

# Lentz new president

MTSU has a new ASB president. Holly Lentz claimed 573 votes in Wednesday's run-off election to win the presidency. Doug Roth received 507 votes.

There were 1,080 votes cast in the election. Lentz received 53 percent while Roth received 47 percent.

"I'm very excited. Right now I'm on cloud nine," Lentz said. "I couldn't be happier."

Lentz also thanked the MTSU student body.

Roth said he congratulated Lentz personally.

"I would like to thank everybody

that voted for me," Roth said.

Lentz said she is "more than willing to talk" with Roth about a position in her cabinet.

"I have spoken with Tony [Morreale, a candidate for president] about a cabinet position, Lentz said. "As for Doug, he hasn't contacted me yet."

Lentz said two of the cabinet positions are filled.

"My chief of staff will be Jo Willey and the homecoming director will be Rob Marlin," Lentz said. Both served as campaign managers for Lentz during the election.

Lentz said she chose Willey as her chief of staff because they are

"close friends" and the "chief of staff fully to be someone you can trust fully."

Marlin was selected because of his experience with other homecomings.

"He has attended several universities and has seen several homecomings," Lentz said.

One of Lentz's main promises during the month-long election was she would improve homecoming.

As for the other cabinet positions, Lentz said she is "working on a better application for cabinet positions."

"I want to get a good cross section of the entire student body in

my cabinet."

Lentz said right now she is "preparing for the transition."

"I plan to do exactly what I've said throughout my entire campaign," Lentz said.

During her campaign, Lentz promised to, if elected, restructure homecoming "to allow all organizations, no matter how small, to participate."

Another concern was the cost of homecoming.

She said she is "particularly committed to giving organizations an option to avoid the huge investment required to produce large floats."

## 35 abortions per week in Nashville clinic

"Saturday is a big day. We see about 35 girls," said Edie Ric-Sauer, educator of the Planned Parenthood Association of Nashville.

Ric-Sauer was speaking of the "35 girls" who undergo an actual abortion with the ages of the "girls" ranging from 12 to menopause.

Planned Parenthood offers "pregnancy testing, option counseling, and referrals based on the individual's decision," said Ric-Sauer.

"If the person decides on abortion, they can return back to the clinic provided they are under 13 weeks into the pregnancy," Ric-Sauer said.

Beyond 13 weeks, the individual is referred out of state; usually to the Women's Health Services in Louisville, Ky. where care is the "least expensive," said Ric-Sauer.

### Last in a series

"There is no federal funding for abortion. Our fee is \$235."

The procedure for an abortion takes four to five hours, the actual abortion takes five minutes, Ric-Sauer said.

"The person must have a confirmed pregnancy to be scheduled. Upon visitation, the individual is counseled for an hour."

"Counseling begins with a complete medical history to ensure

there are no problems. We also cover the areas of family planning. If the person is going to be sexually active, we counsel clearly on the types birth control. We even counsel on how to say no.

"Most importantly, this is a time for questions; how they came to us and what made them decide. We make it real clear that there are other choices available. Some parents force the girl into coming; it must be the choice of the individual. It [abortion] is a difficult thing to face, being forced into it makes the emotional turmoil that much more difficult."

"In addition to discussing alternatives, we explain the agenda and

abortion procedure, as well as the physical and emotional aspects of the abortion.

"Testing is then done, which entails a pap smear, a breast exam, and a gonorrhea culture. The abortion is then performed with 45 minutes usually taken for recovery. Cramping is very bad at first but is reduced to a minimum over time."

"They are then given food and drink. Before they leave, they will see another counselor to discuss birth control. They are scheduled to come back in three weeks," Ric-Sauer said.

## Alabama judge rules schools segregated

ATLANTA (AP) — The Justice Department charged Wednesday that Alabama's state colleges are segregated because of funding discrepancies and because new colleges were created to lure white students from nearby black institutions.

Michael Carvin, a Justice Department attorney, said such practices violate the Civil Rights Act, which bars federally funded programs from discriminating.

