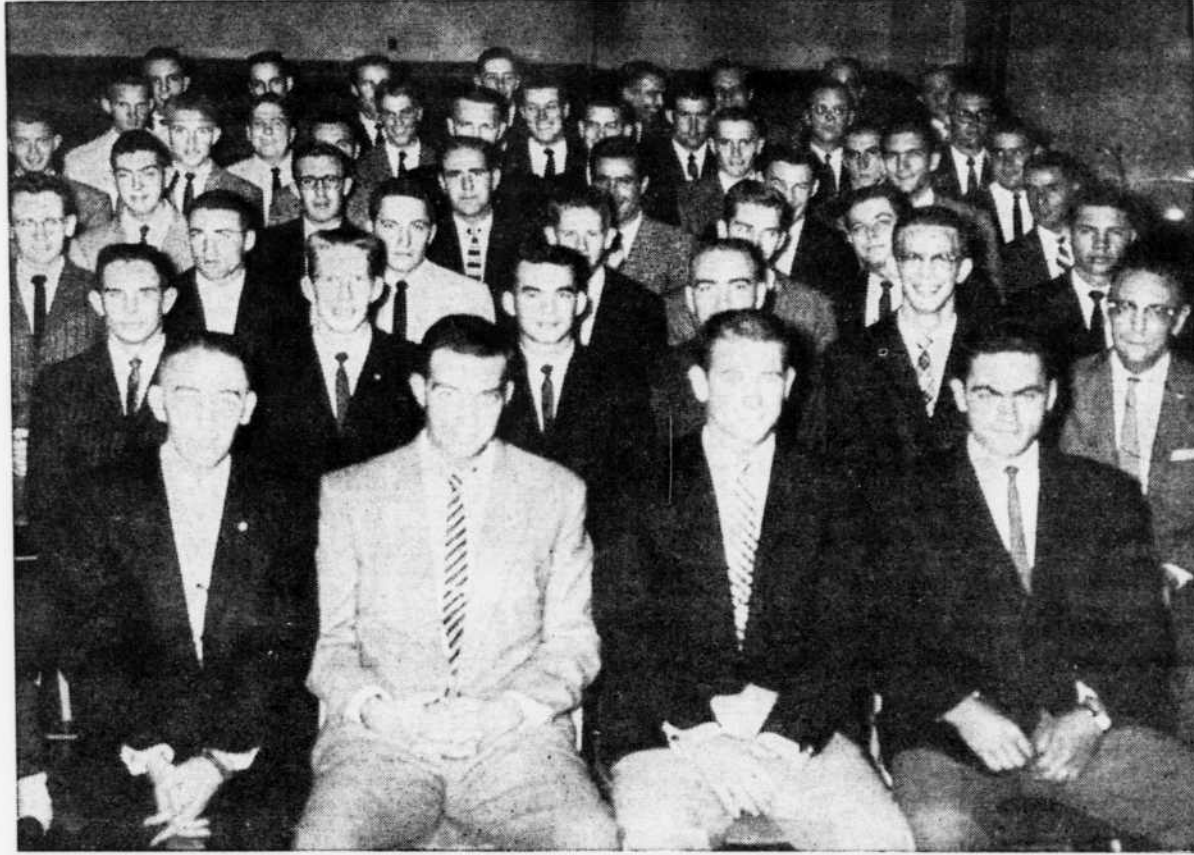

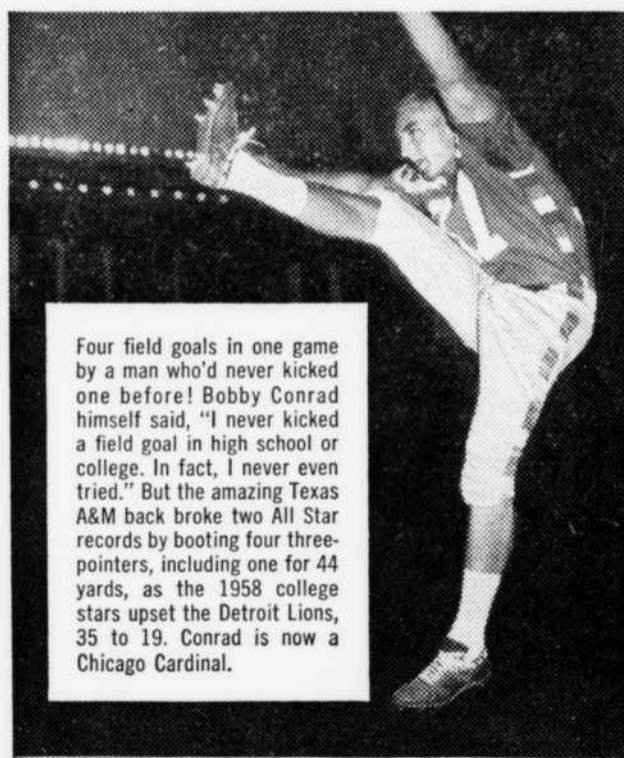

If the Blue Raiders had of gotten their share of the breaks, the contest may have been a different story, but they didn't and that's the way a football bounces sometimes.

