The candidates for ASB positions next fall are headed for the finish line which will be reached Wednesday, March 31, at 4:00 when ballots will be counted to determine the winners.

Those candidates vying for the position of ASB president are Wally Cantrell, a twenty-year old history major from Nashville, and Bert Wakeley, a twenty-one year old political science major from Smyrna. Wally is now serving as president of the Student Christian Union and as a justice on the ASB Supreme Court. Bert is serving as president, Pro-tem on the Senate and as president of the Collegiate Council for the United Nations.

Only one candidate was nominated for the position of Male vice president. This candidate is Don Thornberry, a twenty-year old business administration major from Nashville. Don serves presently in the House of Representatives, on the Midlander staff, and as co-editor of the *Christian Tie*. Due to

## 1938 Begins ASB History

Although Middle Tennessee State Teachers' College had been electing student body presidents since 1927, 1939 marked the first year for student government on our campus. Dr. Homer Pittard, in his book *The First Fifty Years*, gives us an account of this beginning:

"For some time students had voiced affirmative opinions relative to student government at the college. Their principal media had been petitions to the administration and editorials in the *Sidelines*. Early in October of 1938, the President gave his blessing to the move and directed that the current student body president, Charles Miller, call a mass meeting of the students to ascertain the extent of the sentiment. The *Sidelines*, on October 19, reported that this had been done. The three hundred and forty-two in attendance at the previous Tuesday evening meeting unanimously endorsed the plan. President Miller immediately appointed a committee to contact other colleges for samples of constitutions. Other student leaders in the movement were John Bragg, John Paul Gilbert, Everett McIntyre, Kathryn Meadows, and Charlie Morton. A *Sidelines* editorial on December 7 stated tersely that "The Students are Ready". Confirmation of this was indicated by the results of a student body meeting, January 11, 1939. At this time the constitution in its final form was ready and approved and the Associated Student Body had become a reality. Dr. C. C. Sims and W. B. Judd gave assistance in framing the document, while Neal Frazier suggested certain changes in language structure. First officers elected on February 8 were as follows: President, Charles Miller; Vice-President, Kathryn Meadows; Secretary, Bruce Sartor; and Treasurer, Frances Brown. The first business to receive consideration was a measure to coordinate all campus organizations by filing a list of officers with the ASB secretary. Included also were a codification of dormitory rules and other matters pertaining to assignment of penalties for infractions."

The Associated Student Body has continued to grow, adding new responsibilities along the way, until it has expanded to fill the prominent position it holds today. Those who have held the position of Student Government President are as follows:

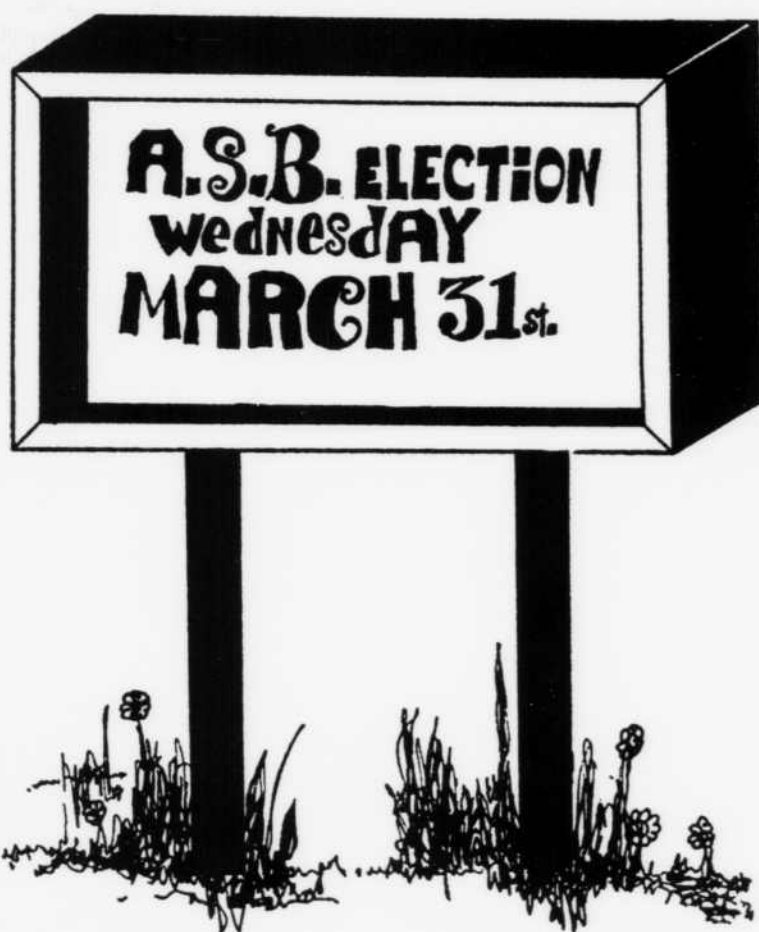

### OUTDOOR NEWS BOARD TO BE ERECTED SOON

Communications is one of the biggest problems that any organization has to face. This problem has never been solved completely, but this year's ASB has an improvement in the communications system this spring. An "ASB News Board" is to be placed beside the front steps of the Student Union Building. This "News Board" will have a black background with white, uniform, clip-on letters to notify students of coming events. This board will stand about three and one-half feet above the ground and be encased in an attractive wooden cabinet. There will be a glass door which can be locked, to insure the students of correct information. Dr. Cope cleared the project and the location last week. The Industrial Arts Club is going to make the board for the ASB, charging only for the materials. An adequate budget and civic-minded Industrial Arts Club will enable the project to be completed this spring.

## SUSGA Serves Southern Colleges And Universities

Middle Tennessee State University joined with other colleges and universities throughout the South in 1961 "in order to promote better student government, to provide for greater cooperation and exchange of ideas among member colleges and universities, and to better resolve our common problems." This phrase from the Southern Universities Student Government Association Constitution exemplifies the manner in which these institutions aid one another in achieving common goals. An MTSC alumnus and former ASB Attorney-General, Mr. Dennie Welsh, served as 1963-64 Vice-Chairman for the Kentucky-Tennessee District of SUSGA.

Last April six of your ASB officials, accompanied by Miss Martha Hampton, Dean of Women, attended the annual SUSGA convention in Biloxi, Mississippi. During these three days, the delegates attended many meetings, conferences, and panel discussions covering all phases of campus activity. Some of the discussion topics included "Financing Student Government", "Improving Campus Communications", "Campus Elections", "Entertainment", and "Judicial Systems." Not only did these officers gain many useful ideas at SUSGA; they aided public relations for the college by making their presence felt at the convention. Even though so many schools are represented, most of them larger than ours, Middle Tennessee is well known for its active, hard-working student government.

These officers, and those you elect Wednesday, will be looking forward to this year's convention, which will be held April 29 and 30 and May 1 in Gatlinburg, Tennessee. This year East Tennessee State University will serve as host school for the first SUSGA convention to be held in Tennessee.

# Know Your ASB Government

Article I, Section II of the ASB Constitution states "The purpose of this organization is to deal effectively with matters of student affairs, to perpetuate the traditions of Middle Tennessee State University, to promote the best possible understanding between faculty and students, to control all matters which are delegated to the student association by the administration of Middle Tennessee State University, to work with the administration in all matters affecting the welfare of the student body, and to supervise all student body activity in order that it may be conducted for the best interest of the student body as a whole and to the credit of Middle Tennessee State University.

The executive officials working to fulfill this purpose are the following:

Our **President**, Jerry Owens, has the duties of seeing that all laws are faithfully executed and is empowered to appoint all officials, assistants, and committees necessary to discharge his duties.

The duties of our **Female Vice-President**, Betty Jane Graham, consist of presiding over the Student Senate and assuming chief responsibility for all social activities.

Mike Rothman, our **Male Vice-President**, presides over the Student House of Representatives and serves as an ex-officio member of all standing committees.

The Administrative Cabinet consists of the following:

Our **Secretary of Correspondence**, Bette Saunders, is responsible for all official correspondence.

Sara Edwards is the **Secretary of Communications** and is responsible for all official publications of the ASB.

The **ASB Treasurer** who keeps the books of the finances of the ASB is Edward Alexander.

**Attorney General**, Troy Blevins, serves as Chairman of the election

commission and is the chief liaison between the President, the Dean of Students and the Supreme Court of the ASB.

Barbara Freeman serves as our **ASB Historian** and is in charge of keeping all historical records of the ASB.

Our **Hostess**, Emily Shubert, entertains at all social events sponsored by the ASB.