He asked the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals to uphold U.S. District Court Judge U.W. Clemon

in Alabama, who ruled in 1985 that several mostly white colleges and the Alabama Board of Education were guilty of racial bias.

Clemon planned to hold a new round of proceedings to determine a remedy. But the 11th Circuit froze the order pending the outcome of the appeal filed by Auburn, Troy State, the University of Alabama and the state school board.

"The state has consistently engaged in segregation — inducing practices by creating white schools near black schools and by failing to adequately fund black schools,"

Carvin told a three-judge panel of the 11th Circuit.

Attorneys for the state and many of its colleges argued that the Justice Department cannot use Title VI of the Civil Rights Act in such a broad fashion, but must show examples of discrimination in specific federally funded programs. The attorneys also said that Clemon, the first black federal judge in Alabama, must be disqualified

from the case because he was intimately involved in issues related to the case while serving earlier as a state senator.

"The Justice Department has no jurisdiction to bring this proceeding to court under Title VI," said Edward Allen, an attorney for Auburn University.

It is not enough to show that mostly white Auburn University at

## McWherter proclaims Freedom of Info day

In honor of the United States' fourth president, James Madison, March 16, 1987 was proclaimed "Freedom of Information Day" by Gov. Ned Ray McWherter.

The proclamation, in an effort to recognize the concerns of possible restrictions in Tennessee's open records law, was presented to Frank Gibson, city editor at THE TENNESSEAN, on the eve of a debate that occurred Feb. 23.

There is some fear among Tennessee journalists and media personalities that restricting the open

records law will deprive the public of its right to know and to be informed on public matters, Gibson said.

The open records law currently states that all citizens are having the right to gain access to any state during regular business hours. However, the proposed changes call for access to be denied if the information jeopardizes an ongoing investigation or brings harm to suspects, victims, family members of suspects and victims, informants or undercover officers.

## Folklore society releases 8th album

The Tennessee Folklore Society's eight phonograph record set, *It's Just the Same Today*, was released Monday, and will be available in limited quantities without charge to qualified educators.

"One of our primary goals is to get it to the teachers," said Charles Wolfe, an English professor, who acted as production coordinator for the album. "In fact, we've done this with several of our albums."

According to Wolfe, there is a great interest across the state in teaching folklore material in class, and the TFS is concerned with getting "real" traditional material into the classrooms.

"There's not much material available in the terms of tools," Wolfe said. "There's an awful lot of phony folklore, especially folk music."

"So, what we've been interested in since 1975, when we put out the first album like this, was to put out authentic, honest-to-God traditional material from Tennessee, and get it into the hands of teachers who are interested in it."

The new album is a collection of 17 songs selected from a body of over 600 field recordings made by Mary Elizabeth Barnicle, who is considered one of the most prodigious recorders and educators of the folklore and folklife of Appalachia, Wolfe said.

He added that the recordings, made between the years 1935 and 1951, were made on 78 rpm, 10 and 12 inch aluminum or acetate discs by Barnicle and her husband, Tillman Cadle.

"Cadle let us borrow the records, and we took them to the Country

Music hall of Fame, which has the biggest sound restoration lab between the two coasts," Wolfe said.

## Car license plate tinting illegal

Altering or covering up license plates is illegal and hampers the efforts of law enforcement officials in the performance of their duties, said Murfreesboro Police Commissioner Bill Jones.

"The tampering, tinting or covering of a license plate could certainly result in the law enforcement agency not being furnished with the correct information to help solve a crime," Jones said in a statement released Wednesday.

"The citizens of our community have been extremely helpful in fur-

nishing license numbers to the proper law enforcement officers investigating armed robberies, hit-and-run vehicles involved in traffic accidents, DUI drivers, and other violations of the law," Jones said.

State law is clear-cut concerning how a license plate is to be displayed and should be free of foreign materials, he added.

