New funding formula increases MTSU budget

MTSU would receive \$800,000 more for 1996-97 fiscal year if THEC proposal used

An additional \$810,733 would go into MTSU's operating budget if the state legislature adopts the Tennessee Higher Education Commission's (THEC's) Friday recommendation on state-wide budgets instead of the governor's

MTSU President James Walker said the extra money would give officials more flexibility when determining how the operating budget will be spread across the university.

THEC's \$62.35 million recommendation for MTSU is based on a new funding formula, and the governor's \$61.53 million recommendation relies on the old formula, according to THEC Deputy Executive Director Cathy Cole.

The funding formula determines how state higher education dollars are dispersed to all institutions in the state for the individual operating budgets. The formula does not affect how the state disperses funds for capital building projects like MTSU's library. MTSU's total budget was over \$100 million last year after adding donations, student fees and other university-generated funds to the state allocation.

The 1996-1997 fiscal year is the first year that the new, THECdeveloped funding formula will be implemented. THEC is statutorily responsible to develop both the operating and capital budget recommendations in a fair and equitable manner for higher education institutions in the state, Cole said.

"We had concerns from both the

legislature and executive branches regarding the credibility of the formula that we were using to allocate the funds," Cole said. So THEC developed

a new one.

Funding equitably While the state is basing operating budget allocations on the new formula,

the state does not have enough money this year to fully fund it.

THEC's recommendation recognizes that the formula is not yet

fully funded and tries to reduce the range of funding variation from institution to institution, Cole said.

The governor's proposal has a range of funding variation from 100.72 percent for the most funded to 85.77 percent for the least funded when compared to the new formula. THEC's recommendation shows a variation from 98.85 percent to 88.88 percent.

THEC's recommendation also allows for institutions which will receive less funding under the new formula to use the 1996-1997 fiscal year to adapt to less funding.

Tennessee Tech is one of the hardest hit schools under the new formula. While the university receives the highest percentage of funding (98.85 percent) under THEC's recommendation, it would receive \$700,000 less than what the the old formula would provide.

For MTSU, THEC's recommendation reflects only 92.7 percent of the amount determined under the new formula yet the university's operating budget would increase over \$800,000. The University of Tennessee-Knoxville would be funded at 96.9 percent, but would receive \$1.38 million less than what the governor recommended.

MTSU and the extra \$810,733

While THEC's recommendation is brighter for MTSU, nothing is definite until the state legislature passes the final budget around April.

Until the final numbers are figured, MTSU officials can't make any final decisions on how to use the funds, according to Vice President for Finance and Administration Duane Stucky.

"We'll continue to monitor what's going to happen throughout the legislative session, but our [final] planning starts [after the state budget is passed]," Stucky said.

According to Stucky, plans on the top of the list include continuing pay

Gangster rap to be subject

evaluated for possible change

Ole Blue might be out of a job in a year or two.

Or maybe not.

President James Walker has formed an ad hoc committee composed of students, faculty, staff, alumni and members of the Murfreesboro community to evaluate the university's logo and mascot.

"People keep asking us how does a dog relate to a Blue Raider," Walker said.

Evaluating the school symbols is one of the four recommendations outlined in the Athletic Master Plan which was developed for the university in 1991. A consulting firm handled the plan and made recommendations based on surveys and studies within and without the MTSU community.

However, as Walker pointed out, the school symbols are only being evaluated and not necessarily changed.

The committee is also examining the possibility of making the school colors on athletic uniforms consistent. Currently, the teams use variations of blue, white, silver and black.

The first committee meeting was held last week and no defined process for evaluating the symbols has been developed. Walker said he doesn't want to rush the committee.

Walker said he hopes the university can implement any changes for the fall 1997 semester.

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The committee has been instructed to develop a method of providing all interested members of the MTSU community a way to provide input, Walker said.

Author Bakari Kitwana will present a lecture addressing the impact of gangster rap on the image of African American men and women as part of the African-American History Month events on campus, . In his recent book, "The Rap on

Gangsta Rap," Kitwana provides a critical overview of the music popularly called "gangsta rap," according to Adonijak Bakari, MTSU assistant professor of history.

