Peck overrun with angry, violent squirrels

Within the past week, populations of squirrels inhabiting the Peck Hall area of the MTSU campus have begun viciously attacking members of the campus community.

Currently, the student and faculty casualties have reached an alarming 72 people, and many more are injured.

"This is a horrid atrocity," said President Sidney McPhee yesterday. "We are doing everything in our power, combining the efforts of the campus and city police departments, the fire department and other local

entities, to solve this problem."

Attempts to eliminate the squirrels have ranged from simple traps to tear gas and rifles. None of these attempts have been successful, however, and the squirrels continue to have control of Peck Hall as well as the surrounding wooded area.

'We have attempted to gas as well as fire upon the squirrels with no success," said Sgt. Biff Forbes, of Public Safety. "They are cunning and are able to defend themselves beyond the ability that we would have expected from some squirrel diggin' in the dirt. We expect their next target to be Cope Administration, They're currently moving in that direction."

The squirrels are believed to possess small, "squirrel-sized" nuclear technology, although this has not been confirmed. However, there are many large holes surrounding the area, and many students have been found with limbs torn from their torsos and evidence of explosion.

"As I've examined the bodies of some of the deceased students," said Dr. Wayne Carver, chief medical examiner of Connecticut, "small traces of radioactive materials were found as well as evidence of biological weaponry. We aren't

Liberal funding cut off

MTSU President Sidney McPhee announced yesterday that all university funding to support the College of Liberal Arts will be permanently suspended, effective immediately.

The decision came after months of banter between the president and his bad and good angels, who both finally convinced him that English, philosophy, political science and the like are "of the devil."

"Everyone knows that studying the arts can lead to enhanced critical thinking skills, and we simply can't condone that type of intelligence in a wholesome, virtuous community setting like Murfreesboro," said Vice President for Business and Finance Duane Stucky.

After half a semester of noisy renovation to a Peck Hall third floor storage closet to provide extra office space for instructors, construction has already begun in order to achieve just the opposite. Officials attempted to evict all professors and administrative staff late yesterday afternoon from both major academic buildings on the west side of campus to free up space for housing paperwork and other necessary items.

"We've got too many important items to store in that space," said Director of Campus Planning Patti Miller. "The [Jennings A. Jones] College of Business alone has at least 10 years' worth of back issues of Soap Opera Digest magazine."

So far, the inhabitants of the James Union Building and Peck Hall have banned together to challenge the decision and its accompanying dismissal. Efforts to acquire funding from the College of Business via violent force have begun (see "A campus divided," this page).

professor Assistant English Peter McCluskey, the appointed leader of Strike Force Grendel, one of many newly formed platoons, described the collective attitude as one of "livid concern for the Harbrace company and Norton, whoever that guy is."

McCluskey spent Wednesday afternoon protesting with the rest of the English department, cold and shivering amidst loose books and papers in the hallways of Peck Hall, refusing

A campus divided



The College of Liberal Arts issued a declaration of war to the Jennings A. Jones College of Business yesterday - a move prompting some students to run in fear and others to pick up arms.

The formal declaration is the culmination of years of simmering envy, finally brought to a boil with yesterday's decision by MTSU President Sidney McPhee to cut all funding to the Liberal Arts program.

"They've had it coming for years," said Liberal Arts Dean and newly appointed four-star general John McDaniel. "Since President McPhee refuses to fund our programs, we have unfortunately been forced to defend our right to exist on campus. That means taking funding from a more wealthy col-

The state of war took Business Dean E. James Burton by surprise, but, in a hastily called press conference, he took pains to assure his students that the school was not unpre-

"It's unfortunate that the Marxists have forced this confrontation," Burton said. "But if they want a war between the classes, you can be by God sure we'll give it to them. We have the money, means and friends to see this through to the end. They'll be praying to Stalin for salvation by the time we're done with them."

Much like World War I, agreements and associations between schools have engulfed the entire campus in conflict. The philosophy department immediately agreed to enter the battle on the side of their ideological colleagues, despite being

housed in the James Union Building. Their first assignment was to gain access and control of Sidelines, however, their efforts were successfully repelled (see "Sidelines' defends against philosophy, journalism attack," this page).

The School of Music has also promised to respect its designation and fight alongside other liberal arts majors.

However, the College of Mass Communication has pledged to provide recording industry majors, of which they claim to have an infinite supply, to the business school as infantry and drummer boys.

"We will not allow the sanctity of the Quad to be violated by some heathens who cannot accept their role in our society," said Anantha Babbili, dean of the College of Mass

'Sidelines' defends against philosophy, journalism attack

In the early hours of fighting yesterday, the only clear victor was Sidelines, having repelled two separate attacks and maintained its neutrality.

