winning a Grand Slam. But since last year's quest for the green jacket, Tiger has won four majors in a row, including this years Sasters.
The summer of 2000 was The summer of 2000 was
certainly one for the ages. He began the summer by scorching matter, and winning the U.S. Open at Pebble Beach by an
astronomical 15 shots. something even Jack Nicklaus never came close to. One month later at the home of golf, the Royal
and Ancient Club at St. Andrews in Scotland, Tiger Andrews in Scotand, Tiger
completed the career Grand Slam, becoming only the fourth player in history to accomplish such a feat. Then Tiger proceeded to shoot 31 on the back nine at Valhalla Golf Club in Louisville to win the PGA
Championship in a playoff with Bob May.
These three victories led to the much-debated question during the short offseason, if Tiger wins the Masters will he have won the Grand Slam? Purists say that it must be done in a calendar year. Others say
anybody that can place all four trophies on their coffee table should be considered to have won the Grand Slam. "Is it a Grand Slam? 1 don't
