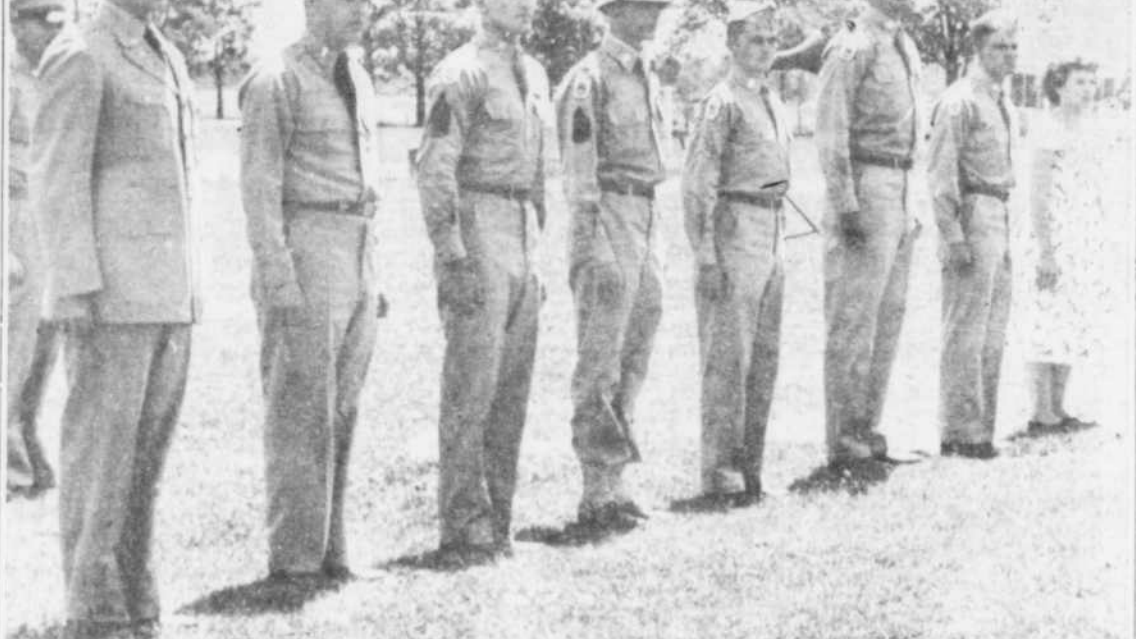
FTA Has Quarterly Social at Willow Plunge

Advertising in the SIDELINES must have paid off—for 29 men at MTSC met with Maj. Henry C. Parker Air Force recruiting officer Miller Lanier of the MTSC aviation department, and their associates Tuesday afternoon, to investigate the possibility of gaining commissions in the Air Force.

In a series of advertisements on the editorial pages of the SIDELINES, the Air Force has been outlining its officer procurement program for the past several weeks.

The Air Force at present is shooting for a goal of 20,000 pilots and other Air Force commissioned officers from among college graduates and qualified undergraduates by January 1, 1953. Various Air Force procurement teams are busy throughout the country in this program.

Major Parker was accompanied by Capt. Charlton H. Wahl and Sgt. Lawrence Timbs of the local recruiting office. Capt. Wahl, an Air Force senior pilot, complimented the work of the MTSC aviation department and told the men that the aviation training received here would be of great help to them in the Air Force.

After Major Parker's address several of the men stayed over to talk with him relative to the Air Force offerings and indications are that a dozen or more will apply for appointments—which now are being processed in about 90 days instead of the three or four months previously required.

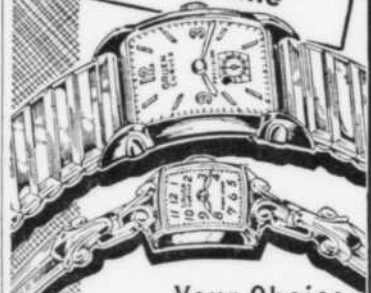