Specifically, the law states "Every registration plate shall at all times be securely fastened in a horizontal position to the vehicle...in a place and position to be clearly visible and shall be maintained free

from foreign materials and in a condition to be clearly legible."

Montgomery educational programs that duplicate programs at mostly black Alabama State University in Montgomery, Allen said. Rather, he said, the government must show that Auburn-Montgomery racially discriminated in these programs.

The panel, which heard arguments from both sides in a two-hour session, did not indicate when it would rule in the case.

However, Judge Robert Vance repeated an earlier warning that the parties should settle the case out of court.

The judges, who said there was

no legal precedent for the Justice Department's argument, sharply questioned Carvin. "All your theories are bunk," Vance said to Carvin. "We can desegregate the schools of Montgomery with a decree, but you are giving us no basis to support these theories."

The 6-year-old lawsuit involves any state schools in Alabama, but it focuses primarily on institutions located in Huntsville and Montgomery.

Mostly black Alabama A&M contends that the state has curtailed its ability to attract white students by giving more money to mostly white schools, such as Auburn University, and by duplicating its programs at two newer white schools in

"We cleaned them up, made good tapes and created this album from the results."

"One of the things that Mr. Cadle wanted was to make these records available to the people, especially teachers," Wolfe said.

"We've done that with two other albums — the *Free Hill* album, which came out last year, and *Historical Ballads of the Tennessee Valley*."

*Free Hill* got the TFS a "major" story in *The Tennessean*, because it

was the first time anybody had attempted to document a rural black culture in that way, Wolfe said.

"It was basically a sound portrait of a little town near Salina, called Free Hill," Wolfe said.

The TFS received a research grant from the National Endowment of the Arts to fund the research and the restoration of the tapes, Wolfe said. He said the actual manufacturing of the album was paid for by TFS with profits from the sales of the other albums.

"The albums are well received," Wolfe said. "We get very good reviews. In fact, the *Free Hill* album

was picked up by 'Voice of America,' and it was played on National Public Radio's 'All Things Considered.'"

Wolfe said two more albums are planned for this year. The next will feature East Tennessee banjo and fiddle music. An album of gospel from Lawrenceburg, Tenn., is being prepared.

The TFS has a membership of between 600 and 700 members from across the world, Wolfe said.

"We have members in Cambridge, England, and in Paris," Wolfe said. "We ship to about 32 foreign countries, as well as here in Tennessee."

South, Planned Parenthood is open from 8:00 to 10:00 on Tuesday, all day on Thursday and Friday and every other Saturday.

The procedure at the Charlotte Avenue Medical Clinic, Inc. located at 4407 Charlotte Avenue is basically the same as Family Planning.

"The fee is \$200 in cash or money order. We do up to 12 weeks; we don't do it after," said Anne [not her real name], a secretary.

"Upon vistration, the girl will sign in and complete a medical history chart. She will wait until it is her turn to go into the lab, whereupon she will take a blood test and a pregnancy test," Anne said.

Here is where the two clinics differ — the rest of the procedure is done as a group.

"The group will receive counseling from a nurse. All that she will

do is explain the procedure and its after-effects.


"After signing a consent form, the girls wait in one waiting room. The process takes 10 minutes. There is only one doctor. Recovery takes about 20 minutes.

"We average 6 girls a day and 15 on Saturdays. The ages span from youngest to oldest is approximately 12 to 45," Anne said.

There are no abortion clinics in Murfreesboro.

## Psychedelic Furs, Aretha Franklin and Dead or Alive prepare your Walkman for a Spring Break of music



[Editor's Note: Since today is the official beginning of SPRING BREAK, and music is usually a big part of Spring Break (with Walkmans and all), we thought we would give you three reviews of possible Spring Break music.]

*Midnight To Midnight* is the latest release from England's Psychedelic Furs. Reviews of this album (which is the band's fifth) thus far have been mixed, but after three years of silence, it sure is great to hear from them again!

