Artists break new ground Center for the Arts hosts original show

The gallery, located at 110 West College St., is featuring art by Jeff Boese and Brian Robinson, both prominent Tennessee artists. The show opens today and runs through April 28.


This collaboration is the first of its kind to be shown at the Center, which usually exhibits solo or group shows.

Boese and Robinson's work is described and categoby Murefreesboro Center for the Arts as "abstract expressionism" and the theme of the entire display is portraiture.

Boese Robinson collaborated on three large pieces which were created to illustrate the process of creation from the concept to the finished work. The first piece they did

The Dave Matthews Band's fifth studio album, Everyday, turns yet another new page in the multi-platinum quintet's sonic storybook.

Everyday was released Feb. 27 to the high anticipation and expectation of all Dave Matthews fans.

The new album clocks in at about an hour, making it the shortest Dave Matthews Band

CD. Everyday has 12 tracks. Surprisingly, there are no special guests featured on this CD. Even Tim Reynolds, who has been a guest on every other released, was absent.

There were major changes in the pro-

duction of this album. Usually, the band plays songs for their new album on tour to test them out. Then, they place the most popular tracks on the CD. However, this is

This process made the new tracks on Everyday untested and a secret from the fans.

The album, as a whole, has a more electric feel to it, which you can hear in the first single "I Did It." On the album, front man Dave Matthews ventures out and plays the baritone electric guitar for the first time.

But don't worry, the sound Dave acoustic Matthews Band is known for is still present on the CD. The majority of Everyday, however, does have a much more elcetric sound.