WORDS FROM THE MOUTHS OF MOCCASINS

A Chattanooga official quoted Moc headman Scrapy Moore as saying these words about the terrific Raider tussle. "They were a tough team, a good one. Our boys hit hard, and we were proud of them. It was a close game almost all the way. You know, I'd settle for this score any time, and feel lucky to get it."

After a good deal of the joviality had died down in the Moccasin dressing room after the game a comment was overheard from one of the happy players that sounded something like this, "you know this team hits as hard as Auburn, and that's saying a lot."

RAIDERS STILL APPEAR TO BE OVC'S BEST

In spite of the terrifying Moccasin defeat, the Blue and White still appear to have the best chance at coping their third Ohio Valley Conference Championship in as many years. Three of the four remaining Raider engagements are against OVC foes. With a perfect mark in loop play so far, the future looks mighty bright for the defending crown holders.

Preparations are in swing for the Nov. 8 Raider homecoming tilt, which is at 2:00 p.m. Saturday afternoon against Murray State College.

End Hester Gibbs' 9-yard scoring catch against Chattanooga was the first collegiate touchdown for the 200-pound Ashland City Junior.

Apparently MTSC's high stepping baton twirlers made a big hit at Chattanooga with their fire twirling routine, which brought cheers from the huge homecoming crowd.

In losing to the Mocs, the Raiders dropped their first game since December, 1956, when Sam Houston battered the Blue men 27-13 in the post-season Refrigerator Bowl.

The last regular season defeat suffered by the local eleven was at the hands of Vanderbilt in Oct. 1956.

Tough Mocs Down MTSC, Break Streak Of 14 Wins

The Blue Raiders saw their 14-game win streak float out into empty space at the hands of the University of Chattanooga 18-7 before a capacity homecoming audience of more than 10,500 fans at the Moccasins' Chamberlain Field a week ago Friday.

Moccasin pitching ace John Green completed only two of eight passes he threw all night, but both aeriels went for six pointers and that was the difference in the almost all the way close contest.

The victory-hungry Moc's got the scoring parade underway with 90 seconds to go in the first half. After Moccasin fullback Don May intercepted a Whit Watson spot-pass attempt on the Raider 40, the scoring parade was on. Two 15-yard personal-foul penalties against the men in Blue moved the ball dangerously near UC scoring territory to the 10-yard strip. Fullback Rod Cook carried three consecutive times and scored. The PAT attempt failed and the score stood 6-0, UC at the halftime intermission.

MTSC surged ahead of the entertainers after 3:10 of the third period had elapsed by a 7-6 margin. Raider engineer Bob Hallum pounced on a fumbled Chattanooga hand-off on the Moccasin 25-yard line. In only four plays the visitors had the score when Hallum drifted deep and heaved the pigskin toward the end zone. The ball was deflected over the heads of two Moc defenders and grabbed by Raider end Hester Gibbs for the losers' lone touchdown. Fullback Tootie Hall booted the PAT and it was 7-6, Raiders.

After the kickoff 'Nooga's Green punted only 19-yards to the Blue 20. From there Gene Windham and Ray Purvis could not buldge the defenders on the ground and Hallum let go with a short pass over the middle. University of Chattanooga linebacker Billy Rewis picked it off at the Raider 29 and drove his way to the 2. Following a couple Moc running tries Green faded to his left and passed to

Tucker made a diving snag for the final score of the night and that's the way it ended—18-7, Chattanooga.