Bakari said Kitwana is concerned about the image portrayed by blacks

in television, film, video, advertisements, news and magazines.

Placing corporate elite commercialization of rap music in its political, social and cultural context, he addresses the late twentieth century-styled criminalization of black men and hyper-sexualization of black women through the entertainment industry, Bakari said.

"There has been a lot of misinformation about rap music, mainly in terms of its characterization," Kitwana said. "It's

SGA prez will sign new act despite flaws in wording

Shane McFarland, president of Student Government Association (SGA), plans to sign the Comprehensive Electoral Act of 1996 despite some grammatical errors.

Expenditure limits on campaigns and all expenditure forms are eliminated through the Electoral Act, and guidelines for political parties are established. The act also changes the election of senators from class rank to election through the college of their major.

The Electoral Act was passed by SGA Congress during the joint House/Senate .meeting last Wednesday. Although many SGA members expressed concerns with some sections, it was decided to pass

the act "as is" and amend it later.


"I thought [the Electoral Act Revision Committee] did a good job," said Tom Burke, dean of Student Life and advisor to SGA. "There are just some things I had hoped would be cleaned up before it went to vote."

Most of the changes McFarland and Burke would like to see in the act are purely grammatical.

"[The Electoral Act is] OK because you've got people now who know what's going on, but you've got to have something that can be understood in the future," McFarland said. "It's got to be clear cut."

McFarland said he sees problems with provisions for the party system contained within the act. The

act. The Electoral Act states that candidates running with a party need not turn in a petition to campaign with a required number of student signatures.

"Is it fair for John Doe to have to go out and get 150 signatures when someone running with a party does not?" McFarland said.

There are also some problems involving the election of the Homecoming Queen, according to McFarland. That is "no big deal" however because Homecoming Queen elections are not until the fall, he said.

"The big issue is: do you want to have [spring SGA] elections and do you want to have them on time," said Chad White, junior senator and member of the Electoral Act Revision Committee. "The main issue here is to avoid a conflict over which we can't have legislation."

Time is a factor in the revisions of the Electoral Act due to constitutional changes made last semester. Spring SGA elections can not be held until the Electoral Act has been revised, passed by both House and Senate, and signed by both McFarland and Vice President for Student Affairs Robert LaLance.

"This is a good solid piece of legislation," White said. "I think we will have a much better electoral process than we have had in the past.

"The best interests of the students here are being upheld by them passing it." \bullet





Student loan defaults declining

WASHINGTON-The number of college graduates who default on their student loans has dropped sharply, according to Education Secretary Richard Riley.

In 1990, about one in every five borrowers were failing to pay back their student loans. The most recent study, from 1993, shows that figure has dropped to one in 10.

The dramatic decline in default rates, coupled with an equally impressive rise in defaulted loan collections, has reduced the taxpayers' burden by millions of dollars," Riley said at a news conference in January.

Tough new sanctions imposed by Congress, combined with efforts by colleges and the Education Department to reduce defaults, have helped to improve the problem, Riley said.

Each year, student loan defaults cost taxpayers billions annually. In fiscal year 1995, the U.S. Treasury paid out \$2.4 billion to cover defaulted student loans.

But total collections of \$2 billion by the Education Department and guaranty agencies brought the net default rate down to \$400 million-a two-thirds reduction from a net default cost of \$1.7 billion in fiscal 1992.

The Education Department has been fighting off criticism by many Republican budgetcutters, who blame past high default rates on poor are paying off.

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management.

legislators have pointed to default rates as a reason why the Clinton administration's direct student loan program should be scrapped.

The direct student loan program allows students to bypass banks and other lenders and borrow money from their schools through the Education Department.

"These significant default reductions and loan collections should quiet critics who claim we aren't up to the task and, therefore, shouldn't be entrusted to manage the direct loan program," Riley said. "These figures are a clear

indication that we can do the job and do it well.'

Riley acknowledged that an improving economy started during the Bush administration helped has deflate the default rate.

But he said the department's programs, including a new National Student Data Loan System that monitors student aid applications prevent to ineligible students from receiving loans,


In 1995, the government Most recently, GOP collected \$2 billion from defaulters, compared to less than \$500 million in the eighties.

