



### MEET MTSC MASTERS

This issue brings to light two of the first masters ever to pass through the proverbial portals of MTSC.

Mr. Horace G. Jones, professor in mathematics, joined the

throng of the MTSC faculty in the year of its birth. It was in that same year that Mr. Jones, a native of White County, Tennessee, became the

first bursar of MTSC. Mr. Jones received his secondary education at Baylor in Chattanooga, and from there came to MTSC to receive his B.S. degree. He was destined for higher education, for not long afterwards Mr. Jones was given his M.A. degree from Peabody College. He also did further graduate work at the University of Tennessee and Vanderbilt.

MTSC's math master began his teaching career in a oneteacher country school and since then has taught in almost every type of school in our educational system. For two years Mr. Jones held the position as principal of Murfreesboro Central High School, and taught for the same length of time at the University of Tennessee.

In 1921, Mr. Horace G. Jones began his career as a mathe matics teacher in this college.

"This is the first time in many years that I have been able to concentrate on the work I love." This statement was made by Miss E. May Saunders, assistant professor in Music. Miss E. May, as she is called by those who know her best,
