



Honeymoon's over?

Well, the honeymoon is over ... and so is the marriage.

Dennis Rodman filed for annulment Monday from his bride of nine days, actress Carmen Electra.

Meanwhile, the former Baywatch star said through a spokeswoman "that Carmen and Rodman had mutually agreed to terminate the marriage several days ago."

On Saturday, Nov. 14, at the Little Chapel of the Flowers in Las Vegas, the couple were wed. On Monday, Nov. 16, Rodman's agent Dwight Maniey maintained that Rodman had been intoxicated during the ceremony and was taken advantage of by Electra.

On Tuesday, Nov. 16, a statement - attributed to Rodman - was released in which Rodman allegedly wrote "I love Carmen and am proud to be married to her."

On Monday, however, the basketball player's Newport Beach attorney Gerald Phillips, disputed whether the handwriting was in fact Rodman's.

"That is not the language that would have been used by Dennis Rodman," said Phillips.

Luke who's back on 90210

Goodbye, Brandon. Welcome back, Dylan. It's been that kind of month on "Beverly Hills, 90210," (8 ET Wednesdays on FOX) with one of the show's stars leaving just before another's return. Jason Priestley made his last appearance as Brandon Walsh last month, and Luke Perry resurfaced for Thanksgiving dinner as Dylan McKay.

Perry says his character will confront the reasons he originally left in upcoming episodes. Among them: his love for Kelly Taylor (Jennie Garth) — now Brandon's εxfiancee — and the murder of Dylan's bride, whose mobster father's actual target was Dylan.

"It's very difficult to describe," Perry says of being back on the "90210" set after a three-year absence. "I'm as surprised as anyone else because this wasn't something I

was looking to do. It's like being an athlete who's traded to another team for a while, then traded back. There may be a few differences but it's the same thing. After one or two days of practice, we were right back into it."

During Perry's original "90210" run, Dylan certainly faced a lot. A recovering alcoholic, he drank again after his father was killed and the family fortune was lost. He also had a long, complicated romance with Brandon's sister Brenda (ex-cast member Shannen Doherty) before taking up with Kelly, then with Valerie (Tiffani-Amber Thiessen, who departs from the show this week), then with his doomed wife Toni (Rebecca Gayheart, also Perry's co-star in the 1997 NBC miniseries "Invasion").

"Ultimately, I got to a point where I thought I had reached the end of the road with the guy," Perry explains, "so I left. If I get to that point again, the same thing will probably happen. However, having stepped away for a while presents the opportunity to

do what I thought we weren't capable of before, to go another way with Dylan and find different stories to tell.

"All the characters who stayed while Dylan was gone have some history to carry around that he doesn't. People who watch the show know who Dylan is, b u t there's this big void in time that they don't know about. Letting that unfold is going to be the interesting part for me. If I hadn't gone away, that wouldn't be the case. It's a whole different perspective."


Perry's "90210" deal also involves doing TV-movies and theatrical films for 20th Century Fox. "I would be remiss not to take advantage of as many elements of the media as Fox controls," he reasons. In his time away from the series, Perry made "The Fifth Element" with Bruce Willis and several cable-premiere movies, including next month's Cinemax drama "Lifebreath."

Still, Perry might not have been available to reprise Dylan if ABC had picked up a pilot he made. He would have played a

sports agent in "The Game," which he cites as "a very good show. It should be on the air, no doubt about it. I've seen (the current ABC comedy) 'Sports Night' and I think it's funny, but who am I to say whether my show should be on instead of that one? I don't think anyone knows why networks do what they do when they do it."

"90210" repeats are now shown on FX, but Perry recently got a refresher from a "Favorite Moments" special Fox aired. "It's the first time I've ever seen one of those (retrospective) shows and actually liked it," the actor says. "It wasn't difficult to watch for me. It was funny and poignant, and it was pretty cool to see Brian Austin Green ("90210's" David) back when he had hair."

If there's any drawback for Perry in returning to "90210," it's that he isn't getting to share more scenes with friend and former co-star Priestley. "I wish he were still there," Perry confirms. "Somehow, I'd like the chance to work with him again in that capacity."







A very savage comedy

The only thing that Kyle Fisher (Jon Favreau) wants is to marry the woman he loves, Laura Garrety (Cameron Diaz). All Laura wants is the wedding of her dreams.