Also, about 600 schools with high default rates were removed from the federal student loan program.

The government collects money from defaulters by taking their income tax refund and garnishing wages.

The bad news for defaulters is that they face a bad credit rating and the loss of further student aid.

However, borrowers now have the option to consolidate their loans and make payments based on income, Riley said.



Christianity is not moral authority in U.S.; gays seek only equal rights



I am responding to Mr. James Elliott's letter that was printed in the Feb. 8 issue of Sidelines. My first reaction/response is, Mr. Elliott could you please define "normal?" The 1994 edition of The Merriam Webster Dictionary defines normal as, "1 adj. 1: regular, standard, natural 2: of average intelligence: also: sound in mind and body; 2 n. 1: one that is normal 2: the usual condition, level, or quantity.'

Since you use the word as an adjective I assume you would apply the first definition, but again, which part? Let's look at the 1992 edition of Roget's 21st Century Thesaurus for other words that are synonyms for normal. Maybe that would help us to understand what you mean by the use of the word. Normal as an adjective can be replaced with: intrinsic, inherent, implanted, innate, inborn, inbred, fundamental, hereditary, subjective, peculiar, idiosyncratic, average, mediocre, rigid, uncompromising, and many, many more ...

Well which of these apply to your letter? Or do any fit? I personally fit into all three of the dictionary's definitions for normal as an adjective. I am 5'6", slightly over weight, brown hair and have hazel eyes. I would say that's regular, standard or natural. My I.Q. is perhaps a little above

average at 120-121, but that shouldn't be too much of a discrepancy. And I am in good overall health. So, would you say that I am "normal?" But, I am a nontraditional student, I am disabled, I practice a non-Christian religion, and oh yes, I am bisexual. There goes my "normal" classification doesn't it.

The next thing I would like to address is your description of homosexuality as "moral degeneracy and sexual deviancy." First of all, I would really like to know where it is written (in stone?) that the Christian religion, (I am making the assumption that you are speaking from a Christian viewpoint when you say "moral," I apologize if I am mistaken), is the yard-stick for morality in the United States, the country that at its birth insisted upon the decision to allow Freedom of Religion. There are many religions that do not have a problem with homosexuality, mine included. Would you IMPOSE your religion's standards on me or anyone else? If so, then perhaps the homosexual issue isn't the one that needs to be addressed here at all.

Secondly, what do you consider sexually deviant? Most early writings proposed that any sexual position besides the basic missionary position was to be considered deviant. Oral sex for the better part of history, even into this half of this century, was considered deviant. In some societies/times, holding hands or kissing in public was and still is considered sexually deviant. Again I ask, which definition are we to follow?

As to the question of rights, you say that "every homosexual has the same constitutional rights as the rest of us." I beg to differ. ... Let me point out some rights that people identifying as homosexual or bisexual aren't automatically granted.

Let me point out some rights that people identifying as homosexual or bisexual aren't automatically granted.

Amendment one of the constitution states, along with other items, "the right of the people to peaceably assemble ... " Have you ever heard of Stonewall, Mr. Elliott? Twenty-six years ago a group of homosexuals were gathered in a bar peacefully enjoying themselves, not breaking any laws, when the New York Police Department decided to raid the establishment. The reason for the raid: it was a known homosexual "hang out." I know of no similar incident where a "straight" bar has been raided just because of the sexual identity of its patrons.

Amendment five states, among other items, "nor shall any person...be deprived of life, liberty, or property, without due process of law...." Are you aware that people identifying as homosexual can be kicked out of their apartments or homes for the sole reason of their sexual identification? Or that people are being beaten to death on their way to and from homosexual establishments? That people are being confined to mental institutions so that they can be "cured" of their mental illness of sexual identity? All without redress.

Those are just a few examples of constitutional discrepancies. As for basic human rights, many times I have read in these pages and others the question, "Why do gays want special rights?" My answer is this, we do NOT want special rights! We want Equal rights. We want the right to feel safe anywhere we go. We want the right to Love any person we choose. We want the right to have our Unions recognized by law. We want the right to Have and Keep our own children. We want the right to have the person we have loved and lived with for the past however many years to be able to Make Medical Decisions for us in the event we

cannot do so for ourselves. We want the right to work where we want without fear of Losing our Jobs. We want the same basic rights and expectations that every human being wants!


