and arrested 5 individuals at $3: 30$ a.m. in connection with the alleged crimes, according to Murfreesboro Police Department Public Information Officer Kyle Evans.
"There were two juveniles and three others, one of whom is at Vanderbilt, involved with the incident,
Kvle Evans said. "The three individ Kyle Evans said. "The three individ were all wearing face masks when they barged in, causing the owner of the apartment to struggle with them before the weapon discharged the first time."
According to police reports, three suspects were identified as Deon day Antwon Evans, 19 of 1969 Old Castle Dr.; Lisa Marie Watson, 21 of 350 Tremont Dr. and Edward Pope, 19 of 2709 Calias Court. Pope was struck by shots fired by one of apartment.
