some form of physical education, which is suited to the needs of the individual, should be required of every student."

Dr. Hughes bases his statement on the philosophy of education which aims to develop the "whole" student, mind and body, to the fullest extent of his various potentials. He maintains that the mind and the body should be developed separately.

"Athletics might well be considered the peak of a physical education pyramid whose basis is a required program for all students and whose middle portion is a voluntary intramural program of games and sports," says Dr. Hughes. "The required program should be varied, flexible, and based on individual needs, interests and limitations. The intramural and intercollegiate sports programs should not only be voluntary but should be viewed as supplements of, rather than substitutes for, a broad program of physical education."

# College Grads Not So Bad Off

## Survey Reveals That Majority Placed

WASHINGTON, D. C.—(ACP)—Despite the popular surveys to the contrary, college graduates are not so bad off as many would have you believe.

This is the paragraphic summary of a 207-page report just issued here by the U. S. Office of Education after a year of intensive research.

Proof of the summary statement are these excerpts from the report. During the eight-year period of the survey, about two-fifths reported that they had been idle for one or more months since graduation. But 57-59 per cent of the men and 60.7 per cent of the women reported that they have not been idle since graduation.

More than 98 per cent of the alumni reported that they have never been on public relief, but the typical period of relief is only 6 months. Eight years out of college, 31 per cent of the men graduates own their own businesses, while less than 1 per cent are employed as unskilled laborers.

The average salary, after eight years of employment, is slightly more than \$2,400 for the men and more than \$1,600 for the women who are graduates of institutions that have more than 3,000 enrollment. Graduates of the smaller schools earn less.

Eight years out of college, 75 per cent of the men and 52 per cent of the women graduates are married.

The divorce rate among alumni is lower than that of the country as a whole, with only 19 divorces per 1,000 marriages.

More than half of the college graduates live in cities of 100,000 population or over. Only 11 per cent of the men and 12 per cent of the women live in communities of less than 2,500 population.

Exactly 64 per cent of the men and 55 per cent of the women included in the survey report a close con-

nection between their present employment and their college major. Those surveyed indicated that "the most advantageous way for a graduate to find work after college is through an active personal solicitation of his own without waiting for anybody to find a job for him."

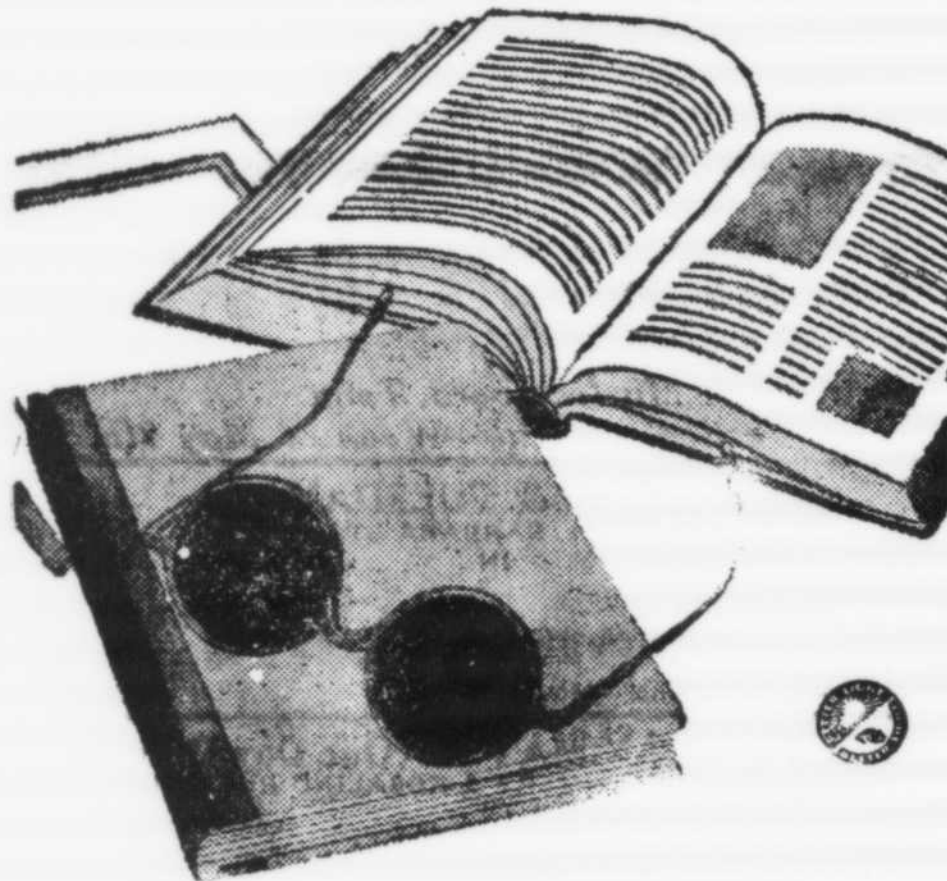