But before Kyle staggers down the aisle with his beautiful, controlling bride, his buddies decide to give their friend one last night of freedom, male bonding and debauchery.

Real estate hustler Robert Boyd (Christian Slater); the battling Berkow brothers, Adam (Daniel Stern) and Michael (Jeremy Piven); and introvert mechanic Moore (Leland Orser) throw a Las Vegas bachelor party for Kyle that is a smashing success, with plenty of booze and drugs — and even a visit from a lithe young stripper.

But accidents will happen.

When Michael has a fling in the bathroom with the stripper, coitus interruptus turns into habeas corpus.

They can call the police.

Or as Boyd suggests, they cab dispose of the "105 pound problem" in the desert, then return home dedicate themselves to leading respectable lives. Not even Adam's keen-eyed wife Lois (Jeanne Tripplehorn) will be able to figure out what happened.

Thus begins a darkly comic homicidal trail, dropped like lethal bread crumbs, by writer-director Peter Berg in this audacious, surehanded motion picture debut. A savage comedy that rips away the veneer of civility camouflaging base human instinct, Very Bad Things features on outstanding younf ensemble cast.

To make a film that pushes the envelope this far, both cast and crew members flung themselves into the project from day one of the tightly scheduled, 35-day shoot, most taking deferred pay.

The cast bonded so quickly that they became like a "den of thives," producer Michael Schiffer reports. "It was a festival of scene-stealing — hysterical to watch."

"This was the first movie I'd done in about ten years where I felt this comfortable with both the character and the people," Slater said

"The charactern had an edge like my characters in *Heathers* and *Pump Up The Volume*, and it gave me the opportunity to play someone colorful, with no boundaries. We could all let loose and say whatever came to our minds — literally — although we ended up sticking to the script pretty much because it was so well written."

At the same time, dark comedy can be hard work.

"Everyone was totally committed to whatever situation we were depicting," Orser said.

"So, we exposed ourselves to each other every day, all day. Each one of us had to be willing to be real."

The hospital scene was a case in point.

"There we were," Favreau recalls, "in a hospital corridor in

tears, everyone doing some heavy duty, challenging acting."

"Although for me," adds Stern, "the big challenge was not to blink. But the rest of the time, Peter pushed us so far that the only fear was we'd be too far out there, without any pauses in the pace. When I saw the movie cut together, though, it was clear Peter knew exactly what he wanted."

Because improvisation was encouraged, there were times when the director was caught off guard. Diaz, for instance, began to riff out loud during the tuxedo scene, which was being shot without sound and her off-the-cuff comments were so wickedly acid that Berg had to scramble to capture them on tape.

And he describes Piven, in the role of Michael, as "one of the greatest improvisational actors around today.

"This was a group of truly kind actors," Berg continues. "Unpretentious. Grounded. No celebrity stuff going on. But in really healthy ways, they refused to let anyone else steal a scene from them. It was enormous fun to watch them think on their feet and pump up each other, scene after scene."

"It's true that we had to absolutely hit the ground running every single time," Piven said. "And for actors, this was very high stakes stuff, so we didn't want to stay in such intense scenes for very long with too many takes, or it would have been unbearable.

"But Peter's script was so tight, so rich and the schedule so demanding," he added. "that I actually improvised a little less on this one than other times.

Michael starts off as guy in a cubicle who wants one lucky moment to make him a winner and, instead, he totally unravels. It was the kind of role that doesn't come along that often — a beautifully written train wreck."

As an actor himself, Berg made it a priority to create a set where people would want to come to work: "I wrote the script to interest myself in playing these roles.

It's a story about watching the world go to pieces — anything less and would've gotten bored. And as someone who's seen tension on sets in the past, I wanted to provide the kind of environment actors love."

Cowan calls it "the quickest, most fun and easiest film I've ever worked on. There was absolutely no attitude on this movie from anyone. We all had the same goal: to make a really cool movie."

"For me," she continues, "it began when Peter and I first met each other to talk about the script. I came to the set of *Chicago Hope* one day, and he answered his trailer door ready for taping — dressed like Elvis. It set the stage for the entire project."

Perhaps because of his experience in front of the camera, Berg "had a way of cajoling actors to new heights," Kroopf observes.

"It was a wonderful surprise to us to see this amazing ensemble cast so confident in someone who's actually a first-time director. These actors were giving their all, flying without a net the whole time."