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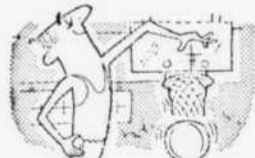

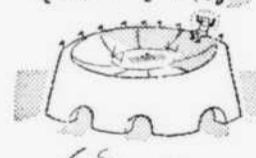

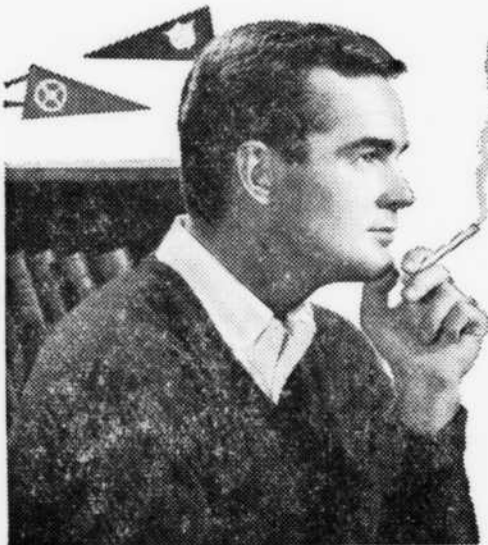

Raiders Romp Over Morehead 34-6 To Hold Ohio Valley Conference Lead

Middle Tennessee State put on its best offensive show of the season Saturday, racking up Morehead State 34 to 6 in an Ohio Valley conference football game.

Coach Charles M. (Bubber) Murphy sent 33 players into the game, as the Raiders constantly fattened their lead. They kept Morehead deep in the hole during the first quarter, and got their first touchdown two plays after the Eagles were forced to punt from their own two-yard line.

Halfback Ray Purvis slashed 35 yards to score, and the Raiders were off.

Halfback Johnny Moore took a 10-yard pass from Quarterback Whit Watson for the second TD after Morehead lost a fumble to End Nick Lynch on their own line.

The third MTSC touchdown was a straight drive from its own 41. Fullback Gene Windham went 16 to the Morehead 39 and Moore later added 15 to the Eagle five. Windham scored the touchdown from there.

Quarterback Bob Hallum scored the fourth marker on a short plunge after a 35-yard advance, and the Raiders opened up for their fifth with a five-play assault that covered 80 yards. Waverly Halfback Ray Bell squired 47 yards on the last play.

Morehead averted a shutout with four minutes left in the game. Guard Bill Miller intercepted a Watson pass on the MTSC 27 and ran it back to score.

The win put Middle Tennessee on top of the Ohio Valley conference with three victories and no defeats and knocked Morehead into the cellar.

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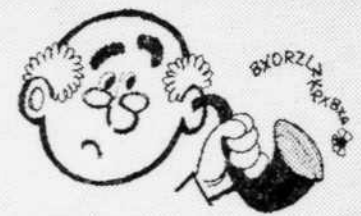
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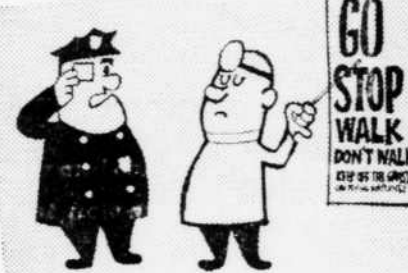

Revised Enrollment Figures Show Record Breaking 2753 Fall Total

Revised enrollment figures released by Dean N. C. Beasley at Middle Tennessee State College last week show that the record breaking fall quarter student body numbers 2534 on campus and 219 extension class students for a total of 2753.

The freshman class numbers 880 on campus students, of which 585 are men and 295 women. The sophomores number 460 men and 180 women for a total of 640. There are 354 juniors, 219 men and 135 women.

The senior class this year numbers 494 with 303 men and 191 women. There are 110 men and 56 women in the graduate division. Of this 166 graduate students 140 are part time students.

There are also 338 part time undergraduate students registered in night and Saturday classes. The largest number of this group are women in the senior class, of which there are 104. There are also 40 men who are taking part time work on the senior level. Other part time students include 99 freshmen, 28 sophomores and 67 juniors.

The total enrollment figure last fall was 2245. Five years ago the total was 1887. The percentage growth this fall was somewhat greater than was expected. The preliminary estimate of college registration during the summer was 2300. This estimate was low when compared with the demand; but the lack of suitable housing, it was felt, would keep many students away. However, this did not prove true, as some students are staying as far as two miles from the campus. The commuter problem has also become acute in-so-far as parking facilities are concerned. Efforts are being made to find additional parking space on the campus, as the overflow has spread for three blocks on both sides of North Boulevard. There are 750 parking areas on the campus with a need of at least 1,000.

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Thirty-Eight Middle Tennesseans Enroll In "Atomic Age Physics"

Thirty-eight Middle Tennesseans, ranging from a 16-year-old high school junior who "wants to learn as much science as possible" to eight persons with work beyond the Master's degree, faced Dr. Douglas Shields one Saturday morning several weeks ago in the first full program of the Middle Tennessee State College co-operative effort with NBC-TV and Channel 4 in Nashville to teach "Atomic Age Physics."

