Raiders Squeak Past Eastern

The success of the Righteous Brothers has all the markings of solidity and longevity. In a little over three years, Bill Medley and Bobby Hatfield (who are not related) have established themselves as one of the top record, concert and night-club attractions in the world. They have turned out a distinctive succession of hit albums and hit singles, and their popularity grows with each new recording and in - person appearance.

To what do they owe their great success in this age when groups and performers vanish as quickly as they arrive? The Righteous Brothers aren't quite sure.

"We don't have any gimmicks. Our approach is with one specific quality in mind: the heart of the song. We stick to our 'bag,' one type of song. We don't do surf or hot-rod or skateboard. People who hear us may like us or they may hate us and that's all right as long as they don't ignore us, as long as they remember us. We have to grow. We're always choreographing and working on special material."

Their performances are based on honesty and feeling and they work hard satisfying themselves as well as the audience.

"The secret is to create a mood rather than to articulate words. When the lyric is good, then you hear the words. One of the ad-


vantages of making money is the freedom to do what's right and what you want to do."

The Righteous Brothers record for Verve records, a division of Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, Inc. Their first release for Verve, "(You're My) Soul and Inspiration," became the number one song in the nation and sold over one million copies within the first five weeks after its release. Their first album release for Verve, also entitled "Soul and Inspiration," was released in April.

Experts in the music profession have expressed the opinion that one great reason for the success of the Righteous Brothers stems from a distincitive sound that defies identification and invites imitation. Theirs is a mixture of jazz, gospel, rhythm and blues, rock 'n' roll, and spiritual. Perhaps the best way to describe a name for the sound is simply to call it an authentic American sound and leave it at that. The music business still re-

One thing the experts in the field agree upon, however, is that there can be no denying the fact that the Righteous Brothers have that certain intangible "something" which makes stars.






The agenda that particular Saturday was a full one. The morning began with a showing of slides taken at the summer meeting of the American Craftsman Council South - Eastern Workshop in Athens, Georgia. A business meeting was high-lighted by a report on the TA-CA exhibit in the Tennessee State Fair and by a viewing of the partial slide collection of members' work being compiled by the organization.

Demonstrations by the faculty and students of the University's Art Department were the feature attraction of the afternoon. Eddie Hodges conducted a firing of the Department's new "home-made" metals foundry as a major facet of the demonstration on aluminum sand-casting. "Jay" Strawn operated the Raku kiln in explanation of that pottery technique. Klaus Kallenberger of the Art Department faculty demonstrated the jewelry process of centrifugal cast-ing. Aware that the heat generated by 2,300 degrees foundries, 2,000 degrees kilns and the molten gold or silver in a centrifuge could cause a hearty thirst, the Veteran's Club provided TA-CA mem-bers with their own private Coke dispenser.

In the evening the Craftsmen gathered in the SUB for one of those famous Slater's buffets and a freely moving, free-association slide exhibition produced by David Ledoux of the Art Department faculty. The dinner party then moved to the Fine Arts Building where they previewed the opening of the 2nd. Mid-South Ceramics and Crafts Exhibition. The evening ended with the showing of the Sperry documentary film, "The Village Potters of Oonda", and "The the slide review of the showing by the Museum of Contemporary Crafts in New York, "Fantasy Furniture".

And so ended that "big day" for M.T.S.U. and TA-CA. To even the most casual observer it would have been evident that the gathering had been a very pleasant success. After the smoke had settled and the debris was cleared away, it was obvious that those members of the Tennessee Artists' Craftsmen Association who had visited the Middle Tennessee State University campus were, for Lewis Snyder, "... people who will be the back-bone of the organization in the future."

At 7:15 President Bill Boner called the organizational meeting of the ASB to order. The meeting was held in the Tennessee Room of the Student Union Building on October 6, 1966.

First on the agenda was the introduction of Harold Smith Vice President of the ASB last year. He has been of great assistance to Bill Boner in offering advice and council to him.

Next Frank Fly, attorney general, explained the new procedure for elections to be used in the future. Ballots will be IBM cards. Voting will simply be punching out the holes by the person's name being voted for. The advantages of this arrangement is that counting of votes is faster and these is less chance of human error.

MOCS REMEMBER LAST YEAR'S SCORE

This could be the best team in recent years for Chattanooga. Coach Scrappy Moore will have 26 letterman to turn loose at the Raiders, and I do mean turn loose. The Moccasins are still fuming over last year's loss.

Guard Henry Sorrell, a three-year veteran and captain, is the leader and will play both defense and offense. Rated one of the best ever to play at U.C., he was a Little-All-American choice last year and has already been drafted by the pros. The rugged line-backer is a Southeastern wrestling champion in his spare time.

The backfield is led by quarterback Don Sharer, who can run or pass equally well. The running game is centered around speech merchant Gary Tucker, a 195 pound halfback.

The Mocs have another fine player in kicker Heggi Ferreira, a 145 pound native of Brazil. Last year he kicked four field goals, including two over 40 yards using the soccer style kick.

Up front the line is well fortified. The Moccasins are almost

two-deep in experience at every position on the line. Still remembering the score from last years game, the Moccasins will be very hard to beat. If the Raiders can set a quick score and control the ball, the Mocs may be in for a long night. MTSU students will not have to worry about tickets because U. C.'s stadium holds 18,000.


Anderson Is C-C Captain







game to capture the OVC leadership with a 2-0 conference record. It was the first loss of the year for Eastern, and the eighteen-th straight grid victory for the Raiders. MTSU scored first in the wild

affair with 5:43 remaining in the first quarter. Billy Walker powered his way across the goal line from the one yard line for the TD, and Paul Barnett added the Pat. During the second quarter, Eastern scored twice with a oneyard plunge by Bob Beck and a 48 yard aerial by Eastern quarterback Jim Guice. Mike Riggs booted the Pats to give Eastern a 14-7 edge at halftime.

The Raiders were able to hold Eastern scoreless during the third quarter while they themselves were making a touchdown. After Billy Walker's pass to Bob Hlodan for five yards, Paul Barnett kicked the extra point and tied the score the end of the third quarter.

The fourth quarter proved to be the exciting period. Jim Guice passed to Aaron Marsh for the touchdown but the extra point attempt was no good. Behind six points, the Raiders had a drive started until Don Moore intercepted Walker's pass (one of five during the contest). At this point, things looked pretty bleak for the Raiders.

However the interception was not



the time, it looked like a smart (Continued on page 8)



YR Organizes; To Back Baker


The Young Republicans' Club of MTSU held its first meeting of the year on October 4, in the Student Union Building. The officers for the year 1966-67 were introduced to the new members.