Finally Mr. Elliott, I am glad that you and "the great majority of normal citi-zens" don't hate homosexuals. That means that maybe I can be safe walking home from a friend's house. And as far as fearing us, I don't know of a single homosexual who has ever desired that society fear him or her. Fear only breeds distrust and, in some cases, violence.



Rec Center locker policy inadequate

Maybe it's time for a new director of [Campus] Recreation. Someone who tries to solve problems before they become problems.

For 17,000 students, there are about 490 lockers combined in the men's and women's locker rooms in the Recreation Center. The Center's design was approved in part by Glenn Hanley, director of [Campus] Recreation. Then, Glenn Hanley decided to rent out all but 45 lockers in each of the locker rooms.

I saw a problem here and introduced a bill into the SGA Senate that would have opened up more lockers, including some of the larger ones. It also would have made Campus Recreation provide free tokens for use of the little lockers by the front desk. This bill was defeated partly by the efforts of Senator Scott Davis-you can thank him while you try to squeeze your winter coat and everything else into one of the small lockers, if you can get one-partly by the efforts of Glenn Hanley, who came to the SGA and testified that 45 lockers were all the day use lockers that the Recreation Center would need open. He also pledged that there would be at least 45 lockers open at all times for students to use while they worked out. What he failed to mention was that the Recreation Center's policy would soon be that all lockers would be rented out and there would be NO lockers available free for students to use while they are using the Recreation Center they are already paying for. He feels if students don't want to rent a locker, they should carry their clothes around with them while they work out. Of course Glenn has a locker and an office there so it's not his problem.

Is this the kind of person that

should be running the recreation program for students? I say NO.

Not only that, last Monday night, numerous students, including me, were unable to use the Recreation Center because there were no lockers available at all. The recreation staff on duty had the audacity to suggest I rent a lobby locker to put my clothes in. Lets see: I go get dressed, then go rent a locker, then work out. So far so good. Now I come back, pay another quarter to get my towel so I can take a shower. I relock my clothes because I don't want my

wallet stolen while I am in the shower. OK, now I take my shower and am naked and my clothes are out in the locker. lobby Question: Should I, at this point, walk out in my birthday suit to retrieve my clothes or do I put back on my sweaty workout clothes to go get them? Other problems reported to Glenn Hanley and his staff have also gone untouched. If you need another

example of Glenn Hanley's management abilities, check out the outdoor recreation workout center between the Murphy Center and the stadium. It was supposed to be kept up by Campus Recreation. More than a year and a half ago, I told Glenn Hanley that it was dangerous and needed work. What was done? Watch out that you don't cut yourself on the jagged rusting holes and edges!



Building your own web page, part 2

Recapping last week, I took you through the basic steps of creating a file that can be viewed on the Internet from your own web site. Many readers inquired last week about putting pictures, music and other media forms on their web sites. Over the next few weeks, we will work our way to that point, so hang on - we'll get there.

Picking up where I left off, after creating a file in HTML format, it will need a place where it can be found when it becomes public domain. To do this, create a directory under the base of your "frank" account. This directory should be called public_html. If you've ever used DOS, the computer language for the Internet will be very similar. Type: mkdir public_html and hit return. A new directory under that name should appear. The list command - ll - (that "1" as in "luck) will display all of the files and directories under the query. You should find that the "public_html" directory is now listed.

The next task is to move all of the files you have created for your web site into the "public_html" directory. Make sure that you are at the base of your "frank" account. If you're not sure, simply type cd and hit return and you should be there. Using the file "homepage.html" as an example file, the following command will do the trick: mv homepage.html public_html. "MV" stands for "move the file." Homepage.html will now be under your public_html directory.

MTSU police force one of most highly trained in the state



We've all seen them. Ominous, imposing figures in official automobiles. Most of us feel a tinge of guilt, remembering the last time we exceeded the speed limit, rolled through a stop sign or buzzed through a red light.