Thirty-five of this number have registered for the four quarter hours credit offered for the course. The others lack educational qualifications to receive college credit, but are taking the course for personal use. Of the 35 registered for credit, 24 have a Bachelor's degree and eight have the Master's degree or above.

The list of eager learners include eighteen in-service high school teachers. It also includes college teachers, a home economist, an industrial designer, four graduate en-

gineers, two Air Force officers, a radio engineer, a band director, an insurance underwriter, a private business executive, a Boy Scout executive, an air conditioning mechanic, a pre-medical student, and others working on an undergraduate degree in science.

The most frequent reason given for getting up at 6:30 each morning to watch Dr. Henry White lecture and demonstrate on the nationally televised class and then coming to Middle Tennessee State College on alternate Saturday's for seminar and testing is that of securing phys-

ics endorsement on teaching certificate. However, one is an engineering aid at AEDC in Tullahoma, another is preparing to enter the U. S. Air Force Institute of Technology in aeronautical engineering, another wants to "know what people are talking about," and others have modestly stated that they wish "to better myself."

A wide variety of undergraduate and graduate schools are represented in the class. Those in the class have earned college degrees from such institutions as University of Georgia, University of Florida, Peabody College, Vanderbilt University, Carson Newman College, University of Cincinnati, David Lipscomb College, Missouri State, Tennessee Polytechnic Institute and Middle Tennessee State.

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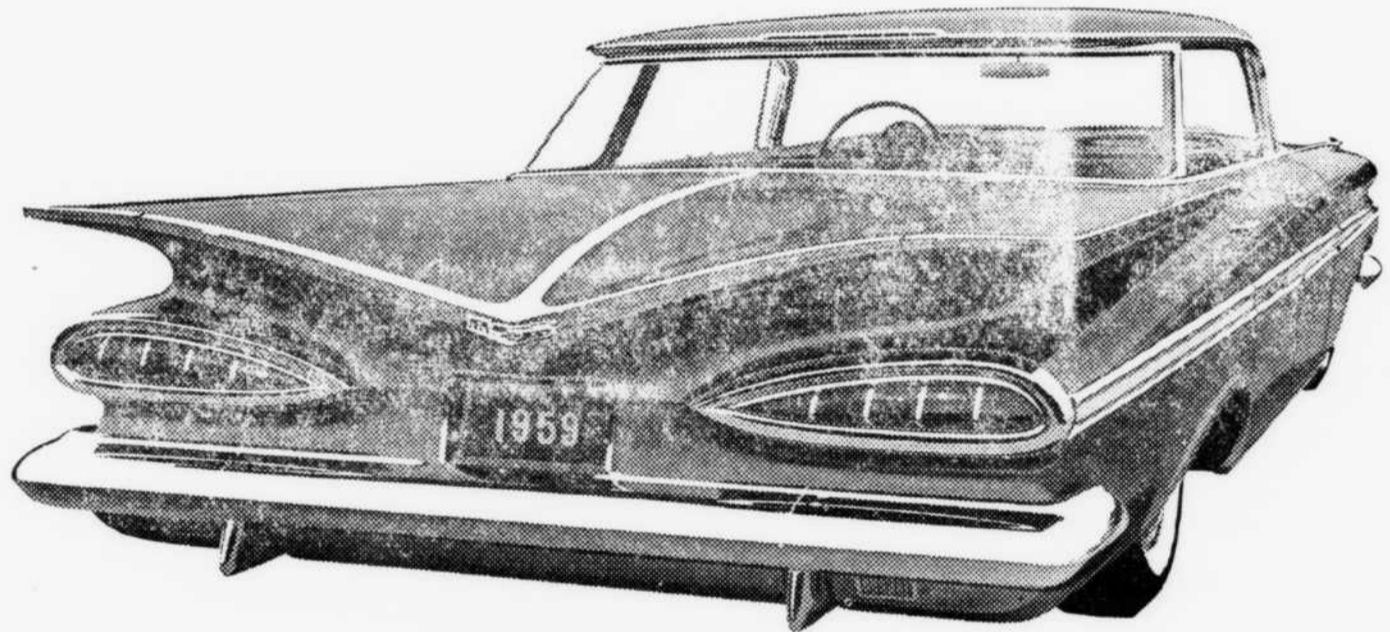
