

It is understood that State Board approval of the program will necessitate the addition of several faculty members in the department of agriculture. 

The recent action taken by the Disciplinary Board met with the approval of Congress after the consideration given students by this board in hearing their case. While the students were not represented mem-bers of Congress as they should have been, the board did give the elected students an opportunity to plead their case and that was all they asked for. It was one of the most pleasing cases of co-operation between students and faculty.

There is one big flaw in the present Disciplinary Board and that is the absence of student representation. This question was debated at length at the last meeting of Congress and the following amendments have been passed by Congress and will go to the president.

1. The Supreme Court of the ASB of MTSC shall be enacted as the student disciplinary board.

2. Be it further enacted that this board shall hear and pass judgment on all cases of student offenses within the boundaries of the campus of MTSC.


