### State Makes Changes In Certification

"The changes which will have occurred during these five years are the most significant ones made in certification since 1925, when the state legislature revised the 1909 and 1913 laws governing the licensing of public school teachers and administrators," according to Dr. Quill E. Cope, state education commissioner.

"One of the most notable changes is the requirement that future teachers, supervisors and superintendents show that 60 quarter hours (about one-third of their college work) was done in solid academic subjects which provide a board foundation for teaching," explained A. B. Cooper, state director of certification.

"These required 60 hours are basic," Cooper stressed. "Elementary teachers must have an additional 39 hours in subjects taught in grades 1-9 and high school teachers must have 18 to 63 additional hours in each subject for which they seek a license to teach."

Old Certificates Not Affected

The new basis does not affect certificates that were issued under laws and regulations which were in effect in 1951, when the General Assembly provided for a revision in certification requirements.

Nor will the new requirements affect applicants who began college before Sept. 1, 1953, AND receive their bachelors degrees before next September. Certificates will be issued to these applicants under laws and regulations in effect in 1951.

All applicants who began college after September 1, 1953, or who receive their bachelors degrees after next August must present the required credits in three divisions: 60 quarter hours in basic subjects; of the grades or areas to be taught. to 45 quarter hours for electives.

The base of 60 hours is to be in six areas: English, humanities (music, art, philosophy, foreign languages etc.), science, sostudies, mathematics and "health, physical education, personal development and social liv-

The holder of this certificate is on the same state salary scale as are teachers with the required professional education.

5. A provision to limit a teaching permit (issued to the superintendent for employment of an uncertified teacher) to the period of time during a school year that a qualified teacher is not available for employment.

6. The establishment of an advisory council on teacher education and certification. This council, by 1951 law, is to make continuous

vice to the state board.