Essentially, the Psychedelic Furs (or P-Furs) are three people: brothers Richard Butler (vocals) and Tim Butler (bass), and John Ashton (guitars). *Midnight To Midnight* features the talents of eight other musicians, including Paul Garisto (drums), Mars Williams (horns/sax), and Jon Carin (keyboards). The album was produced by Chris Kimsey, who has worked previously with Killing Joke, Marillion, and the Rolling Stones.

"Heartbreak Beat" is the album's first single, and it just happens to be the first song on side one: "There's a heartbreak beat/Playing all night long/Down on my street/And it feels like love/Got the radio on/And that's all that we need." I've always liked the sound of Richard Butler's voice, and here, it comes across just as great as ever.

"Shock" is a much tougher song; it is forceful and hard-edged. The opening lyrics are as follows: "I hear brand new talk everywhere I go/They got a new word for what we do/When the lights get low/And I hear my heart beat black and blue/Don't call it love and don't keep time for me and you."

"Angels Don't Cry" is a really nice song; by comparison, it is soft and gloomy. Butler sings "I try to remember a kiss and I only get sorrow/And yesterday's faded away now there's only tomorrow/And everything changes and passes and comes to an end, I know/And nothing is written but old news, again and again." This song is heavy on the saxophone, and features a strong solo.

In general, the songs on side two are more rock-n-roll oriented than those on side one. "One More Word," "All Of The Law" and "Torture" are three examples of just how hard-driving and non-pop the Furs can be. These are probably the strongest cuts on the entire album.

Be sure to listen for news about a world tour coming up for the Psychedelic Furs in promotion of this new release. Although I didn't get a chance to see them when they performed in Nashville last fall, I don't intend to miss them again. The *Midnight To Midnight* tour should be a tremendous success!

If she hasn't already, Aretha Franklin should get the R-E-S-P-E-C-T she sang of so many years back thanks to her latest effort simply titled *Aretha*.

I knew I was in for some fun when I saw the album in the store. With the simple title and the cover

art — a portrait of Aretha by the late Andy Warhol — it is obvious that Aretha is ready for some fun herself.

The first track, "Jimmy Lee," begins with slow lyrics "All this time I couldn't shake your memory/And I never knew the sweetest love was the first / So what am I supposed to do about this curse? / I wonder if I'm goin' insane / And I'm callin' out your name...Jimmy Lee." Then the song speeds up to become a dance track that is at least equal to last year's "Freeway of Love."

The video to "Jimmy Lee" features scenes with a young version of Aretha as she meets and falls for Jimmy Lee.

The next song is the current video and music chart climber which features a duet between the "Queen of Soul" and Pop music's Prince Charming George Michael (formerly of Wham).

"I Knew You Were Waiting (For Me)" provides a great chance to hear one of rock's most established females and a relative newcomer to the music scene. The two singers compliment each other's talents in both the song and the video which features Aretha singing in front of a large screen video of herself and other Motown greats, while George sings in front of "old" Wham video footage. When they are singing the same lines, their images are edited so that you see Aretha on screen behind George or vice-versa.

The theme of memories continues with the third track "Do You Still Remember." This lyrical ballad should let Whitney Houston know that she hasn't got anything on Aretha. "Do you still remember / Do you still recall / Memories so tender didn't we have something after all."

The final track on the first side is "Jumpin' Jack Flash." This was used for the title track for last year's Whoopi Goldberg movie of the same name, and yes, it is a remake of the Stone's classic.

While avid fans of The Rolling Stones might argue, Aretha does justice to such a classic rock-n-roll tune. This could be in part because her version features Keith Richards

on lead guitar and Ron Wood on guitar.

On the inside jacket of the album, Aretha says, "We rode the freeways in '85, now full speed ahead, gang, Let's Get In Overdrive."

Well, the first cut on the second side definitely doesn't remain in idle. "Rock-A-Lott" does just what the title suggests.

