ROTC Cadet Corps Sets Record With 1094

In conjunction with Middle Tennessee State College's 50th Anniversary, the Department of Military Science has established a new high in cadets enrolled in the R.O.T.C. program.

The current enrolled strength of the Cadet Corps surpasses all previous strength figures in past years, and this year promises not only the biggest, but also the best cadet program—both militarily and socially.

The Reserve Officers Training Program began at Middle Tennessee State College in 1950. The program was then under the direction of Lt. Colonel McClean, and the Cadet Corps at that time consisted of 93 cadets and eleven cadet officers. The 1961 program is composed of 680 freshmen, 347 sophomores, 28 juniors (cadet non-commissioned officers), 39 seniors (cadet officers), thus composing a complete cadet corps of 1094.

The Cadet Corps is commanded by Charles E. Crowe, Chattanooga. Cadet Crowe has a very fine R.O.T.C. record, having been chosen as "outstanding cadet" of both his freshman and sophomore class. He was commander of The Sam Davis Rifles his sophomore year and was chosen as the top cadet in his company at R.O.T.C. camp, Ft. Benning, Georgia, this past summer. Crowe has also been chosen as a Distinguished Military Student.

Cadet Crowe's Executive Officer is Charles Tucker, Shelbyville. Cadet Tucker was platoon sergeant of The Sam Davis Rifles his sophomore year and is also a Distinguished Military Student. The Cadet Corps Commander also has a four man staff to aid him in administrative duties.

The cadet staff officers are: Terrell Dilly, Smyrna; Roger Wilkerson, Nashville; Robert Rose, Decatur; and Robert Sturdivant, Nashville. Cadet Sergeant-Major Don Stone, Murfreesboro, and Cadet Operations Sergeant Robert Boyd, Murfreesboro are the non-commissioned officers on the cadet corps commander's staff.

The cadet corps is divided into six companies and each company contains one cadet company commander. (Continued on Page 6)

New Room Reservation Plan Announced By Cope

POLICY IN REGARD TO RESERVATION OF DORMITORY ROOMS, COSTS, AND PROCEDURE TO BECOME EFFECTIVE WITH THE FALL SEMESTER, SEPTEMBER, 1962

Dr. Quill E. Cope has announced the following policy relative to room reservations for the future. This year more than 400 students who made applications during the summer could not be accommodated with rooms. Yet last minute cancellations left rooms available in early September.

The demand for dormitory rooms for the year 1961-62 greatly exceeded the supply and there is every indication that this will become an increasingly serious problem. In order to give preference to those students who have made acceptable records or who have not previously been enrolled in Middle Tennessee State College, the following policies will become effective with the school year 1961-63:

1. All students now occupying dormitory rooms who have a cumulative academic average of 2.0 or above will be given first preference on dormitory rooms.
2. Students now enrolled or who have been enrolled in the past who now live in town or are commuting who have a cumulative academic average of 2.0 or above will be given second preference.
3. Incoming freshmen will be given third preference.
4. Transfer students with a 2.0 cumulative average or above will be given fourth preference.
5. After the above four groups have been taken care of by dormitory rooms, if additional spaces are available, students on academic probation will be given preference in terms of the grade average. For example, a student with a 1.9 average will be given preference over a student with a 1.8 average and down the academic list until dormitories are filled in this order: 1.9, 1.8, 1.7, etc.

It should be understood that room changes will be made on this basis only at the beginning of the fall semester and that the overall dormitory organization will be kept intact.

The above policies will be used in allocating dormitory spaces until July 1. After July 1, dormitory spaces will be filled without regard to academic standing. A student on academic probation (under 2.0) who has been readmitted for the following year may file application for a dormitory room with the room deposit which will be kept on file until July 1. Immediately following July 1 these students will be notified whether or not they will have a dormitory room. If no room is available, their deposit will be refunded.

Gonce Notes Great Interest In Sciences

MTSC students signified a greatly increased interest in advanced course in mathematics, science and geography since Sputnik was placed in orbit by the Russians in 1958 according to a dissertation prepared by Dr. James H. Gonce of the MTSC industrial arts department faculty. The dissertation was in partial fulfillment of the requirements for the Doctor of Education degree which was conferred on Dr. Gonce at the August 18 convention of Peabody College.

"Changes in the High School Program and Achievement of Students Entering MTSC" was the title of Dr. Gonce's dissertation. Included in the test was a statistical study of the course work of students who graduated prior to 1957-58 and the post-sputnik graduates and students at the Murfreesboro college. The study revealed that greater numbers were registering for the mathematics, physics, chemistry and world geography courses, but that scores on achievement tests had not shown a marked change of knowledge acquired in these fields. The survey also led to the conclusion that there had been no significant increase in interest in

April 1 Is Deadline For Dormitory Refunds

This year, 1961-62, we had a much greater room cancellation than in past years, indicating students were making multiple reservations. Effective with reservations for the year 1961-63, the following policies will become effective:

1. An out-of-state student who requests dormitory space will be required to deposit a full semester's rent. In the event this student cancels the reservation before August 1, half of the deposit will be refunded. In the event he cancels his reservation after August 1, none of the reservation will be refunded.
2. A \$30 room deposit will be required from students residing in the State of Tennessee. Fifteen dollars of this deposit will be refunded if cancellations are made prior to August 1, but none of the reservation will be refunded if the reservation is cancelled after August 1.
3. The dormitory reservation deposit will be applied on the first semester's rent for those students who occupy the dormitory spaces in the fall of 1962.
4. Students presently in dormitories will request a refund of all room deposits on or about April 1. Then these students will deposit a room reservation of \$30 if Tennessee students and one semester's room rent if an out-of-state student, on or before May 1 if they expect to hold their room for 1961-63.
5. A block of rooms will be reserved for incoming freshman work scholarship students, which will be held until May 1. If the student does not claim his room by that date, these rooms will be made available for other students. All scholarship students, both academic and athletic, will be expected to comply with the above regulations concerning academic probation if they expect to occupy dormitory rooms.

