Misses Reynolds, Nelson Retire; Faculty Changes

President Q. M. Smith announced Tuesday the addition of six persons to the Middle Tennessee State College faculty, the retirement of two others, effective July 1, and the change in heads of two departments in keeping with the requests of present department heads.

Dr. C. N. Stark, department of agriculture, and O. L. Freeman, department of industrial arts, submitted letters of resignation as head of the respective departments. Dr. Stark had previously asked to be relieved as farm manager. Both Dr. Stark and Mr. Freeman continue as full professors in their departments.

Dr. Clarence Chesnut, Jr., a member of the Agriculture department faculty, has been named as acting farm manager and will assume the departmental head duties June 1. Edwin S. Voorhes, formerly a member of the industrial arts department, but more recently an engineer with Redstone Arsenal, returns June 1 to become professor of industrial arts and act as head of the department.

Miss Tommie Reynolds, who has been with the college since it opened in 1911 and Miss Agnes Nelson, who has been with the college since 1937, will both retire July 1. Miss Reynolds is in the department of mathematics and Miss Nelson in home economics.

Additions to the faculty announced by President Smith include Miss Margaret Putman, from the State Department of Education, department of home economics as associate professor; John Lawler from Florida State University, instructor in English; Raymond De Shazo, from Mar's Hill junior college, assistant professor of English; Dr. Harris Dark, present head of David Lipscomb College mathematics department to an associate professorship in mathematics; Mrs. Lady Houston Brown of the regional library program to instructor in library science.

Full Day Student Teaching Helpful

Five Middle Tennessee State College prospective teachers are experiencing "what teaching is really like", according to Dr. Howard Batey, co-ordinator of a pioneering experiment in "teacher education" for student teachers.

Four of this number, James Dunlap, Nickie Coutras, Harold Woodward and Tommy Wilson, are teaching in Nashville and Davidson county schools. Dunlap is at Bellvue, Coutras at his Alma Mater, Hillsboro, Woodward at Hillsboro and Wilson at Goodlettsville. Dunlap is doing his work in business administration, Coutras in the social studies, while Woodward and Wilson work in health and physical education.

The fifth member of these "full day" student teachers is Arthur Irving of LaVergne who is doing his work at the Training School around the social science core for the eighth grade.

"There are many values in registering for the full day student teaching program" Dr. Batey pointed out. It does require planning some few quarters in advance because the 15 hours and concurrent seminar must be taken off the campus. Public school officials welcome this opportunity to look over prospective teachers and the student himself has the broad experience that he is to meet as a teacher. He secures classroom teaching experience under skilled guidance, not for just a few hours each day—but all the day. He has an opportunity to take part in the school extra-curricula program and in the work of the community," Dr. Batey continued.

The college and school administrators are interested in seeing this pioneering in teacher education expanded. It has been suggested that many who plan to do their student teaching next year might investigate the advantages offered by a full quater of "in the field" experience.

ASSEMBLY TO FEATURE COLLEGE ORCHESTRA

The Music Department will present the College Orchestra, under the direction of Rubye Taylor Sanders and conducted by Kenneth L. Pace, in the May 24, 9:00 a.m. assembly program.

The orchestral program, opened with an overture by Mozart, is composed of an interesting variety of dance forms. Sibelius' *Valse Triste* is one of the more serious compositions, while Strauss' *Pizzicato Polka* demonstrates the lighter side of the dance form. A strong, moving harmonization of three 17th century Dutch tunes, *In Time of Stress, Wilt Thou Walk Before the Lord*, and *See How Strong*, will conclude the program.



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

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

Although MTSC linkmen retained only one of the three golf crowns won last year—the VSAC trophy—charges of Coach Patty wound up the season as runnerup in the OVC at Richmond, Kentucky last Friday and Saturday.

The golf team under the sharp shooting of David "Doc" Tant's five under par 67 enabled the golfers to take the Volunteer State Athletic conference golf championship.

Tant made the 18 holes in a fine 37-30 for the 18 holes. He broke the old record of the Stones River country club course which was held by Coach E. W. Midgett of the MTSC faculty. The old record was a five under par 31 for 9 holes.

Marty Graham, another MTSC golfer, carded a 68 for the 18 and he was followed very closely by Jimmy Rager and Richard Smith with 70 and 72 scores respectively. Both these boys are members of Coach Elbert Patty's golf team

from MTSC.

They finished the tournament with 277 points which was 26 points in front of the second place East Tennessee State team which posted a 301 score.

Western Kentucky captured the Ohio Valley conference golf championship May 19, with a team score of 605 for the 36 holes of medal play on the Madison Country club course.

Eastern Kentucky's Donald Edwards won the individual championship with an even par, 144. Edwards was one under at 71 for Friday's play and finished with a 73 Saturday.

The tournament's hottest round, however, was fired by Jim Chandler, Eastern Kentucky's No. 2 golfer, who shot a three under par 69 yesterday on the 18 hole route of approximately 600 yards.

Chandler's 69 coupled with his 79 Friday gave him 148 and a tie for third with Marty Graham of Middle Tennessee.

Second place in individual honors went to Western Kentucky's Ray Law with 146.

Carson, Hurst Help Raiders Keep In Thick of OVC Field Meet

Middle Tennessee State College finished eight points from the top in the Ohio Valley Conference track and field meet held on the local field Saturday night, but placed Ed Carson first in the high hurdles and Jerry Hurst in a tie for first in the high jump. The Raiders felt the loss of their star dash man and relay team anchor man, co-captain Marvin Jinnette, who came up with a pulled thigh muscle in the TIAC meet a week ago.

Ollan Cassell of East Tennessee State and Paul Whiteley of Morehead State smashed the records they were supposed to Saturday night, but Bill Rucker of Eastern Kentucky stole the show in the Ohio Valley conference track meet here.

Rucker led Eastern to the team victory by scoring in five events, setting a new record on his own account in the process. He accumulated 14½ points out of Eastern's total of 39. Bunched close behind in team scoring were Morehead State, 36½; Tennessee Tech, 36; East Tennessee State, 35; Middle Tennessee State, 31; and Murray State, 28½. Trailing with 4 points was Western Kentucky, able to scratch in only one event.

Cassell, the state's dash sensation, clipped three-tenths of a second off the OVC mark in the 100-yard dash as he won by five yards in 9.7 seconds. He came back shortly afterward and lowered the 220-yard dash mark from 22.2 seconds to 21.4.

Whiteley won the half-mile and mile runs, establishing a new mark of 1:57.3 in the first and resetting the second at 4:21.8. Running in both events was his teammate, Carl Deaton, who held the old marks of 2:01 for the 880 and 4:25 for the mile.

Rucker ran away from the field in the 440-yard dash, winning in 49.6 for his contribution to the night of new records, and went on to a third place in the 220, fifth in the 100, second in the broad jump, and climaxed the whole thing by running anchor on Eastern's winning mile relay team. In the last event, he was faced with the task of catching up with ETSC's Cassell and was successful, winning by a scant six inches.

Worst break of the night befell Tennessee Tech's Tommy Chilton, a top dashman who has been clocked in 9.7 this season thought he heard a re-call on the 100 yard dash and did not run.

Western Kentucky's only score of the night came on the big Larry Nutter's second place in the discuss throw.

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