"Peter seems to work through shorthand," explains Piven. "There's a certain trust that's difficult to describe. He could come over and say a few words and I'd get it. He's never condensending. He knows that life is short and you have to make the best of it. He's the kind of guy you just want to do well for."

As producer, Schiffer focused on keeping the film true to Berg's vision, without compromise. Protecting the project so that not a word of the script was changed and no one felt pressured into backing off from its comic intensity was feat that he considers his main contribution.

"We couldn't soften anything," Schiffer said, "ot it wouldn't have been funny. We had to go all out and then see what we had."

"It required perfect execution," said executive producer Ted Field. "In the back of our minds, we always knew that every scene had to be hit just right — the ending especially or else it wouldn't be funny."

"Intial Entertainment Group helped enormously," Kroopf said. "Where some people were leery of such a daring film, IEG wasn't. They took a gamble and their support was invaluable."

The result was a film that "gets you in your stomach, like any good comedy," Schiffer said. "But you're off the hook because you know that what you're seeing isn't really happening. So in the end, you laugh out loud."

Berg stabs movie making

Very Bad Things is "Peter's mad, crazed comic vision," says producer Michael Schiffer. "Yet at the same time, it's actually taking about deep and disturbing truths."

The auspicious feature film debut of writer-director Peter Berg, who stars in the television series *Chicago Hope*, is "dazzling and insane," explains Schiffer, "because when monsters emerge from characters we identify with real people — the kind of people we know grow up with — we can't dismiss them or hold them at ram's length. By exposing them, Peter's film reveals the demons inside all of us."

Executive producer Scott Kroopf calls Berg's script "the boldest and most daring imaginable. There was nothing formulaic about it. It was innately intriguing."

"The movie had an unusally quick start," adds producer Diane Nabatoff. "We read it in March of '97 and were shooting in September. Peter was a frist-time director, but the script was so specifically his vision and humor that it was clear he was the only one who could direct it."

Or, as actor Daniel Stern puts it, "When

it comes to deciding whether to do a movie, I love no-brainers. I read Peter's script and I had to do this film."

The five lead characters are men of the nineties: they guzzle beer, hurl insults and hoot holler about women's bodies.

In Schiffer's description,
"They buy their clothes at The
Gap. They're not gangsters,
hit men or fantasy
characters. They just want
to be normal. But they're
all a little bent, a little
over the top. And Peter
imbued them with an
off-kilter intelligence
that adds the final comic
twist."

The original idea came to Berg on a visit to Las Vegas. "A lot of men go there to get drunk and look for trouble," he said. "I've seen it over and over in the bars and casinos. Vegas encourages men's primitive side."

"Something tribal emerges," he continues, "and with one false step a group of men could lose control. It's the same kind of energy at bachelor parties."

So he began to wonder what would happen if the line was crossed. What would happen when people engagged in immoral behavior and got away with it initially?

What would be the emotional repercussions?

What unfolded in Berg's imagination and now on the screen is a true back-to-basics experience.

About Peter Berg

Berg (writer and director) is a member of a small. elite group of performers and filmmakers who are creating vehicals for their multiple talents.

A screenwriter, director and whose work and experience spans television, film and theatre, Berg has penned two episodes of the popular television series *Chicago Hope*, in which stars as the aggressive and occasionally hostile surgeon Dr. William Kronk, winning rave reviews for his portrayal.

For Very Bad Things he directed his own screenplay. His first screenplay, cowritten with Michael Schiffer and entitled Furious George, was a madcap thriller about an innocent man caught up in a political assassination plot.

Berg is now writing a heist film revolving around a group of New York City firemen and will direct the project for Interscope, with Schiffer producing.

Berg has starred in numerous films, including *Copland*, opposite Sylvester Stallone and Robert DeNiro, *The Great White Hype* with Samuel L. Jackson and Spike Lee's *Girl Six*.

His breakthrough as an actor came with his starring role opposite Linda Fiorentino in *The Last Seduction*, for which he received critical acclaim.

Other films include Scocker, Late For Dinner, Crooked Hearts, A Midnight Clear, Aspen Extreme and Fire In The Sky. In additionn to his ongoing role in Chicago Hope, he has also starred in several television productions, including Rise and Walk: The Dennis Byrd Story.