Dangler Plans Year of Study In Germany

Margaret Leah Dangler, Dunlap, Tennessee, has been accepted as a member of the junior year at Heidelberg University and will spend the coming year studying at the famous German university.

Margaret will be one of 25 students selected from 15 different colleges and universities who will participate in this program, which is sponsored by Heidelberg College, Tiffin, Ohio. Margaret was recommended by Mrs. Ortrun Gilbert, professor of German at Middle Tennessee State College.

Accompanied by Dr. Charles M. Prugh of Heidelberg College, the group will sail from New York City on October 6 aboard the ocean liner STATENDAM.

Landing in Southampton, England, one week later, the students will visit London and its environs for three days before proceeding to the European continent. Four days will be spent in travel through Belgium and Germany before arriving in Heidelberg on October 19.

Formal studies at the University of Heidelberg begin with the opening of the Winter Semester on November 1. The students will concentrate upon the German language and literature, although opportunities are given to pursue courses in other fields of interest.

The months of March and April are vacation periods for students at German universities and provide excellent opportunities for travel in Germany and other European countries.

The group will finish the academic year aboard at the end of July 1962, and will return to the United States soon thereafter.

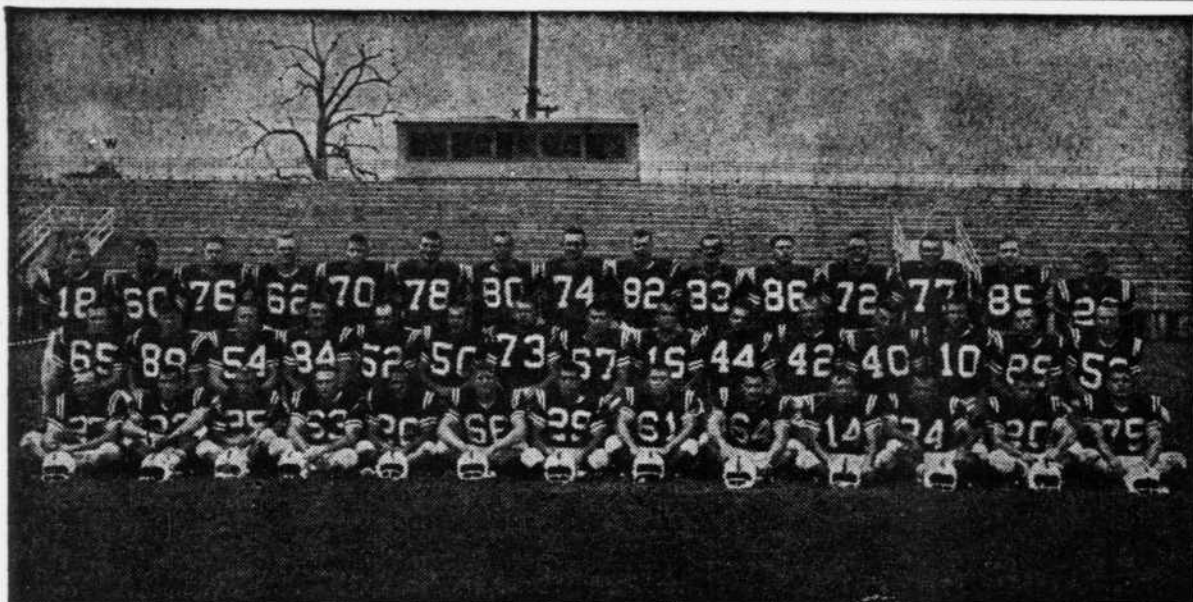

Coach Charles "Bubber" Murphy's sophomore dominated squad found reserve strength in more second year men. Ends included Frank Hilliburton (Nashville) and George Dykes (Oak Ridge); tackles Gerald Hayes (LaFayette, Ga.), Howard Smith (Murfreesboro), Calvin Short (Joelton), and David Blair (Columbia).

Charles Hallum (Lebanon) was the only sophomore guard, and halfback Jim Mundy (Gallatin) gave the Raiders a total of 14 sophomores from a dress list of 38. Two second year men were on the injured list and did not make the trip to Clarksville. They included fullback Bill Hobbs (Whitwell) and quarterback Bob Kerr (Chapel Hill).

Even better news to Blue Raider supporters, is that eleven of the MTSC gridgers are classified as freshmen in eligibility. The Ohio Valley Conference permits four years of football competition for teams not playing a freshman schedule.

Former Raiders, Bucky Pitts and Ralph Adams (of the 1959 Tangerine Bowl Champs) are bringing the Fayetteville Tigers of the Central Tennessee Conference closer to the state crown. The two young coaches, only their second in this capacity, with Pitts at the helm, have guided their team to four straight victories, the last being a 74-0 rout of McMinnville City, and a possible No. 1 rating in the state.

Dean Fisher '60 and Hester Gibbs '59 are former Raiders assisting at Lebanon, who incidentally has a 4-0 record.
