



Secretary of State John Foster Dulles warns that the current overtures by the Soviet Union do not justify any relaxation in mobilizing the defenses of this country and its allies because the Soviet Union remains a "grave danger" to the free world. Emphasizing that "the basic situation of danger" remains the same, Mr. Dulles maintains that nothing is likely to occur to make the unity of the free nations less urgent.




