Gridiron action prevails in 'NFL Street'

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Some videogames get cubbyholed because not everyone has a tolerance for niche games. Sports games often fall into this category.

Believe me, I generally don't play sports games. But I am absolutely in love with Electronic Arts' NFL Street.

Street could easily be compared to Midway's classic NFL Blitz series, in that it offers fast-paced arcade football action.

But where the predominant difference lies is indicative in the title. This game takes the proverbial smash mouth football to places you've always wanted it to go.

Yes, *Street* is a football videogame. However, this is not a Madden-esque simulation.

This is the football you'd play if your buddies had a spontaneous pick-up game in an abandoned ware-

house, and you were all athletic supermen who felt no pain.

The setup is seven on seven. You can choose from a plethora of real NFL all-stars to form your own team, or you can choose players from exclusive team rosters.

You can also assign any player to any position, regardless of what they play in the real NFL, although players have various qualities that might make them more adept in certain roles.

Winning teams are decided by reaching a chosen set number of points. The points are scored by tradi-

tional touchdown plays.

There are no idiot kickers here.

So while controlling your players, you can perform various style moves by pressing certain buttons.

Street has all sorts of taunts and tricks that would normally get a player fined in the NFL. But here, they rack up style points.

If you're 50 yards from pay dirt with a wide-open field, you can juggle the ball, high step and somersault into the end zone in order to achieve spectacular results on the scoreboard.

All the while, you can hear the opposing team and your human opponent cursing at you.

Be careful though, trying to look cool could cause you to cough up the ball.

As for the playbooks, they aren't extensive at all. You have four categories

to choose from, including offense and defense.

They're all fairly basic with the exception of trick plays. These plays are here when you need to pull a rabbit out of your hat.

The game is beautiful as well.

The player motion is real, the environments are lush and the player models are, well, "street."


The models are all faithfully exaggerated.

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

Sarah's Pick: Ben Kingsley took over House of Sand and Fog, but this category is going to come down to two people, Bill Murray and Sean Penn. I think it's going to be a really tight match, because they were both incredible, but I anticipate and will root for a Bill Murray win.

Forrest's Pick: Could the fact that Bill Murray showed up to collect his Golden Globe award and Sean Penn didn't have any sway on how the Academy leans in this category? I hope so. Murray's performance in *Lost in Translation* was a true career redefining moment for the former ghostbuster.

ACTRESS IN A LEADING ROLE Keisha Castle-Hughes Whale Rider Diane Keaton Something's Gotta Give Samantha Morton In America Charlize Theron Monster Naomi Watts 21 Grams

Sarah's Pick: I would absolutely love it if Keisha Castle-Hughes, the little girl who carried Whale Rider, walked away with this award. Her performance was incredibly moving. She wasn't even relegated to the supporting category like most child actors. The Academy, though, is more likely to go for Charlize Theron because they love the implicit ironies of a beautiful starlet transforming into a crazy lesbian.

Forrest's Pick: Charlize Theron meets the leading actress criteria.

She wallows in a role that is a massive change of pace and obscures her beauty in the process. In addition, she proves she can out-ugly past leading actress winners like *Boys Don't Cry's* Hillary Swank, *Monster Ball's* Halle Berry and *The Hours'* Nicole Kidman.

Sarah's Pick: This award should go to Ken Watanabe who ran the gamut from stately to heartwrenching in *The Last Samurai*. His magnificent performance reminded me of the late Toshiro Mifune, one of the favored leads for Akira Kurosawa. The Academy, though, adores people who attempt mentally disabled or anguished characters, so the award will go to Tim Robbins who actually did a pretty good job.

Forrest's Pick: Benicio Del Toro has received this honor before for his work in *Traffic*, and his performance in the haunting *21 Grams* is even better. However, I agree that Tim Robbins leads the pack for his magnificently understated performance in *Mystic River*.

Forrest's Pick: Sure, she had to deliver some corny dialogue, but Renée Zellweger's spunky, Granny Clampett-esque performance was a breath of fresh air. Her flamboyant free spirit easily stole the film, and after two years of nearly winning an Oscar, I think Zellweger is due for glory.

BEST PICTURE

The Lord of the Rings: The Return of the King Lost in Translation Master and Commander: The Far Side of the World Mystic River Seabiscuit


Sarah's Pick: Surely everyone recognizes that Lord of the Rings: The Return of the King was the best film of the year. However, the Academy doesn't tend to like fantasy or action films, and the first LOTR was, in my opinion a more solid piece of work. Did the first film win?

Of course not. I think the only way *Return* will win is if the Academy admits that they made a huge mistake in 2001.

Otherwise, and this is the result I actually expect, the nearly-asexcellent *Mystic River* will take home the little statuette. Either way, it won't be one of those years where I turn off my TV in an angry huff.

Forrest's Pick: Though 2001's Fellowship of the Ring and 2002's The Two Towers failed to take home this coveted prize, I think the third time may be a charm for Return of the King. The only film I find with a chance at dethroning King is \$4 million budgeted critical darling, Lost in Translation. However, if only to keep LOTR's legion of die-hard fans from rioting the next morning, let's just hope that this final chapter in Peter Jackson's groundbreaking trilogy takes home the night's biggest honor.
