# Working hard for the money

I usually use this column to expound upon entertainment news and campus-related high jinks. This time, I want to bring a Nashville mother's plight to your attention

The Nashville Scene published an article on Oct. 12 ("Small Time, Big Crime") centered on Claudia Nuñez, an El Salvador native living in Nashville with her husband and two daughters. Nuñez was given a citation for driving

without a license; she reported to court on time, as does any law abiding person. Unfortunately, her legal visa had expired, making her ripe for deportation. Nuñez was "arrested and thrown in an Immigration and Customs Enforcement cell," where she was expected to stay until authorities reached a final deportation decision.

A second article, "Free at Last," appears in this week's Nashville Scene on page 12. According to P.J. Tobia's article, Nuñez has been released from the Memphis federal jail on bond. But her freedom may only be temporary; authorities still have yet to reach a decision and they are "pressing for her deportation." Nuñez may only have a short amount of time left to spend with her family if ICE deports her. Her husband is in the country legally and both daughters are U.S. citizens.

I empathize with Nuñez. Put yourself in her place; would you like to be separated from your children and placed in a FED-ERAL prison with rapists? How about being sent to a country Nuñez describes in the new Scene article, "They will kill you for a dollar," and being separated from your children permanently? What if it was your own parents in her position? I understand our government is supposed to treat every case. equally, but I don't agree with this case. There must be some way for Claudia Nuñez to stay here legally with her family and continue employment! Read the article and make a decision for yourself. If you feel as strongly as I do, please find a way to lend your support.

On the flip side, the Nashville Scene Music Festival 2 is Friday, Nov. 3 in the Belcourt Theatre. Many bands are playing, but I want to extend a resounding "Congratulations" to Murfreesboro bands Juan Prophet Organization, Glossary, and Velcro Stars for being picked to play the festival. This week's cover story is on the NSMF2; for a full list of bands and the story on how the festival came about, flip to page 4.

In related news, the article on page 5 focuses on one of the bands playing the festival and their contribution to the Lance Armstrong Foundation. The DVD review appears on page 8 this week.


Tickets are \$10 for adults, \$8 for seniors and students and \$5 for children 12 and younger. For more information, contact the center at 904-2787.

If names like Bang Bang Bang, The Shazam, Altered Statesman and Autovaughn are instantly recognizable to you, the Nashville Scene and Kaleidoscope Media have just the event to set your alternative heart a-flutter.

A handful of local alternative rock bands were chosen as this year's "Best Of The Nashville Scene's Critics' Picks." The selected artists will perform at the Belcourt Theatre as a part of the Nashville Scene Music Festival 2 on Friday, Nov. 3.

The event, promoted by Kaleidoscope Media, is a show-case for the bands Nashville's premiere entertainment and opinion paper has dubbed "the best of the best" in indie rock.

Shelly Mullins, a Kaleidoscope Media publicist, is sure the event will appeal to the college crowd.

"We've worked with the Scene on a multitude of projects. This one is a must see event," Mullins said.

For one star-packed night, rock fans will be treated to performances from The Turn In, The Worsties and The Hotpipes, who "channel epic rock through

a dizzying mix of driving beat manic guitars and powerhous vocals," according to the Scene

Angie Gore, another publicis with Kaleidoscope, has hig hopes for the event, which wi feature Murfreesboro native Glossary, Juan Prophe Organization and Velcro Stars.

"We have a successful part nership with the Nashvill Scene," Gore said. "They wan to support local music event such as the Americana Foll Festival and now the Nashvill-Scene Music Festival. We use our resources to bring exposurto them and make them as successful as they can be,"

Nashville Scene's dedication to promoting live music event has made it the 'go-to' publication for anyone wishing to stay abreast of happenings in the local music scene.

Dara Carson, events coordinator for Nashville Scene, has seen many changes in Nashville's musical landscape over the years.

"As a community, we have to realize that Nashville isn't just about country music anymore," Carson said. "More and more incredible rock 'n' roll musicians and producers and artists are moving into Nashville from [Los Angeles] and New York.

"We just want to make that we're respecting thing that's making No 'Music City' right now."

Many people are calling [Nashville] a 'Mini-Seattle.' We just want to make sure that we're respecting everything that's making Nashville 'Music City' right now."

The timing of the event presents a welcome challenge for publicist Gore.

"It's the weekend before the Country Music Awards," Gore said. "Nashville's such a musically diverse town."