But what do we really know about our campus police force?

Probably the most common misconception is that the campus police are not really police officers at all, just glorified security. The MTSU police force are one of the most highly trained departments in the state, according to Dustin Miller, Community Service Specialist for the MTSU campus police force. Contrary to popular belief, our officers are not "Barney Fife" types who can't get hired anywhere else. Our officers are qualified to work at any station in the state. Each is held to the same regime of training that Metro police, or any other force is held.

All officers of the law are required to do at least 40 hours of inservice training every year. Most departments offer only the barest

also one of only nine universities to be a member of the Commission of Law Enforcement Agency Accreditation (CLEAA). The CLEAA gauges the quality of services provided to the public by each organization. The members of this agency are held to a much higher standard than normal.

"Our campus police are not renta-cops, they are cops. All are highly trained," said Dana Harper, a member of the student patrol. The MTSU student patrol officers are not official police officers, but are noncommissioned, non-sworn students who routinely act as security, check buildings and escort students safely at night.

'They are a direct link to the student body," Miller said, "They allow us to do police work uninterrupted. They are our additional set of eyes and ears."

The student patrol may do as many as 65 escorts in one evening. They will also be in radio contact with campus police in order to report any crimes they see. The student patrol is an integral part of helping to keep the crime rate on campus low.

MTSU has had a below average rate of crime for the last five years, but have recently seen an increase in crimes of opportunity, or crimes that could have been prevented, according to Miller. Just because the crime rate is low does not mean you are not at risk. There is no magical boundary between the campus and the rest of Murfreesboro. Anything that happens across the street could just as easily happen on campus.

"I don't want to make anyone afraid, but I do want to make them aware," Miller explained, "I don't want to create a false feeling of safety.'

There has never been an MTSU officer that has been shot, but they have exchanged fire with individuals. MTSU officers are in just as much danger as any other police officer. Campus police have collected weapons on and around campus ranging from a foot-and-a-half long gun pistol. All officers are required to wear protective vests while on duty.

Campus officers do not have radar yet, though Miller explained that plans are in motion to acquire it very soon. In the meantime, officers use a method of pacing to gauge speed and have been trained at the academy on how to guess within 10 mph the speed a car is traveling. The speed limit on campus is 25 mph.

MTSU's police department has a philosophy designed to emphasize the civil servant aspect of the police force. MTSU encourages officers to have a community initiative. One of the Bowie knife to a MAC 10 machine main goals of the campus police is to eliminate or reduce citizen apathy about crime.

as such. The drawback to using it in this manner is that there are only four lines, and they may be busy. The campus does have a 911 service devoted to emergency calls. The response time of campus officers to an emergency call is under two minutes, according to Miller. A regular call may take five to 10 minutes for a response.

Miller spoke of some of the strangest calls he had heard, everything from streaking in front of Cummings and Corlew Halls to a 6year-old and an 8-year-old driving their mother's car down the one way street near the nursing building.

A common mistake from this point on is that a user creates a file but cannot access it on the World Wide Web. The problem is the user forgot to "turn the file on." All files are "turned off" to the outside world, so that no one can see your work until you're ready for them to. To "turn the file on." or allow others to view it, you must give access to the directory the files are in and the files themselves. From the base of your "frank" account, type: chmod 755 public_html and then hit return. Following this, type: chmod -R 755 public_html and hit return. Your public_html directory is now "turned on." Now, do the same thing for the files within the public_html directory. If you're not sure how to get into a directory, simply type: cd public_html and you are in. Again, a way to check yourself to make sure that you are where you want to be is to use the list command - ll.

The last thing we will go over this week is how to change a file name. It is the same command that is used to "move" a file to another directory, except it is used a different way. The homepage.html file created early needs to be renamed index.html so that this will be the first file an outside viewer will discover. Type: homepage.html index.html and hit return and the deed is done. Check to make sure using ll that the file is now called that and you are on your way. (NOTE: did you remember to "turn the file on?")

The basic WWW site is now created. Using the example login "sidelines," (substitute your login for "sidelines") the WWW address to access your web site is: http://www.mtsu.edu/~sidelines. Of course, you'll need a web browser to get there - lynx, Netscape, etc.; they will all do the trick.