Floyd "Skeeter" Kephart, **Secretary of Student Affairs**, has the duties of assisting the President in providing for big name entertainment and other special campus programs.

Jim Beasley, our **Secretary of Freshman Affairs**, organizes Freshman Week, guides the Freshman Class until officers are elected and acts as their advisor throughout the year.

**Secretary to the President**, Mandy Gentry, performs secretarial duties as directed by the President.

## House

For the first time in the history of MTSU, the various clubs and organizations on campus were united into a House of Representatives. This body's duties are to: (1) Improve communications between the A.S.B. and the various organizations on campus, (2) Improve communications between students and faculty, (3) Suggest and pass on legislation for the improvement of student life.

The House was under the guidance of Mike Rothman, male vice-president of the A.S.B. and ably assisted by Danny Holder, Representative Pro Temp; Carolyn Powell, Secretary; Allen Tolbert, Parliamentarian; John Furgess, Sergeant-at-Arms.

The sixty member House's main accomplishments during the 1964-65 school year were the following:

(1) Student Discount Service (2) Recommendation for the erection

of outdoor basketball goals, (3) The erection of lights over the tennis courts (4) A study for special English course for foreign students, (5) Evaluation sheets on House Mothers, (6) Recommendation for convenient validation of I.D. cards, (7) Studies on student-faculty relations and women and men's policies.

Aside from these recommendations, members of the House drew up bills of legislature concerning the following: (1) Bill on controlling club and class meetings (2) Bill to facilitate governmental efficiency (3) Bill to further define qualification for elected A.S.B. officials (4) Bill introduced to give the president an opportunity to inform the A.S.B. officers and government of his plans and ambitions for the A.S.B. Government for the coming semester (5) Bill for the by-laws of the House and many other recommendations which are presently being undertaken by the House of Representatives.

## Senate

The presiding officer of the ASB Senate is Betty Jane Graham, Female Vice President. The Senate is composed of representatives elected from each of the four classes, four from the Senior and Junior classes, three from the Sophomore class, and two from the Freshman class. The Senators for 1964-65 are: Senior—Ernestine Harris, Mary Dean Bigger, Margaret DuVall, and Joanna Key; Juniors—Steve Jackson, Bert Wakeley, Judi Schrichte, and Ken Mires; Sophomores—George Juliano, Lana "Shot" Plum, and Wilson Bomar; and Freshmen Frank Fly and Mel Black. Senate and presides in the absence of the vice president.

Qualifications for Senators are that they shall have a 2.0 overall cumulative point average at the time of their election and maintain a 2.0 overall cumulative point average while in office, and that they be a member of the class which they are elected to represent.

The ASB Senate has made endeavors to improve campus life for you, the students, in such fields as the ASB travel board, extending credit hours for ROTC, re-establishing the ASB bulletin, and regaining club sponsorship of some fun nights, as well as numerous recommendations and bills concerning areas of campus life.

## Election Commission

The Election Commission is composed of four members. These members are appointed by the A.S.B. President and work closely with him. The commission is responsible for the co-ordination of all elections above the club level. It is also responsible for checking the qualifications of candidates, determining places for ballot boxes,

and with the help of the House of Representatives and members of the Senate, they count the ballots and make the results known. The people who have worked hard to serve you this year include Theresa Frey, Pat Hamby, Lee Redd and Troy Blevins.

## Supreme Court

The Supreme Court has been more active this year than in any previous year in the history of our A.S.B. Under the able leadership of Russell Johnson as Chief Justice and Troy Blevins as Attorney General, it has heard many cases and traffic appeals. The court meets weekly to hear all traffic appeals. They have also tried cases concerning stolen articles (including books and clothing) and discipline cases given them by the Dean of Students.

The four Justices include Gray Hill, Senior Justice, Wally Cantrell and George Atwood, Junior Justices, and Bill Bonner, Sophomore Justice. Roger Brandon is the Bailiff, Ronald Cooper, the Public Defendant, and Barbara Moore, the recorder.

at a cost of \$200, and a student discount service with town merchants are some of the activities coming in the remaining part of this year and next.

Planning for next year is our present concern. Fine personal ideas that are within reason and possible on which ASB officers can seek action are these:

2. ASB government could see that homecoming dorm decorations are more organized—concentrating additional interest on men's dormitories.