One of the highlights on this track is the spoken words by Aretha which follow a deep-voiced repetitive chanting of the word "Rock." Aretha's spoken plea goes as follows: "It's time to jam ya'll / Freaks, gewt up against the wall / and let's rock..." This brings us into the let's rock... This is accentuated by occasional seductive laughs that easily rival any noise Tina Turner might make.

Aretha ends this song with more spoken lyrics: "It's time to rock with Re Re / Rockin' is my souls desire / and I'm gonna set you on fire..." and she could!

The rest of the album seems to be there to prove that not only can Aretha make you hot, she can also make you thi... — about what she is singing.

The last song is "Look to the Rainbow." This song was written in 1946 (my parents weren't even 5 years old then). "Look to the Rainbow" carries a hopeful theme which could be corny, but it works even forty years after it was written. "Look to the rainbow / Follow it over the hills and the sea... Follow the fellow who follows the dream."

If nothing else, this song will prompt you to check out your Mom's record collection for some vintage Aretha when she was only the "Princess of Soul."

Dead Or Alive's *Mad, Bad, And Dangerous To Know* isn't exactly a new album; in fact, I've had it in my collection and on my turntable (quite frequently) for the past several months. However, I am just now getting around to officially reviewing it, so if you haven't heard it, you may (or may not) want to



read this.

Problem: I'm in complete ignorance as to the names of the musicians in Dead Or Alive; I don't even really know how many of them there are (but I estimate three). The person pictured on the album cover has very long black hair and an exceptionally pale and phantomsque face; however, he is a beautiful being. He is attired in black clothing and wears black eye make-up to match. From a chain around his neck hangs a large silver cross. On the album's inner sleeve, there is a photograph of a skinhead-looking person and another person whose face is obscured by dark sunglasses. These three people, I assume, are the members of Dead Or Alive.

The song that first caught my attention and led me to the nearest record store to purchase this album was "Something In My House." This is seven minutes and twenty seconds of the ultimate in alternative dance music (Warehouse 28 stuff), and although the lyrics aren't brilliant, I must admit that they are rather catchy: "It's four o'clock in the morning and I'm sitting on my stairs/And there's banging 'round the bedroom even though I know there's no one there/And I am here

all by myself and you're somewhere else with someone else/And I'm being haunted by a love that isn't there."

"Brand New Lover" is probably the most successful song on the album; it is quite popular, and even has a video on MTV. "I want surprises," sings man-in-black/lead-singer-dude, "what I really need to do is find myself a brand new lover/ Somebody who'll lie to me/Who doesn't notice all the others."

Another song that really stands out is "Then There Was You," which is just slightly less danceable, but you won't even notice. The lyrics begin like this: "What a dizzy spin my whole spirit was in/All my blue skies, they had turned to grey/ And I had money, enough to burn/ So why did I still sing the blues?/ When suddenly, then there was you."

Drug addiction metaphors aren't a new concept in lyrics, but "Hooked On Love" is certainly a good song. 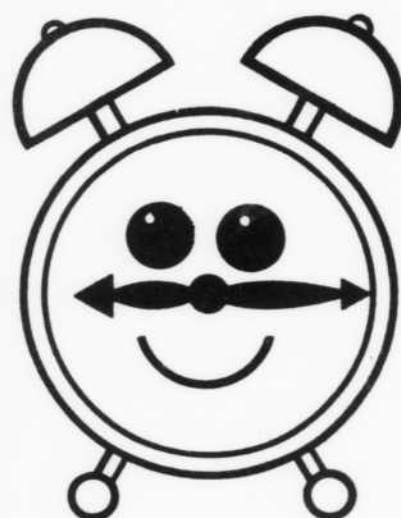