Austin, Tex. native Wideawake, who will play at Friday's festival, have performed together for over 10 years, according to frontman Scott Leger. The group's touring schedule has brought them to Nashville numerous times through

the years. "Nashville is a great town," Leger said. "We're from Austin. which known for great music. There's kindred spirit between Austin and Nashville. were always told

e sure everyashville that Nashville was the home of country music, but it's so much more."

That "so much more" will have the chance to make its presence known this weekend. If it's anything like previous partnerships between the Nashville Scene and Kaleidoscope Media, attendees can expect massive 'bang' for their indie buck.

There appears to be a definite market for such events like NSMF2 in Music City, according to Carson

"We've been overwhelmed by artists' comments and feedback and the respect and the appreciation [they've expressed] for the events," Carson said.

The Nashville Scene is looking to put on similar events for the jazz and soul music communities in the future.

"We hope to make this a quarterly event," Carson said. "We want all of our music events to reflect all of the diversity in Nashville."



# Hopeful tune for living strong

Cancer foundation benefits from anthem by indie musicians wideawake

Scott Leger doesn't want your money. He has written a hit song that's catching fire and plays for enthusiastic crowds who sing along with every word. But he's not just out to win fans.

He's a man on a mission.

Leger is the lead singer of wideawake, an Austin. Tex.-based rock band, and he is out to wake up some minds about the way people have been taught to fight cancer. Wideawake will have the chance to continue the mission in Nashville as part of the Nashville Scene Music Festival 2.

Leger's objective began a little over two years ago. when a friend of the band was diagnosed with cancer. Upon hearing the news, he began the therapeutic work of writing a song, which deals with the shocking emotions induced by the diagnosis.

"Songwriting is my first love – it's my passion." Leger relates. "I usually write songs on topics that are relevant to my life, experiences I'm going through."

The resulting song, titled "Maybe Tonight, Maybe Tomorrow," has since taken on a life of its own as an anthem for the Lance Armstrong Foundation (LAF).

"A friend of mine is a good friend of [Lance Armstrong] and helped to found [The Lance Armstrong Foundation]," Leger says. "I let him know that a friend of mine had been going through cancer.

"About two years later, we took a demo to the foundation," he continues. "I told them I had a song that I felt was very fitting for what they were doing with the LIVE-STRONG campaign. I told them, it's an anthem, and I'd like for you to have it and use it for whatever you will."

Leger knew the lyrics contained in "Maybe Tonight. Maybe Tomorrow" would provide hope and encouragement to anyone who'd been dealt a difficult blow by life.

The song begins with "I heard the news today/It came out of nowhere/Wish I could run away/But where would I go?" It does not reference cancer directly, but instead addresses the difficulty of facing up to life's challenges with hope and resolve.

Champion cyclist Lance Armstrong founded the Lance Armstrong Foundation in January 1997. For 10 years, LAF has provided practical tools and information for people who have been affected by cancer.

"Armstrong received a diagnosis of advanced testicular cancer that had spread to his abdomen, lungs and brain in October of 1996," Stephanie Elsea, a LAF spokesperson. "He was given less than a 50% chance of survival."

Armstrong did survive, which was highly publicized.

When asked what he credits for his survival, Elsea replies, "Having access to good health care, the support of family and friends who could help him deal with the

diagnosis, finding accurate information, getting the best doctors – and luck."

Armstrong's organization was founded to give others the same fighting chance he received. That's why LAF was the first place Leger thought to bring his song.

"We get solicited like this a lot," says Elsea. "And a lot of the songs, while well-meaning, are not something we want to attach our names to. This one was different. We knew immediately that we wanted to be associated with it.

"The language of it – the quality of it," Elsea explains when asked what made this song different from the rest. "These are full-time musicians who are good at what they do They actually use our motto. LIVESTRONG, in the song."

According to Leger, the proverbial ball began rolling after handing over the song. The foundation began using the song as its anthem in May 2006, with all of the proceeds benefiting LAF.

"The band has licensed the song to us at no charge for us to use in various capacities," Elsea says.

The popular downloading site, iTunes, has gotten on board as well.

"It's not just the band," says Elsea. "All of the proceeds of the downloads from iTunes are being donated to the foundation."

Wideawake couldn't be happier with the opportunity to be associated with an organization such as the Lance Armstrong Foundation.

"They're not only helping people fight the disease, but changing policy and influencing government," Leger says. "A lot of the struggle is the way our medical system is set up. That's where a lot of it's broken. The Lance Armstrong Foundation is trying to fight this disease on every level."

In exchange for their generous gift to LAF, wideawake has been able to reach a wider audience with their music.

