Track and Field Sports Added; 1953 Budget Its \$38,000

Track and Field sports will become a part of the inter-collegiate athletic program at Middle Tennessee State College next year if the administration committee acts favorably upon the recommendation of the athletic committee.

The athletic committee submitted a budget this week that calls for expenditures of over \$38,000 in 1953-54 as follows: football \$26,450; basketball \$9,629; baseball \$1,584; Tennis \$486; Golf \$386; Track \$340; Wrestling \$547.

This is the largest athletic budget in the history of the school and since no part of State appropriation may be used for athletic purposes it will necessitate the largest gate receipts and concessions sales possible.

Last year total football receipts were \$29,344.99 and basketball \$4,498.33. No charge is made for the other athletic events on the campus. Charges will be made for wrestling this year, authorities state.

Addition of track to the spring sports calendar was made to have the college compete in all Ohio Valley Conference sports.

Major Burney Tucker Receives Heroism Award

Maj. Burney L. Tucker, Jr., of Murfreesboro was recently decorated awards for heroism in extraordinary achievement in aerial flight while a Marine Corps pilot in World War II.

Tucker, who played football at MTSC, received the Distinguished Flying Cross with Gold stars in lieu of a second, third and fourth DFC and the Air Medal stars in lieu of second through 16th Air Medals.

He now resides in Phoenix, Ariz., where he is employed by Varney, architects and engineers. The presentation of the medals was made by Gov. Howard J. Pyle, of Arizona and telecast over video station KUHO-TV.

Registered to Vote?
State Government Class Advocates 'Aye' Vote August 7 for Constitution Change

Members of the class in State and Local Government are entering actively into the campaign of bringing out a favorable vote for the limited constitutional convention in Tennessee. The referendum, scheduled for August 7, is of such interest and importance that the SIDE-LINES is printing herewith one of the articles prepared in the class for distribution to newspapers. Class members will also participate in the preparation of two radio transcriptions to be used in the interest of a constitutional convention.

Those in the class are Charles Carlton, Carol Elizabeth Balsch, Forrest Paul Lofferty, Charles Reese, Mrs. Iva Lee Dill Haynes, R. Eugene Winborn, Leslie Harris, John Robert Hettish, William Russell Woodfin, Mrs. Martha Henson Prater.

Under our form of government the people themselves determine the kind of government they have. The August 7 limited convention procedure invokes sound democratic principles in permitting the sovereign people to decide whether or not some changes are needed in the 82 year old constitution of Tennessee—old and unchanged State constitution in the United States.

At the bottom of the primary election ballot on August 7, 1952 there will be a question calling for a Limited Constitutional Convention. It simply sets in motion the machinery that will require three separate elections and a Constitutional Convention to change our constitution. There are six provisions that the Convention, if authorized by your vote, would be empowered to consider. These are:

1. A less expensive and time-consuming, but equally difficult and conservative method of amending the State Constitution.

2. The raising of the pay of legislators for \$4 per diem to some sum more in keeping with remuneration of the basis of 1952 standards.

3. A four year term for governor.

4. Increase in the Governor's veto power. At present his power is weaker than in 48 of the states.

5. Poll Tax revision, which is no longer an issue, as the 1951 Legislature abolished the poll tax under a previously undiscovered legal method.

6. Authorization of the amending of city charters and county laws by local referendum ("home rule") rather than through private acts of the legislature.

If the majority vote is affirmative in the August 7 primary 99 delegates will be elected in the November 1952 general election. These delegates will be elected from the same district and by the same procedures as the direct and florial