## 'Doc' Baker appointed to make everything better

By now, everyone knows that former Tennessee Senator Howard Baker is the new White House Chief of Staff. He was named to replace Donald T. Regan, who resigned as a result of the controversy over his role in the Iran-Contra arms affair. President Reagan made an excellent choice in picking Howard Baker for the job. He has the right credentials for the job. But, who is Howard Baker? He comes from a political family. His grandmother was a county sheriff and another relative was a county judge. His father, Howard Baker, Sr., served as a Representative in Congress from 1951-1964. Baker's stepmother, Irene, took her husband's place upon his death. His father-in-law was also a baker in Congress. Senator Everett McKinley Dirksen ran a bakery before he was elected to the U. S. House in 1932. He later became a Senator and served 10 years as Senate Republican leader. Baker's wife, Joy, is Senator and Mrs. Dirksen's only daughter. Baker was elected to the Senate in 1966, defeating then-Governor Frank G. Clement. He was re-elected in 1972 over then-Rep. (and later Governor) "Honest" Ray Blanton. He trounced Jane Eskind in 1978. In 1984, Baker decided not to run for re-election, saying he wanted to look closely at a 1988

presidential bid. Had he chosen to run for re-election, he would still be in the Senate. Speculation mounted last year that Senator Baker would not run due to the health problems of his wife, Joy. Visits to Iowa and New Hampshire and the recovery of Mrs. Baker earlier this year seemed to turn things around. Baker brings to his new position as Chief of Staff the right credentials to get the job done. He is respected by members of both parties. He knows how to get things done. As Senate majority leader, he

helped President Reagan pass much of his landmark legislation during the President's first term. He can get along with the press. This isn't important to most of us out here in Middle Tennessee, but some members of the Washington press corps think they must approve any appointment a President makes. (Say, when are Sarah McClendon and Sam Donaldson up for re-election?) Baker is forthright and honest, two qualities not seen often enough on Capitol Hill. By accepting this new post, Baker forfeits his presidential ambitions for 1988 and possibly

beyond that. This is an act of courage and patriotism and true statesmanship. Howard Baker will be an excellent Chief of Staff for the President. He is a true American statesman and his service should endear him to his fellow Tennesseans and to his fellow Americans. OTHER NOTES: Senators Robert Dole, R-Kansas and Joseph Biden, D-Delaware have both formed expository presidential committees. This puts them one step closer toward a formal announcement of their intentions for 1988. AND...Jake Butcher is still in federal prison.

**Thanks, I think**

To the Editor: I want to thank MTSU *Sidelines* and reporter Kim Harris for the excellent series on pregnancy counseling which ran Feb. 27 through March 10. Ms. Harris did an excellent job of interviewing all sources for counseling. And, since every source she interviewed in articles 1-3 said they referred students to

the Crisis Pregnancy Support Center, she knew she needed to do an "undercover" expose of the center. Ms. Harris' expose revealed several facts about the services of the CPSC: 1) the CPSC was not deceptive on the phone with her (article 4, paragraph 4); 2) the CPSC counselor realized Ms. Harris' (not the name she gave) nervousness and did nothing to increase it (article

article 4, paragraph 6); 3) the CPSC accepted Ms. Harris unconditionally, without judging or concerning, and gave her the information needed to make a good decision about her situation (based on the information [lies] she had given the counselor) (article 4, paragraph 7); and 4) the CPSC counselor was obviously there to listen and help (article 4, paragraph 24), even though it was "awkward" (probably due to

the information [lies], or lack of such, which Ms. Harris had given to her). Thanks to Ms. Harris' expose on the Crisis Pregnancy Support Center, I am reassured there is a place MTSU and community women in a crisis pregnancy situation can go to receive open, honest information, in a non-threatening, non-intimidating manner, and that the women receive help and coun-

seling, based on what they need in their individual situation, without condemnation. I also appreciate how the articles brought out the fact that these services are free and confidential to all women. **John M. Key, director

## Notre Dame turns Raiders into Irish Stew

CHARLOTTE, N.C. — Notre Dame played "a perfect game" to beat MTSU last night in the first round of the NCAA Division I tournament, said Fighting Irish coach Digger Phelps.

"They had to play their best game they possibly could have to beat Middle Tennessee," Phelps said of Notre Dame's 84-71 victory.