"We let them know – when you want to have music, when

you want us to play – we can be there," Leger declares. "They've been using the song in commercials and promotional events."

This opportunity has exposed the band to a different audience than they had been accustomed to playing for.

"People are calling us that weren't calling us before," Leger says. "The association with the Lance Armstrong Foundation has been great."

The song, "Maybe Tonight, Maybe Tomorrow," encapsulates what LAF stands for, according to Elsea.

"The foundation takes a very active approach to survivorship," she states, "In terms of your attitude and really embracing life and making sure you're living life on your terms. And the song is very much about that. It seemed like they really 'got' us."

When asked how Lance Armstrong himself felt about the song, Elsea exclaims, "He loves the song."

This past weekend in Austin. Tex.. LAF had the first "Live Strong Summit." It was a three-day conference where John Kerry and Steve Case (Founder of AOL) were among the speakers.

"We closed the three-day conference playing the song." Leger relates. "We're coming off of a high from that. Everyone sang it with us. It was great. It was an incredible event."

You can catch wideawake this weekend at the Belcourt Theater in Nashville. They'll play a set as part of The Nashville Scene Music Festival. The event is set for Friday. November 3rd, and begins at 4:30. Wideawake is scheduled to perform at 8:30. For a full schedule, visit http://www.belcourt.org.

# Criterion adds two to collection

Those tired of mainstream movies will find venturing into the Criterion Collection DVDs for unique films to be a rewarding experience. Films that have been released under their label come from a wide range of countries, genres and styles.

Criterion's two recent releases are perfect examples of such diversity. They are Alfonso Caurón's "Sólo con tu pareja," which is a 1991 comedy from Mexico, and Lodge Kerrigan's "Clean, Shaven," a 1994 psychological thriller from the United States.

"Sólo con tu pareja" is about Tomás (Daniel Giménez Cacho). a young womanizer who treats females like objects and uses them for his personal gain. He meets his match by Reid Conner

when he unwisely decides to ask a nurse from his doctor's office on a date. When she finds out that he was seeing another woman on the same night of their date and about his habits in general, she gets her revenge by falsely marking his blood test positive for AIDS.


Her cruel joke wreaks havoc on Tomás's life. He loses his job because his boss was the other woman, and he begins to regret the things he has done. In the middle of the calamity, he meets his next-door neighbor, with whom he genuinely falls in love. However, after a series of mishaps, he makes himself look like a raving lunatic in her eyes. Even his suicide attempts do not go as well as he plans.

Although the premise of "Sólo con tu pareja" may sound somewhat depressing, it is actually a pretty funny movie. The great cast and clever script make the film a treat to watch.

Alfonso Caurón has gone on to direct the critically acclaimed "Y tu mamá también" after he made "Sólo con tu pareja." The success of that film eventually helped him land the job of directing "Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban."

"Clean, Shaven," stars Peter Greene as Peter Winter, a schizophrenic man who has recently left an institution. The movie never makes it clear if he was released or if he escaped, but given his actions it's safer to assume he escaped. Winter is so mentally disturbed there is no way an institution would ever let him out.

With his newfound freedom, Winter goes on a quest

to find his daughter while he battles voices in his head and demons brought on by his mental state. Winter's illness causes him to have mental breakdowns and perform acts of self-mutilation. He believes he has a radio transistor in his head that he tries to dig out with a pair of scissors.

Kerrigan does a great job of capturing Winter's corroded state of mind by using unusual sounds, such as radio feedback, as a soundtrack. Peter Greene, who has been seen in "Pulp Fiction" and "The Usual Suspects," and gives an amazing performance.

Although the movie is quite disturbing, "Clean, Shaven" is a well-acted, thought-provoking film that will stay with you long after you see it.

Criterion shows its love for the movies selected by filling their DVDs with great bonus features. "Sólo con tu pareja" includes Alfonso Caurón's short film "Quartet for the End of Time" and a new documentary featuring interviews with the cast and crew. "Clean, Shaven" includes mp3 files of the film's unique soundtrack that can be loaded onto your computer or mp3 player for further listening. How cool is that!

These two films are great additions to Criterion's everexpanding catalog and are definitely worth a look. There are about 350 titles in the Criterion Collection, and it's amazing there are still quality films being uncovered and added to the library to this day. Even with Krzysztof Kieslowski's "The Double Life of Veronique" and William Greaves's unusual fiction/documentary hybrid "Symbiopsychotaxiplasm," having recently been announced for release, there is still more to come.