Miller had completed 160 hours of training by his second year, as opposed to the 80 required by police regulations.

MTSU officers are commissioned as both state and county officials, which means they have the jurisdiction of state trooper and county deputy combined. Tickets written by campus police carry the same fines as those given by state troopers. There is a contiguous zone that covers all roads that intersect with campus which squad cars patrol with regularity, according to Miller.

"If something doesn't look right, feel right. It probably isn't right," Miller said.

Toy Fair reveals that 1996 toys are a mix of savvy, security and occasional grossness


This year's Toy Fair almost has the feel of a college reunion - most of the toys on display are familiar faces dressed differently or packaged into new formats. And many are much more sophisticated.

Barbie, for example, is on CD-ROM, allowing girls to design outfits and then print them out on special fabric to make the clothes.

Barbie herself will be more limber - as Twirling Ballerina Barbie, her ankles bend, and as a gymnast, she does splits. She and Ken also will be dressed as Eliza Doolittle and Henry Higgins from "My Fair Lady," and as starship Enterprise crewmembers for the 30th anniversary of the "Star Trek" TV series.

The most prominent action figures at the fair are old favorites like Batman and the "Star Wars" characters. But there are a few eyecatching twists, like Michael Jordan as an action figure teamed up with Bugs Bunny.

No one knows what will be the top-selling toy of 1996, but a visit to several manufacturers' showrooms does reveal several trends: More toys are using CD-ROMs and minicomputers. Some toymakers are



playing it safe, relying on proven successes. And others haven't lost their sense of humor - there are also toys that emit grunts and belches.

Analysts have said 1996 won't be a big year for licensed toys - products based on new movies or TV shows.

But some shown at Toy Fair probably will do well, including the action figures by Playmates Toys based on the film "Space Jam," due out later this year.

The movie stars Michael Jordan, along with several other NBA players and Bugs Bunny and other Looney Tunes characters. Who wouldn't want to buy a toy package that pairs Jordan and Elmer Fudd? Or Charles Barkley with Wile E. Coyote?

Some companies that are heavily into licensed toys are focused on perennial best-sellers. Hasbro's Kenner division has several Batman lines, some based on the comic books and others on last year's "Batman Forever" movie. There are 28 new figures in Kenner's "Star Wars" action line.

The decline of licensing was obvious at Tiger Electronics, which made its name with hand-held video games based on every big movie in recent years.

The company has fewer of these games for 1996, but it has come up with twists like Grip Games, a video game in a joystick. An electronic game called Brain Warp, somewhat reminiscent of the 1980s hit Simon, was popular with visitors to Tiger's showroom.

Tiger aims at the increasing sophistication of children. It has a line of beepers; devices kids can use to send each other e-mail across short distances; and Henry, an electronic

game that uses a variety of sound effects and voices, including belches, a horse's whinnying and an upper-class Englishman.

There's room for some grossness, too: Yes Entertainment Corp., for example, has Yak Bak SFX, a small device that emits sound effects like splats and screams. On a lower-tech level, one of the plush toys in Mattel's "101 Dalmatians" line is named Wizzer; he is paper-trained.

This year's lineup is weighted more toward electronic learning aids for preschoolers and CD-ROMs for all children. Successful products are being turned into CD-ROMs: Hasbro has them based on Monopoly, Candyland, Mr. Potato Head and Tonka. Toy Biz has put comics on CD-ROM

There are signs that toy companies are trying to answer consumers' demand for value. Tyco Toys has several lines of plush animals that will be list-priced at \$10, and it has two products, Game Babies and Power Zone, that are really five or six different games in one package.

The company also is selling \$5 and \$15 version of Vermont Teddy Bears, the upscale plush toys that range from \$34 to well over \$100.

A record-breaking crowd was on hand in Nashville Saturday night to see the battle between the Blue Raiders and the Tennessee State Tigers. A battle is exactly what they saw.

But when the final horn sounded and the smoke cleared, the majority of the Gentry Complex spectators were disappointed, as the Raiders outlasted the Tigers to come away with a 79-74 victory

"I'm glad that they draw for us," said Blue Raider head coach David Farrar. "It means that it's important for them, and it's a good rivalry.