"They played us a tough game and they deserved to be in the

NCAA tournament," Phelps added. The NCAA tournament selection committee has received some fire from Louisville coach Denny Crum for picking MTSU over the Cardinals — the defending champs.

MTSU played Notre Dame within six points for the entire game and led at two occasions in the first half — their biggest lead being 25-22 with 7:21 left in the opening stanza.

The Fighting Irish held a 37-31 halftime advantage.

They increased the lead to 53-44 with 12:52 left when Blue Raider Kerry Hammonds led MTSU to a 16-6 run which spanned 6:54 and brought MTSU to within two 61-59.

Hammonds scored six of his 11 points during the spurt with the rest of the Raiders assisting with three steals.

The crowd roared for the Blue Raiders throughout the run —

drowning out the announcer.

The Raiders got another steal after the tear, but Duane Washington missed a 10-foot jumper and the Irish re-built their lead and began to run away with the game.

MTSU started to desperately foul Notre Dame down the stretch — but the Fighting Irish nailed 15 straight from the charity stripe to seal the victory.

David Rivers and Donald Royal both had career high scoring nights

— with Rivers getting 27 and Royal 24. The 84 points was a season high for the Irish.

MTSU was led by Dwayne "Bam-Bam" Rainey with a game-high 32 points with Randy Henry adding 13 and Chris Rainey putting in 10.

The Irish were phenomenal from the line — hitting 27 of 32 for 84 percent — including 19 of 21 in the second half.

"They played a very good game

but couldn't get the breaks down the stretch," said MTSU coach Bruce Stewart of his team.

"They were never out of the game. It was always within six points until they had to start fouling at the end," Stewart said.

"In spite of everything Denny Crum said, I feel MTSU represented MTSU, the OVC, the NCAA and themselves with respect," Stewart said.

Royal agreed with Stewart.

"This was the toughest game we have played all year, including North Carolina, Duke, UCLA or any other team," Royal said.

"As a team Notre Dame probably played the best game of the season, the hardest game of the season and had we not played to the best of our ability — we would have lost," he added.

"No doubt about it, I bet Denny Crum was looking at the television and praying that Middle would lose because he would have to eat a lot of crow [if we had of won]," Dwayne Rainey said. "We proved that we could play with the big boys."

Center fielder Tony Holmes scored on two runs, while compiling three hits on Eagle pitching on the afternoon.

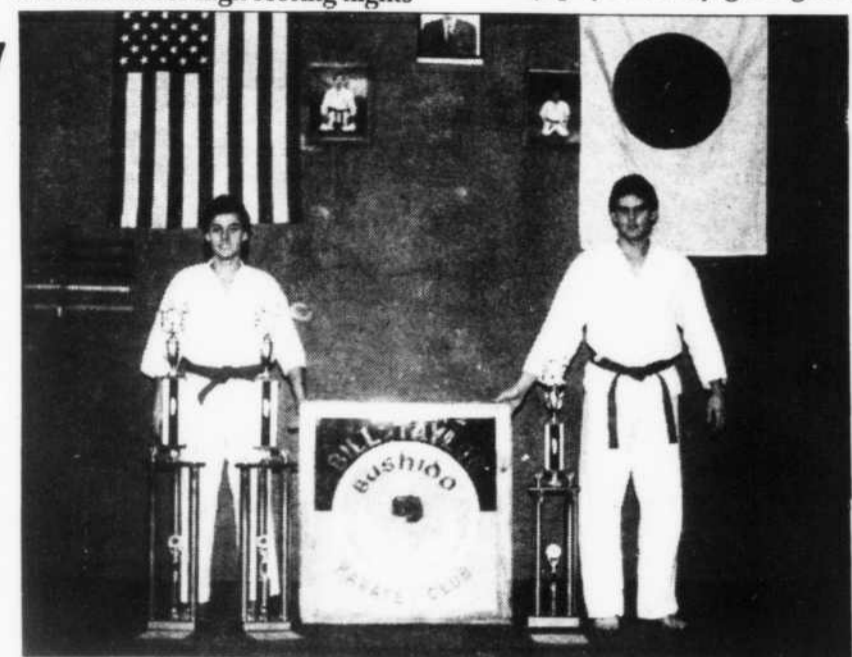

Billy Draper (left) won first place in Blue Belt and Sparring and Forms competition. Steve Holt was second in Blue Belt sparring.