Soon after declaring war on the Jennings A. Jones College of Business (see "A campus divided," this page), Dean of Liberal Arts John McDaniel solicited a guarantee of support from the philosophy department. His first mission for the professors was to entice Sidelines, the campus newspaper, to join the liberal arts cause, using force if need be.

To editor in chief Lindsey Turner, the psychological and physical warfare came as somewhat of a surprise.



Protest tells protesters to be productive

Members of MTSU's Solidarity had enough and took a stand last Saturday when they staged an anti-protest protest in front of a group of protesters opposing the war in Iraq.

"We're sick and tired of it all," said MTSU professor Moon Toad. "The war in Iraq, the World Bank, women's reproductive rights, that whole Gore teaching with only an undergrad thing. The crap never ends. Our hair is always dirty and we smell because we don't have time to take a bath. Please, white kids with dreads. That's not natural. It's because they are too tired to wash it."

The anti-protest protest was the culmination of several events that have occurred this semester. Already, the members of Solidarity have been to three protests this fall, traveling as far as Washington, D.C, to take part.

"Driving down to D.C. and staying with fellow protesters cut down the cost but do you

know how much it costs to fill up a tank in an Explorer," asked MTSU basket weaving major Sunflower Seeds. "It costs an arm and a leg. I don't know what my parents were thinking. I asked them for a Mustang."

Another major concern expressed by the anti-protesters at Saturday's event was the bad weather that's been trailing them on their fight for freedom and justice.

was raining Washington, D.C., Nashville, and in Murfreesboro during some of the scheduled events. "It's discouraging," said

MTSU senior blunt rolling major Daisy Petal.

"Whenever it looks that we have gotten somewhere, gotten some media coverage and have people expressing their support, it rains. No one wants to protest in the rain. The ink on your posters run, you open your mouth to chant and you practically drown and the joint you're smoking goes out."

Other participants are equally upset by the weather and said

they think they have stumbled on the cause of it.

"I could just cry," Toad said. "The weather patterns are obviously a plot by President Bush to throw a wrench into the works. Everyone knows that the president has scientists working on ways to alter atmospheric pressure. Just think about all of the hurricanes that have been hitting Florida recently. They don't have those butterfly ballots anymore and an election is coming up."

The president's office would

not confirm or deny Toad's accusations.

The last factor influencing the anti-protesters is the futility of their work, they said.

Protests in the United States have been ignored for at least the past 100 years.

"I mean, not protesting isn't a big deal anyway," Seeds said. "Everyone knows that as soon as we graduate we will take our place in corporate America and work at repressing rights so that

our kids will have something to protest." ◆

MTSU opens middle school in Kuala Lumpur

Not to be outdone by the University of Tennessee, MTSU officials have decided to enact

middle school Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia.

Plans for the middle school, tentatively named Little Middle

School, will be modeled loosely after the UT system's plans to build a high school in Beijing, China, that will mirror the average Tennessee high school and be fully accredited by the state.

"We feel that this project can only improve the university and get our name out there as the highest-quality university in the state," said MTSU President Sidney McPhee. "If we can train and attract Malaysian residents, it will not only further diversify this campus, but also let people in that corner of the world know that Middle Tennessee means business."

Little Middle School will be a scaled-down version of the MTSU campus, complete with a mini-Floyd stadium for kickball and a set of condemned dormitories "to show the children that we recognize misfortune and work around it when faced with it," said Tennessee Higher Education Association spokeswoman Arlene Dawkins.

The middle school will offer traditional courses generally instituted in Tennessee secondary schools - English, math and health. Unlike the UT plan, which will allow Chinese education officials to implement their own, much more advanced, math and science programs, Little Middle School will be bound to a strict, average Tennessee curriculum.

"It wouldn't be fair to overeducate these kids past the levels of learning currently reached by our state's middle schoolers," Dawkins said. "We want them to be on the same level of education with our middle and high school graduates when - or if, I guess - they come to a Tennessee university to further their education."

Both MTSU and UT have come under some criticism for their worldly efforts, McPhee said. UT President John Shumaker received e-mails accusing him of trying to "educate little terrorists" from a communist nation.

McPhee said he'd received

similar accusations.

"I got a rather strange voice mail the other day accusing me of trying to infect Tennessee with yellow fever," he said. "There are also those few who an initiative that will create a are still hung up about the fact

that the area is primarily Islamic, but been told by the Tennessee Board Regents] that there are plenty of Christians

over there and, if there aren't, there will be soon."

Mary Morgan, spokeswoman for the TBR, said one of the major reasons university officials chose Kuala Lumpur is its harsh drug policy.