The win was the third straight over TSU for the Raiders, who swept the season series against the Tigers for the first time since 1992. With the victory, Middle's record improved to 12-8 overall and 6-4 in the OVC. The Tigers' record dropped to 10-11 overall and 7-4 in conference play.

With Tennessee State sitting above the Raiders in second place in the OVC, as well as just coming off a win against conference-leading Murray State, the Raiders came into Saturday's game knowing they would have their work cut out for them. Middle also came in with confidence behind last Saturday's come-frombehind win at Austin Peay.

"There's a lot of good coaches, a lot of good players, and a lot of good teams, and obviously Tennessee State is definitely one of them," Farrar said. "I think we were fortunate tonight on one hand, and on the other I thought we played pretty well, and I think our kids played with a lot of confidence."

The Tigers and Raiders exchanged baskets for much of the first half, which saw three lead changes and eight ties before TSU was able to take a 40-37 lead into the break.

TSU led at halftime despite the fact that the Raiders out rebounded them 22-15 in the first half, including 12 offensive rebounds to TSU's seven.

'We had more than they did, but they scored on theirs early, and that hurt," Farrar said. "But the kids said this at halftime, they've taken their best shot at us. We felt like we'd have a chance at the end, and we did."

In the second half, the battle continued, and the Raiders kept chopping away at the Tigers behind strong offensive performances, particularly from forward Nod Carter

the Tigers were on the verge of making a run, Carter's 3-point accuracy came through to give Middle the lead.

Washington, who only had four points in the first half, had a huge second half, racking up 11 points including five crucial points late in the game

With the shot clock winding down, Washington connected on a 12-foot jumper that gave the Raiders a fourpoint lead with only 1:10 remaining. On the next possession, the 6-10 senior slashed his way to the basket from the top of the key. Washington was fouled as the lay-up went in, and he calmly buried the free-throw to complete the traditional 3-point play and virtually seal the Raider win.

'That's probably the biggest time I ever had," Washington said. "I wasn't thinking about it then, but those shots for me were probably the biggest shots I've ever taken in my career. Coming off the bench, all I can do is go out there and give all I can. Coach expects me to go out there and do it, and it feels good to be able to go out there and be able to get it done

Carter led the Raiders with an MTSU career-high 28 points, while Washington and Aylton Tesch followed with 15 and 14, respectively. Washington and Roni Bailey led the Raiders on the boards with eight each, while Tim Gaither added seven and Tesch and Brent Secrest contributed six each. Bailey and Gaither dished off five assists each.

Four Tigers scored in double figures, led by guard Monty Wilson with 21. Forward Stanley Caldwell chipped in 14 points and 10 rebounds in a losing effort.

After the game, Farrar and his players expressed their elation with the victory

"It feels great," Washington said. "For me, it's the best time of my life, because we've never got a win out of here ever since I've been playing here. To come up here and get a sweep on them in their gym feels great."

"This team is playing very confidently, they're very receptive," Farrar said. "This was a player's game and they swelled up and did what they needed to do.

"I think you could see in several people, and I'll just use Nod as an example, I think you just saw a tremendous amount of confidence, and he was going to do what he needed to do to win," Farrar added. "Several guys did that, David and a number of


And yet, the only people who show up for the women's games are the diehards, and the people who think, "Gee, if we get there early, we'll have good seats for the men's game."

Coming into Saturday night's contest against TSU at the Gentry Complex, Lady Raider head coach Lewis Bivens had more questions in front of him than the Clintons do about Whitewater.

How will the Lady Raiders react to their first OVC loss? Can anyone makeup for the scoring void left by Jessica Beaty's injury?

But all the questions were answered after the Lady Raiders used all their resources to pull out an impressive 73-60 victory

"Every game is going to be a battle now," Bivens said. "It was kind of easy for the first half, so that means that everybody is going after you now. When you are on top, everybody is going to give you their best punch, so you have to give them your best punch, too.'

