The new comic book shop recycles an old favorite

For 20 years, there was a comic book store located at 1511 East Main St., a simple stone's throw away from MTSU. It was a place where people from all walks of life could gather and read the latest independent books or play with the newest collectable card game.

This eclectic shop was open until November of last year, when illness forced owner Kevin Rhodes to close the doors.

But like the phoenix, or any random cast member of *X-Men*, the store has risen from the ashes.

One name change later, and What It Is has become The Secret Lair.

And the person responsible for this is none other than former production and graphic designer, Michael Teeter.

"We want this place to Magic

be not just a comic book store, Teeter said. "There are a lot of good memories here and we're trying to give comic book aficionados a causal atmosphere where they can hang out."

Referring to a longtime staple of the store, the independent comic, Teeter said that The Secret Lair can still be counted on.

Meaning that besides the latest issue of *Superman* and *The Amazing Spider-Man*, customers can expect to see comic books like *Ninja High School* and the underground classic, *Milk & Cheese*.

Providing alternatives to the bigger company books is pretty much what the store is about and this is one thing that won't change.

"We're trying to get the Magic and Gathering



The sale ends Sunday. •


Sweaty, spandexed wrestlers abound in 'Wrestlecrap'

grown so large that it was no longer able to handle the traffic. But such a monument to badness couldn't stay down forever. The Web site rose again, albeit in a much smaller form.


The ECW Press company later approached Baer and his wrestling comrad R.D. Reynolds – hoping to translate the Web site into book form.



Ocalist Tom Hockensmith talks about his air and Nashville's punchy indie rock scene

Recently, (flash)zz editor Joey Hood drank Coffee with haired lead vocalist and discussed the band's works, music, career and future. Lume is on the forefood swanky: Nashville's burgeoning independent rock scene with their rustic interpretation of country music, paired with more contemporary emo-rock reflection.

Joey Hood: So, what is your earliest musical memory?

Tom Hockensmith: Actually that would probably be my dad having his musician friends over. It would be Saturday night and they would play Eric Clapton and Stevie Ray Vaughan. I really enjoyed their white man blues.

JH: In our previous interview on MTSU's campus radio station, WMTS 88.3, you mentioned singing in a church choir as a little kid. My question to you is this; have you ever considered a career as a Christian rocker?

TH: There was a point in my life where church was my only musical outlet. I'm not a Christian rocker by any means. I'll probably get ousted from the church for saying that.

JH: So Creed doesn't do it for you musically?

TH: I can't stand Creed. Actually, Incubus takes a dig at Creed in their new single on radio. It's really funny. Have you heard it? JH: I never listen to the radio. TH: I don't listen that much either

JH: Also during our previous interview, I became quite fond of your spiky hair. Now is your hair naturally spiky or do you gel it up?

TH: (laughs) It's Bumble N' Bumble hair gel. Actually, this delves into my day job. I work for hair salons where I make sure all Nashville area salons are adequately stocked. Sometimes, I keep the gels for myself. Otherwise, I can never afford it.

JH: Just curious, what album in your record collection are you most ashamed of?

TH: (pauses briefly) I can't believe you asked that question. I would have to say Kylie Minogue's *Fever*. When she shakes her ass, it makes you want to buy the record.

JH: Deplorable. I think with the rampant ass shaking and the pilfering of hair care products, the Christian church will not be inviting

you back anytime soon. But moving onto another topic, let's talk briefly about *Extended Play*. I hear that your album is doing quite well on the *College Music Journal*'s indie rock chart.

TH: That's actually *EP2. Extended Play* ended up in *CMJ*'s top 100 for two weeks. But our most recent effort ended up in the top 10 for two months. Actually, *EP2* hasn't been released to record stores. We're putting a demand out for *EP2*. You can tell that we're really creative about our album titles, can't you?

JH: Oh, don't I know it. Speaking of recent successes, though, I've also heard that *EP2*'s "Ghost of John Wayne" received airplay on MTV. How did that come about?

TH: The way "Ghost of John Wayne" got on MTV was crazy. Randomly, some guy from Los Angeles called us. And he was like, "I got your disc. A contact from Warner Chapel gave me your disc." And then he put "Ghost of John Wayne" into the *Camp Jim* show. Also he put us on NBC's *Iron Man* competition. The funny thing is that we don't know any of these people at all.

JH: That's weird. TH: Yeah.

JH: My nonchalant interviewing skills are confirmed with this next question, or rather command. Tell the [flash] readers about Humdrum and how they can become involved with Nashville's burgeoning rock scene. Begin.

TH: Humdrum is hard to explain. It began with a bunch of musicians sitting around in Sherlock's Pub and complaining about the industry. We wanted to make something happen on our own. So basically we formed this band coalition. Anybody can come to the table whether you have a little or a lot to contribute. We pretty much let anyone become involved with Humdrum as long as they're passionate about music.

JH: So is Humdrum mostly an organization for indie rock bands?

TH: Pretty much. We have some friends in pop bands that are involved with Humdrum though. The whole idea of us putting out the compilation is for the newer bands that don't have much exposure. And then we have Imaginary Baseball League and our band that are able to play regional shows. So we take these compilations with us on the road to make people

more aware of what's going on in Nashville.

JH: So how would an indie rock fan like myself become involved with Humdrum?


TH: Well we have monthly meetings. Anyone is invited to the meetings at Blue Sky Court. Basically, it's just a way to network and communicate with other people. It's almost a social club too.

JH: Unfortunately, I think that our time together is drawing to a close. As you can see, I brought my own personal copy of *Extended Play* to the interview. I was contemplating whether or not I should force you to autograph my copy. But then I told myself, "Joey, don't be an ass." I talk to myself occasionally, you see.

TH: (laughs) Actually nobody hounds us for autographs in Nashville. At regional gigs, there's always a couple of girls in the audience that will want autographs. It kind of makes me feel uncomfortable. (pauses) Thanks for not making me sign your copy of *Extended Play*.

JH: You're welcome.

Championship Wrestling from 1994 to 1996, he seems to be building up the arrival of the New World Order. Yet the next chapter deals with Vince McMahon's foray into the world of professional bodybuilding in the early '90s.

But all that insanity aside, the book is pretty darn funny.

The egos involved in the production of this sport will make you wonder how any-thing gets accomplished.

The authors feature both the World Wrestling Entertainment and the now defunct WCW promotions, with special chapters devoted to Hulk Hogan's disastrous dive into Hollywood and the mass insanity otherwise known as The Ultimate Warrior.

Baer keeps his sense of humor throughout *Wrestlecrap* and just hearing the account of wrestling

star Shockmaster making his debut by tripping through a breakaway wall and falling on his face will leave a grin on yours.

All in all, *Wrestlecrap* is a must read for any fan of sports entertainment or the non-fan as well.

Although if you're not a fan, this book might convince you that you were right in your decision.