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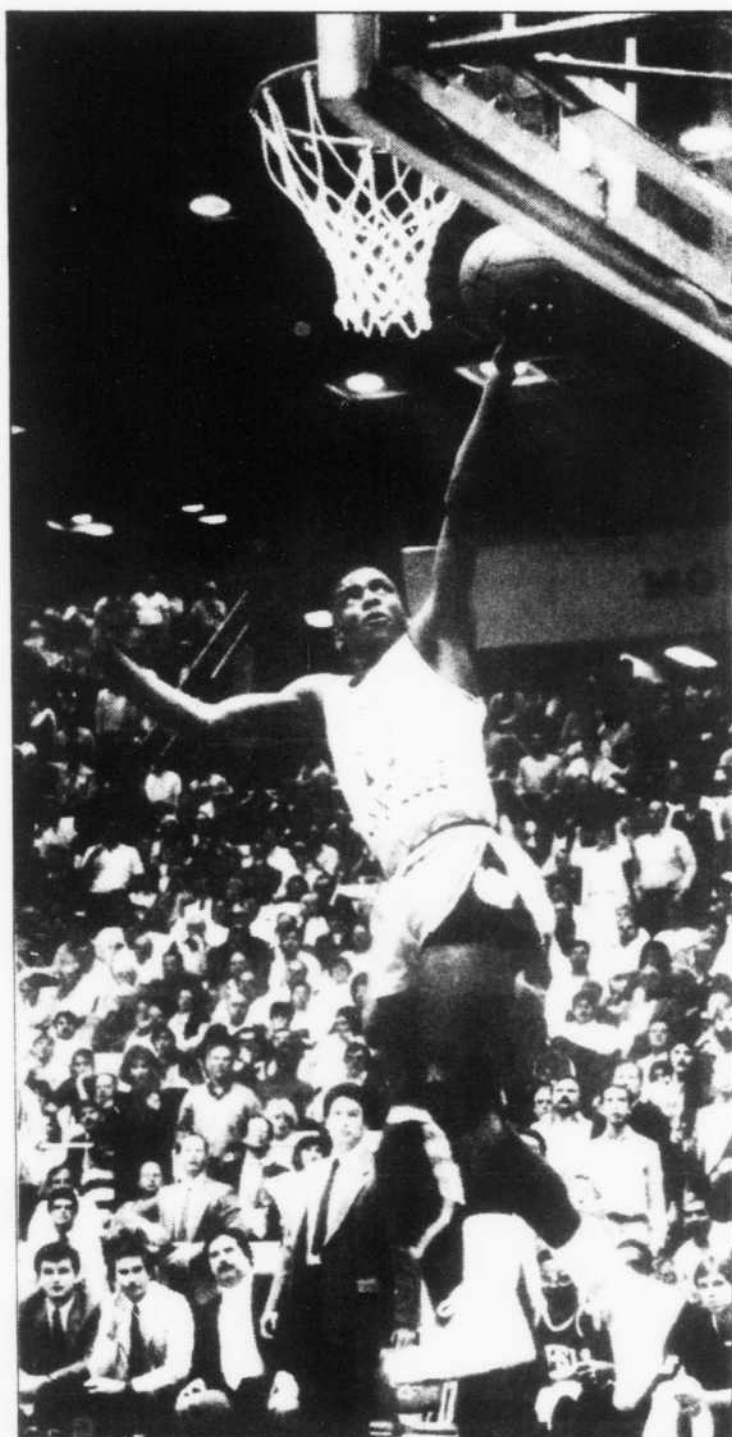
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# Rainey floods Raider season with talent