And the Lady Raiders won in a way they have not had to this season by coming from behind. Down by as many as eight in the first half, and after trailing by only one at halftime, the Lady Raiders fell behind TSU again, by as many as five, before Jonelda Buck hit two free-throws to tie the score at 50-50 with 12:50 to go in the game.

Following two-and-a-half minutes of fouls, Kim Francis broke the ice with a 3-point bomb at the 9:24 mark that gave the Lady Raiders their first lead since mid-way through the first half. Middle never turned back, closing out the game by outscoring TSU 20-10 en route to their first season sweep of the Lady Tigers since the 1991-92 campaign.

One of the biggest differences in this game might have been that TSU scored just 10 points in the final 13 minutes of play.

"I told the girls after the game that the difference was that we played a lot harder defense in the second half, so our defense just sort of turned into our offense," Bivens said.

The Lady Raiders went to the free throw line 27 times, and hit 19 of those shots. Jonelda Buck scored 14 points and grabbed 7 rebounds, and Trella Thomas, at 5 foot, 5 inches tall. led all players with 11 rebounds.

But it was Natalie Sneed, who failed to start the game for the first time all season, that turned the most heads, leading all scorers with 20 points.

"It was the first time this year she did not start, and she had the best game of her career," said Bivens

In addition to Sneed, the Lady Raiders got nine points a piece from Kim Francis and Carlita Elder, adding to the damage done by the bench.

'Our bench has to be big," Bivens "You lose something when you said. lose Beaty, so somebody has to step it up a little. But I saw some of our players really grow up in the second half, and they were big for us.'

Traci Boone led the Lady Tigers with 16 points and six rebounds, and Tequila Holloway and Nikki Sims each scored 15 and 11 points, respectively.

Next up for the Lady Raiders is a trip to visit the Otahkians of Southeast Missouri, who the Lady Raiders easily disposed of on Jan. 13th, 78-64.

In that contest, the Lady Raiders managed to hold SEMO's star forward, Gray C. Harris, to just 17 points, well below her average. This past week alone, she has scored 42 points and 39 points in separate games, and she will no doubt be the focal point of the Lady Raider defensive attack.

"She is definitely the load of their team," Bivens said. "Our whole team will be guarding her, and we will give her different looks. We have to get our whole team to stop her.'

The Lady Raiders (now 18-2, 9-1), have made it clear that they have no intention of letting the season slip away. In fact, last Saturday's loss to Austin Peay may have strengthened their will, their hope, and most importantly, their desire.



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

The women's team defeated the six-team field very comfortably, scoring 85 total points. The Lady Raiders' closest competitor, Southeast Missouri, only managed to score 42 points.

The men had a tougher time of it, taking second place overall with a score of 61. SEMO's men won the meet with a score of 66.

Excitement was in the air during the meet, as the MTSU teams ran for the last time before they will attempt to claim the indoor titles at the OVC championship meet later this month.

For the women, defending OVC Woman of the Year Mia Florence brought her show to Murphy Center, placing first in the high hump and the triple jump. Shelley Johnson muscled her way to win the shot put.

Nekeya Ralls put up an outstanding performance, winning the 55 meters and 55 meter high hurdles, and taking second in the long jump. Nadia Graham won the 200 meters with ease, while the mile relay team won with ease, finishing with a time of 3:49.10.

For the men, the top performer was Christian Nsiah, who lit up the track with wins in the 55 meters and the 200 meters.

The high-risers Jahez Salahuddin, Rashad Haynes and Torrence Riley finished second, third and fourth in the high jump, respectively, while

Salahuddin and Haynes took second and third in the triple jump. Atiba Tucker placed second in the long jump, while Haynes took fourth.

In the 55 meter high hurdles. Carlos Clardy finished first, while teammate Dana Dixon took second. Bo Collins had to settle for fifth in the shot put, while the men's mile relay team finished second with a time of 3:21.80.

Saturday's meet was the final tune-up for MTSU's teams, who will be hosting the OVC indoor championship meet Feb. 23 and 24. The meet will begin at 4:00 p.m. on Friday, Feb. 23 and at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday. Admission is free and open for all track meets at Murphy Center, and fans are encouraged to attend and support their teams.


