





Anyway, let me bring you up to date on the most recent happenings in the hip-hop world:

Sean "Puffy" Combs and Heavy D have been found negligent in a celebrity basketball game that took place back in 1991 and left nine fans dead and dozens more injured. Several members of the NYPD arriving at the scene, smashed a window and dragged Marley out of the burning car. Upon hearing of the fire outside, "Lauryn came running out of the studio hysterical. She thought he was still in the car," said Officer Segura, one of the officers who saved her husband. Marley recovered fully after being taken to St. Claire's Hospital and being treated for smoke inhalation.

A Civil Action is Not Your Typical Courtroom Drama

Legal films usually incorporate a David and Goliath story with a young lawyer taking on a huge corporation. The young lawyer usually matures and becomes a better man by the end of the film.

A Civil Action also incorporates a version of the David and Goliath story but there are more twists, turns, and character variations.

In this true story, John Travolta plays Jan Schlichtmann, a self-absorbed, greedy personal injury lawyer who represents eight Woburn, Massachusetts families in a lawsuit against two corporations, W.R. Grace and Beatrice Foods.

The two corporations are accused of the illegal dumping of solvents in Woburn's drinking water during the late 1970's, resulting in the deaths of eight children.

The chief litigator for Beatrice Foods is Jerome Facher, played by Robert Duvall in an Oscar-worthy performance. Facher also teaches law at Harvard. There are other lawyers involved in the case but Facher and Schlichtmann are the head honchos.

Like most courtroom

dramas, there are many exciting arguments, but what separates A Civil Action from other courtroom drama are its two main characters, Schlichtmann and Facher.

Jan Schlichtman gets the all-time movie award for the lawyer most in need of redemption. At first, he refuses to take the families case because he is a personal injury lawyer. Personal injury lawyers do not get paid unless their clients do. Personal injury lawyers also have to put the money up front to fund the case.

Schlichtman takes the case when he realizes the two corporations are involved and he can turn a huge profit if he beats them in a lawsuit.

As Schlichtman begins to feel the pain of his clients, his quest for judgment overshadows his greed. He turns down hefty settlements because he does not feel they are enough. Schlichtman ends up putting all his finances into the funding of the case.

Jerome Facher is not your typical hotshot corporate lawyer from most courtroom films. He is an old fashioned lawyer who has been practicing law for over forty years. He has a quiet manner and never raises his voice. While Schlichtman gets emotional and loses his temper during a case,

dramas, there are many Facher calmly manipulates the exciting arguments, but what situation to his advantage.

Duvall's performance is terrific and the best attraction of the film. Duvall's performance shows us that his character is a great lawyer who has been in the courtroom too long to be worried about any lawsuits.


Travolta is likable in the lead role and his emotional transformation is convincing. As for other performances, John Lithgow is terrific as usual as the judge. So is William H. Macy as Schlichtmann's financial advisor.

Steve Zallian, the director and screenwriter, gives us an interesting and intriguing drama that keeps us enthralled from beginning to end. A great use of foreshadowing comes when scenes from the case are intercut with Facher lecturing over the do's and don'ts in a courtroom.

The only problem with A Civil Action is that it seems to have too many climaxes. I thought the film was going to end three different times. Too many climaxes can tire a viewer.

A Civil Action is a one of the great courtroom dramas and is destined to be a classic. Look for it to have several nominations when the Oscars roll around.

THE THIN RED LINE. Terrence Malick's brilliant new film, an adaptation of James Jones' World War II novel, is the finest contemporary war film I've seen, supplanting Steven Spielberg's "Saving Private Ryan" (1998) or even Oliver Stone's "Platoon" (1986). We follow the fortunes of a group of soldiers in the horrific battles for the pivotal island of Guadalcanal. They include an Army lieutenant colonel (Nick Nolte), a heroic sergeant (Sean Penn) and a soulful soldier (Jim Caviezel) who has lived among the South Sea islanders in their beautiful, natural state and is forever questioning why

it must be disturbed. Though Malick effectively takes us on patrol through the tall grasses of the island, allowing us to experience the tensions of fighting a hidden enemy, more compelling than the expertly staged combat sequences are particular images: a partially submerged crocodile that

represents the lurking impulse for war in the human spirit and a long road facing a soldier who talks wistfully and futilely about trying to come back from combat as "the man I was before." R. 4 stars.

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

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
