Bids Open On Fine Arts Building

Newest proposed addition to the Middle Tennessee State College campus will be the Fine Arts Building, plans for which have been completed by John Charles Wheeler, architect. President Q. M. Smith stated that the college would likely ask for bids on the structure about May 15.

The 30,700 square foot, three story building will house the art and music departments. It will be constructed of re-inforced concrete with painting and design laboratories, at studios, class rooms, exhibition gallery, music studios, practice rooms, music listening room, and music library. The building is expected to cost about \$365,000, fully equipped.

Construction on the two new wings of Smith Hall is expected to begin in the immediate future. "We are ready to go", President Q. M. Smith stated this week. The James A. Baker construction company of Nashville were the low bidders on the project that will add accommodations for 208 men.

The bid of \$489,000 includes furnishings that are to be built in. This will include everything but chairs.

One story wings flanking the main structure of the Fine Arts building are designed for band and choral work.

The exterior of the building will be brick and limestone with three colorful terra cotta plaques under the portico, at the main entrance, depicting arts and crafts. There is also provided, on each of the flanking wings, a stone backdrop for the future addition of sculpture.

Designed to give the student an appreciation of the use of art in architecture, the architect for the building is John Charles Wheeler of Nashville. Mr. Wheeler, an alumnus of MTSC, has been the architect for other MTSC buildings. The building portico will change from the recent modern front to (Continued On Page 6)

Teachers College at Greeley, Colorado and Middle Tennessee State, where she received her B.S. degree in 1932. She received the M.A. degree from Peabody College and did additional graduate work at the University of Michigan.

She began teaching in a one room school in Stewart county. From there she became a high school instructor in Greek, Latin and mathematics. Later she served as principal of both elementary and junior high schools in Montgomery county. She taught English in her home high school at Big Rock and immediately preceding her coming to MTSC as associate supervisor of public schools she was for ten years supervising teacher of Stewart county schools.

While at MTSC Miss Betts was active in student affairs and was recognized with membership in Tau Omicron, honor society for women. She also holds membership in Delta Kappa Gamma, Kappa Delta Pi and Pi Gamma Mu. She is a member of the American Association of University Women, the Association for Supervisors and Curriculum Development and regional, state and national education association bodies. Ray Purvis of MTSC placed first in the 100 yard dash to give the Raiders only one first place in the Ohio Valley Conference.

Murray State copped the annual Ohio Valley conference track and field meet May 17 as four new Records were set.

MTSC, a premeet favorite with Murray, was unable to get into blue ribbon competition except for Purvis and finished in a close field just out of the money.

Murray scored 48 1/3 points to winning the meet. A tight race developed for second place with Eastern Kentucky scoring 36 1/3 points, East Tennessee 35, Middle Tennessee 33 1/3, and Tennessee Tech 29 1/2.

Morehead State and Western Kentucky finished far behind with 14 1/2 and 13 points respectively.

Memphis State University captured its second straight Tennessee Intercollegiate Athletic conference track meet last week with Richard Vollmer pacing the way with 19 of his teams 46 1/2 points. This lad placed first in the 100 and 220 yard dashes and captured a first in the broad jump smashing the existing conference record of 22' 8 1/4" with an amazing soar of 23' 1 3/4" and run second to Ed Carson in the 220 yard low hurdles.

Middle Tennessee State was runner-up with 43 points, but couldn't cope with the one man work horse of Vollmer. Ed Carson run the high and low hurdles exceptionally well as he placed first in both events. Marvin Jinnette didn't take first in any event, but emerged as one of MTSC's leading point producers. This was the largest meet of its kind to ever be conducted at Middle Tennessee State College, and was a success even though it rained partially all day.

Coach Elbert Patty's golf team has made tremendous showings in the past two weeks. They placed high in the Southern Intercollegiate tournament by beating such teams as the University of Georgia, Tulane and some of the other outstanding colleges and universities. They also placed second in the TIAC golf tournament held at the Old Hickory fairways this past week being nosed out of first place by Tennessee Tech 609 to 607. Marty Graham won individual honors by winning low medalist for the 36 hole affair.

Blue Raider's baseball team broke the ice and captured their first victory of the season by downing Western Kentucky 7-6 in Bowling Green, Kentucky.

Bobby Tillman, a former Blue Raider football star, has been making a name for himself in the baseball world. Bobby is catching for Raleigh North Carolina in the Carolina league. He is currently hitting the ball at a clip of 400 or more and has knocked several home runs, including a four bagger the first time at bat on opening day.

Coach Ed Diddle, Jr., head basketball mentor at Middle Tennessee State College, has signed William Paul Dailey, Jr., of Benton, Kentucky to a basketball scholarship. Dailey is a 6'4" forward and scored 1,134 points during his high school career.

He and his wife, the former Fledra Ann Collins of Flintville, reside at 709 Drummond Drive in Nashville. The are members of the First Baptist Church there.

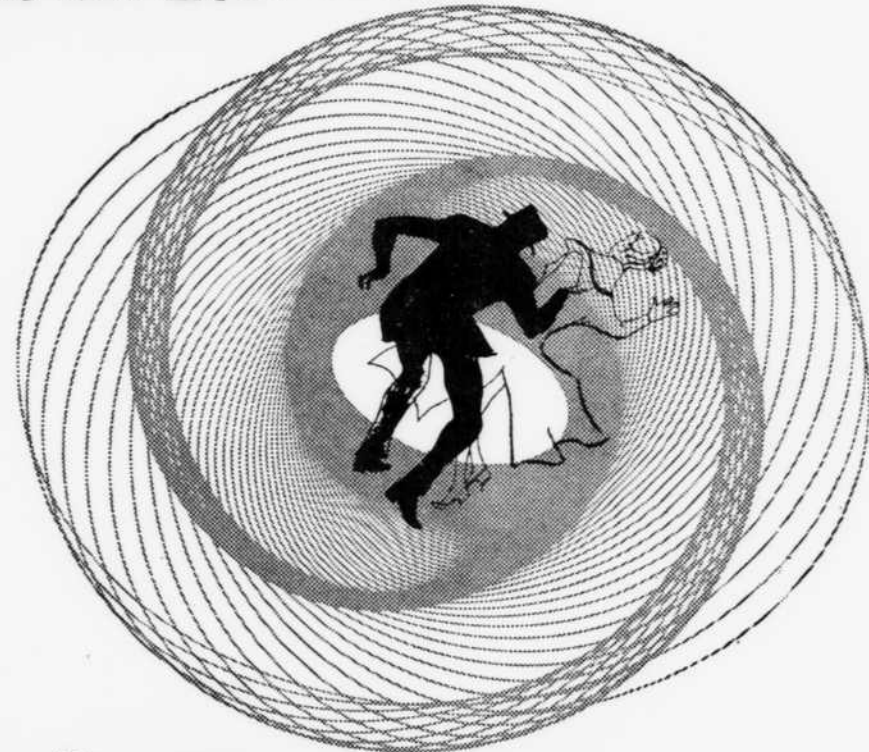
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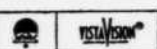
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Recognition Of President Smith's Work Will Feature Alumni-Senior Dinner As Baccalourate Week Begins Saturday
