

Alt-country twang meets post-punk edge

Like any other band, The Light Wires have a hard time classifying their music. The Ohio foursome mixes a breed of genres in their debut self-titled album everything from alt-country to strangling rock. But one thing that does stand out are the heart-wrenching early roots country lyrics that vocalist Jeremy Pinnell sings with strained sentiment.

Here, three members of The Light Wires, Andy Hittle (guitar, vocals), Rick McCarty (drums), and Mike Montgomery (bass, vocals) discuss and divulge the nature of their music and the meaning of their sound

Leslie Carol Boehms: What are your musical influences?

Andy Hittle: For the most part, we

came up through indie and postpunk stuff, so it's more of an ideal that has influenced us more than a particular sound. For me, it's nice to be in a situation where I can take, say a Fugazi influence and blend it with something I learned from an Al Green record.

Mike Montgomery: It' so different for each person - everyone's tastes really run the gamut. Jeremy and I



grew up listening to punk rock. I got really into bands like Dinosaur Jr, Firehose, Sonic Youth and The Dead Kennedys.

LCB: How would you describe your sound to someone who has never heard you?

Rick McCarty: We sound like a mix of older Wilco, and a Nebraska-era Springsteen.

AH: Fairly traditional American singer-songwriter stuff filtered through less than traditional arrangements

LCB: What is the origin of the band name?

AH: Thinking of band names is the worst thing ever. At this point, everything has connotations, so it's best to go with something pretty harmless or something that you won't regret in a few years. The Light Wires seemed okay because it didn't peg us into one slim niche. It's got nice assonance.

RM: The name really doesn't have any special meaning, or weird story to where it came from. We basically had a huge list of possible band names, and after months of thinking about it, and discussing it, we finally agreed to it. It was the one we all agreed we liked most.

LCB: What inspires you to write music?

RM: I'm not really sure. I've just always loved creating, and playing in this band is just another avenue to help me do that.

LCB: What do you as a band want to accomplish with your music?

MM: At the end of the day, most people would be happy to be able to make music that is lasting.

RM: I would like to be able to play as much as possible with these guys, and continue to create good songs without any pretenses.