"As higher education officials, we're always on the lookout for the safety of our students," Morgan said. "We felt that Malaysia's mandatory death sentencing for illicit drug trafficking is a definite positive. We can be assured that the kids we're educating out there are clean as a 'Bama bearcat in Tuscaloosa on game day."

Shumaker and other UT officials traveled to China earlier in the month to discuss the terms of the project, which include lending the name of the UT system - though not Tennessee taxpayer money - to the project.

McPhee, who has visited Malaysia once, said that, due to an all-around lack of surplus funds, the university would not be able to support the multimillion dollar initiative on its

"The state, foreseeing little cooperation from the people of Tennessee, has decided to forego the project," McPhee said. "We've asked that the people of Malaysia contribute to the operating and construction funds via a fee of several thousand ringgit per month."

McPhee also said the university is considering raising MTSU's tuition to subsidize the middle school's costs, but that TBR officials would have to meet at least 14 1/2 more times before a decision could be made.

"Of course, we don't want to raise tuition," Dawkins said, but when things need to be done, it's only fair that students foot the bill. If we relied of the constituency of Tennessee, we'd never be able to educate 12year-old Malaysians. If we want the name 'Middle Tennessee' to ever mean anything, everyone is going to have to pay up." •

Communication.

Babbili acknowledged that journalism professors and an elite group of student writers were dispatched to a battle scene in the James Union Building, but would not comment further on their mission.

Because an attack on the Business and Aerospace Building would threaten their livelihood as well, the aerospace department has aligned with the business school and promised to provide second-strike capabilities should the BAS fall under attack.

McPhee has elected not to get directly involved in the conflict, requesting instead that ROTC platoons be stationed in the Cope Administration Building and his home. While expressing hope that a peaceful resolution could be reached, the president admitted that he would rather see the Business college triumph.

McDaniel had provided Sidelines with a map of his troops' initial positions rounding the BAS and Quad. He said the number of student volunteers willing to fight for the school's cause is more than he would have ever believed.

"I have full confidence that our students will emerge victorious from this battle," McDaniel said. "With the guided leadership of professors, such as Peter McCluskey of the English department and Robb McDaniel, who, with his experience as a Commodore, will be in charge of our naval force in case it rains before this whole thing

Many liberal arts students expressed similar sentiments.

"It is time for we, the poor and oppressed, to rise up in arms against the capitalist pig dogs housed in that fancy cas-

dealing with some nut-eating rodents here." Carver is known for his particular interest in animal-related deaths and was called

immediately to help with the investigation. President George W. Bush was notified of the situation yesterday and issued a public statement within which he vowed to devote any resources necessary to resolving the problem.

We need to send forces in immediately to rid the world - wait, I mean the school of the Iraqi threat - pardon me - this squirrel-based threat," he said. "I have reason to believe that they have weapons of mass destruction that are far larger than the peasized bombs the scientists are describing. The time for action is now! Kill the Ira ... squirrels!"

School administrators are calling for drastic measures and will continue to recruit outside sources on both the state and national level to help aid with the prob-

"We're considering consulting the FBI," said Bob Glenn, vice president for Student Affairs. "And we will consider other sources as well. Our objective is to eliminate the squirrel threat as soon as possible."

As the squirrels continue to organize and attack the student population, a small student uprising was surfaced in support of the squirrels. The students call themselves Students For Squirrel Retaliation. SFSR has been supporting the squirrel activities with food rations and other such aid.

"We believe in the squirrels and their cause," said Audie Sheridan, a senior in philosophy and the president of SFSR. "We understand that we have wronged these animals as students, faculty and humans. Each of us would lay down our lives and give ourselves to the mercy of the squirrels, but they seem to only require our occasional assistance and support."

There are no indications of when students might expect Peck Hall to fully reopen. •




Resident ghosts make Ezell, Abernathy a happening haunt

Some MTSU students travel to Nashville haunted houses to get their fill of fright around Halloween.

Others truck up to Adams, Tenn., to visit the homestead of Tennessee's most famous resident ghost, the Bell Witch.

Many students may not realize, however, that there are hauntings and spirits much closer than both Nashville and Adams.

Some say there are restless souls still residing in the campus' most notorious dormitories – Ezell and Abernathy halls.

The dorms, which were evacuated and condemned in 1999, have been the site of much supernatural activity since their closing.

At least that's what local psychic Madame Puunbaba says. Puunbaba has made several unauthorized trips to the condemned dorms, where she says she feels intense unrest and all-around ickiness emanating from the rooms.

Taking a leisurely stroll over the fences surrounding the buildings and down one delapidated corridor one night last week, Puunbaba said she got especially icky vibes from Room 210 of Ezell.

"My senses tell me something bad happened in this room," she said, rubbing her temples. "A nervous boy lost his virginity to his second cousin, and someone died from eating asbestos."

Puunbaba said the spirit of the asbestoseater was still lingering.

"He's angry," she said, feeling the crumbling brick wall. "Someone in financial aid was rude to him and lost his application weeks before. It must have driven him to the edge."

Puunbaba recalled more supernatural vibes she had sensed in other rooms in the dorm complex.

"There's one room in which these four pathetic losers still sit and play 'Quake' during all hours of the day," she said. "They tell me that, while officials were herding residents out during a particularly bad concrete shower one day, these guys were in the middle of a four-player deathmatch. Now that room has been plowed into the ground by a steel beam and chunks of concrete. But they're still playing, bless their hearts."

Puunbaba recalled the night she ran into a wandering spirit who was trying to find his car, which he thought he parked in the gravel lot of the Recreation Center.

A former resident of Abernathy Hall, Jeaneane Illsuyou, confirms the rumored ghost stories. She said her roommate disappeared after residents were evacuated suddenly in March 1999, and that her former room light comes on sometimes at night.

"In the mad dash to get out," she said, "my roommate got caught up with her luggage and all her stupid little stuffed animals that she always left strewn all over the floor for me to trip all over. I kind of always wondered what happened to her. I heard concrete fell on her and smashed her pretty little head and squished her \$3,000 salinefilled chest."

Housing and Residential Life, citing FERPA rulings, would not release any information about the woman, who would have been an MTSU public relations graduate by now.

"I see that room light come on at night sometimes when we're walking to the Rec Center," Illsuyou said. "That bitch always kept the light on for everything she did, even if I was trying to sleep."

With the university's plans to convert the delapidated dorms into office space, the thought of lingering spirits might make some uneasy, but it makes some officials

more than happy to market the idea.

"We're the only university in Middle



International athletes imported for furniture making

Middle Tennessee Athletic Director Boots Donnelly was arrested yesterday for his role in the importation of international student athletes to work in MT sweatshops in Eagleville,

"I'm innocent! I coached football," Donnelly screamed as he was dragged into an unmarked car outside the Murphy Center.

The FBI discovered that MT had been importing athletes under the guise of playing a collegiate sport and then forcing them to work in factories located in Eagleville on the outskirts of Rutherford County. The athletes were forced to make chairs, desks, dry-erase boards and several items found in the Phillips Book Store, including text-

'What did you think these students were coming here for?" an anonymous FBI source asked. "I mean, really, we are the FBI and we hadn't even heard of your school. How did you think that students from Africa would want to come here?"

The FBI also took in football

head coach Andy McCollum, men's tennis coach Dale Short and the recently hired men's head basketball coach, Kermit Davis, for questioning.

With promises of monetary compensation that would have violated NCAA regulations, MT lured some of the poorer students from as far as North Korea, India, Germany, South Africa, Russia, Barbados, Sierra Leone, Brazil and New Zealand.

Here, the students were forced to compete in matches at night and work in the sweatshops while American-born athletes attended class. After their NCAA eligibility expired, the students would be transported to MTSU-owned land in Alaska, which was just recently sold. The land had been bought by a dummy company owned by Donnelly. The student athletes in the workshops during the raid were thankful for the opportunity to get out of the MT labor camp.

"It has been so awful," said Eva Patel, a tennis player from India. "I am so thankful for the United States government and their police officials. Maybe now I will be given the opportunity to get a real education

while playing a sport."

Immigration Naturalization Services immediately came to the Eagleville location to deport Patel and several other Indian evacuees because of anti-terrorist legislation implemented by President George W. Bush in the wake of the Sept. 11 attacks.

"The vision of President Bush requires us to send these people home," an anonymous INS source said. "After all, they look like they could be members of al Qaeda. I am sure President Bush will agree with our decision. And come on, he

The other student-athletes will be given the opportunity to attend MT and participate in classes for the length of their NCAA eligibility.

The FBI is not certain when Donnelly's trial will start.

"We are still gathering evidence," the FBI source said. "We hope to put him away for a long time. Or at least as long as he is alive. The man is kind of old."

University President Sidney McPhee was at practice for his upcoming concert and was unavailable for comment before press time.

Gore named honorary coach

In a move with the potential to win both games and votes from sports fans, former Vice President and current MTSU professor Al Gore will join the coaching staff of all 15 of Middle Tennessee's varsity sports teams.






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I wanted to go to Bovine University, but Principal Skinner said I wasn't right for it. It made me sad. Daddy told me to leave.
